ROBIN REED SUES
FOR \$135,625 FOR
LOSS OF ONE EYE

PORTLAND, Dec. 29.—Alleging that he has lost the sight of his left eye and that his career as a professional wrestler at which he claims, he made about \$8,000 a year, has been wrecked, Robin Reed, formerly Olympic games wrestling champion and wrestling coach at Oregon State college, Thursday filed suit in circuit court to recover \$135,625 from the Portland-McMinnville-Corvallis Truck service and Edward Isaack, driver for the company.

Reed, who lives at Reedport, alleged in his complaint that on September 27 a truck belonging to defendant company and driven by Isaack ran into an automobile in which he was driving, and in the resulting smash a piece of glass entered his eye and destroyed its sight. Reed asked \$50,000 general damages, \$50,000 special damages and \$255 for damage to his car.

COMMERCIAL PACT
WITH GERMANY TO
BOOM PRUNE TRADE

PORTLAND, Dec. 29.—It is expected that prune shipments to Germany and Jugoslavia will receive impetus from the new commercial treaty between the two countries, terms of which have been received by William A. Schoenfeld of the bureau of agricultural economics, department of agriculture.

By the terms of the new treaty, Germany agrees to reduce her tariff on prunes from \$1.08 to 65 cents a 100 pounds for prunes unpacked in barrels or in sacks, or packages of at least 176 pounds, and from \$2.16 to 86 cents a 100 pounds for other packing. The treaty has been ratified by both countries.

Since the United States has a most favored nation clause in its commercial treaty with Germany the lower rates also will apply to imports into Germany from this country.

New Lines to Be Placed on
Market January 6,
John Willys
Announces.

TOLEDO, Dec. 29.—(Special to the News-Review.)—Important developments in the low priced field were predicted today by John N. Willys, president of Willys-Overland, Inc., in a statement in which he said, "there can be no monopoly in the light car class."

At the same time he announced that the Whippet, the original European type light car introduced 19 months ago, would be shown at all dealers on January 6th with improved bodies, new and added equipment, and at prices which would place it in direct competition with the lowest priced cars on the American market.

Mr. Willys said that production economies of a kind not to be exceeded by any other manufacturer had been worked out by Willys-Overland. A new body building plant and a new forge shop, completed this year and now in operation, have effected marked savings.
