RESCUE OF SUB CREW RESUMED AFTER STORMS

(Continued from page 1.) tap a hole in the hull of the submarine at the torpedo room and attach an air line.

The sea off Wood End was flat in the early morning but as the hours passed, it grew choppy and threatened once more to hold up all diving operations.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Dec. 21.—A friendly act for a brother officer sent Lieutenant Joseph A. McGinley, executive officer on the ill-fated submarine S-4 to his death.

His father, Joseph J. McGinley, former Norristown, Pa., publisher, said here today that his son had been transferred from the S-4 before the submarine left Portsmouth, N. H., on her final trip, but stayed aboard so another officer could spend a few days before Christmas with his family.

Lieutenant McGinley, the father said, had received orders to proceed to the New London submarine base for two years' shore duty after a 30-day leave, which should have started early last week.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Knowledge that he courted the death which may now be his within the steel confines of the wrecked submarine S-4, was held by Walter Bishop of Washington, radioman aboard her, but, like his comrades in peril, he was fascinated by "life in a damned old sub."

MRS. LINDBERGH LANDS IN TEXAS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) DALLAS, Texas, Dec. 21.—Mrs. Evangeline L. Lindbergh, on her way by airplane to see her son, Colonel Lindbergh, in Mexico City, landed at Love Field near here at 10:07 o'clock this morning.

The plane was to refuel at the big plane here and proceed to San Antonio.

TULSA, Okla., Dec. 21.—Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh, enroute to Mexico City to spend Christmas with her son, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, hopped off from Tulsa Airport here this morning at 7:45 for Dallas, Texas.

Mrs. Lindbergh expected to reach Dallas by not later than 10:10 where a brief stop is planned. Leaving Dallas the Ford-Stout tri-motored plane will wing its way to San Antonio, Harry Brooks, pilot, expecting to reach that city by 1 o'clock this afternoon.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Dec. 21.—Mrs. Evangeline L. Lindbergh, mother of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, alighted at Kelly Field here, where her noted son acquired his flying skill at 1:35 this afternoon enroute to Mexico City, where she is to spend the Christmas holidays with him.

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—The Boston navy yard today announced that the destroyer Sturtevant, now under way for the scene of the sinking of the submarine S-4, carried apparatus with which an attempt might be made to calm the troubled seas with compressed air.

Use of compressed air was suggested by Philip Brahear, of Princeton University, who recently set forth the idea that ships anchored in midocean might afford landing places for trans-Atlantic planes by calming the water around them in a similar way.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Dec. 21.—Diving operations were resumed at 12:30 o'clock today in an attempt to rescue the six men imprisoned in the wreck of the sunken submarine S-4. The first man to go down was James Ingram who was the first to be lowered when the S-51 was sunk off Block Island two years ago.

The sea was so calm the diver was lowered directly over the side of the mine sweeper Falcon, the flagship of the salvage fleet. The diving platform had been rigged but was not found necessary.

Commander Edward Ellsberg, who had charge of S-51 salvage work, was at the telephone on the deck, maintaining communications with the diver.

R. C. (Tug) Wilson, who was the second diver to go down to the S-51 was in his diving suit ready to make the descent as soon as Ingram came up. Because of the time consumed in lowering and raising the diver, made necessary by the changing pressure at various levels, no report on Ingram's findings was available at 2 o'clock.

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—Rear Admiral Frank H. Brumby, in charge of rescue operations at Provincetown, reported to the Boston navy yard this afternoon that before the compressed air apparatus at the scene of the disaster could be set up all hope of rescuing possible survivors of the S-4 would have vanished.

He pointed out that favorable weather was promised for the next 24 hours.
