TRIO WHO ROBBED SUTHERLIN STORE ARE UNDER ARREST

Local Officers Locate Men Guilty of Robbery But Find Them Already in Jail.

The three men who recently robbed the Sutherlin store and Slater merchandise store at Sutherlin have been apprehended at Portland and will be brought back to this county soon to answer to a burglary charge. Part of the loot taken in the robbery has been recovered.

The three men are now in jail in Multnomah county, one charged with theft, another with auto theft and the other with burglary, each are to be sentenced in Multnomah county, and as soon as they have served their sentences they will be brought back to Roseburg and charged with burglary.

The three are Clark Van Syckle, 23, John Wilde, 19, and N. V. Halley, 29, all transients. On the night of December 5 they broke into the Sutherlin store and stole several suits of clothes, shirts, underwear, shoes and other articles of clothing, together with \$14 in cash, rings and cigars. The sheriff's office has been putting forth a good deal of effort to trace the burglars and recently succeeded in tracing them to Portland, and the latest evidence obtained is that all three are now in custody in Multnomah county for crimes committed there.

Holding warrants have been issued directing the officers of the institutions to which the men may be sentenced to notify local authorities when the men are to be released so that they may be re-arrested and charged with the burglary at Sutherlin.

Some of the clothing taken by the trio has been recovered and an effort is being made to trace the most valuable of the rings, one of which, it has been learned, was pawned.

WINS BY A FOUL

COUNTY WILL SOON RECEIVE BIG PAYMENT

427.41. These figures are based on the original amount contended for by the county and will be changed somewhat when the deductions made by the government are applied to the county's previous figures. The state is contending that it is entitled to a share of the money received by the land grant counties, and the case is still pending in the supreme court. The counties having won the first round. If the state is awarded a share of the receipts the county will be forced to pay \$33,779.70 from its \$121,427.41, but if the decision favors the county then the full amount can be retained and will be used by the county for the retirement of road bonds as previously announced in a declaration of the county policy, spread upon the journal in the form of a resolution. This resolution binds the court to use all of the land grant funds for bond retirement, with the exception of \$225,000 held out for the construction of a court house.

Port to Benefit
The Port of Umpqua will receive \$9,796.74 from this payment and the Umpqua Highway Improvement district will benefit in the sum of \$8,339.83. The high school tuition districts will receive \$4,394.95.

The rest of the money will be distributed to road and school districts in which grant lands are situated and where special taxes are voted during the year 1926. School districts will receive a total sum of \$22,987.16, union high school districts \$8,843.23 and road districts \$17,434.23.

The act provides that where grant lands are situated within a district and special taxes for school, road or port purposes within that district, that the county shall receive a sum equal to the amount that would have been paid in taxes had the lands been privately owned.

The figures given above are based upon the county's claims and not upon the sum allowed by the government, so that slight changes will be made in final settlement. The same applies to the following tabulation which shows approximately the amounts to be paid to each of the districts to benefit from the payment authorized by the government and soon to be received.
