Coolidge Pan-American Visit First Trip Out of United States

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—When President Coolidge leaves for the United States to address the sixth international conference of American states in Havana, Cuba, January 16, he will be making his first visit to the Caribbean region, and his first trip to another country since he became chief executive of the nation.

Accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, Secretary of State Kellogg and Secretary of the Navy Willard, the president will carry a message from the United States to the representatives of 20 other American republics which make up the Pan-American Union.

Because congress will be in session and the White House social season at its height, Mr. Coolidge will be unable to spend more than a day in Havana. But this short stay, it is believed, will go a long way toward clearing the atmosphere of a great deal of suspicion of the United States' foreign policy and attitude toward the component states of the Union.

Confronted with consideration of the report of the commission of jurists which met this year in the de-facto, the congress is expected to be charged with controversial material.

The report includes a complete justification of private and public international law, recommended for adoption by the nations of America. Several of its recommendations, which the conference will be asked to approve or reject, prohibit any kind of intervention by one state in the territory of any other state. It attacks and holds as illegal several recent acts of intervention on the part of the United States, notable in Nicaragua and Haiti.

Eight delegates, each chosen for his individual excellence in some phase of the work to be done in Havana, will represent the United States. They include Charles Evans Hughes, Dwight W. Morrow, ambassador to Mexico; Henry P. Fletcher, ambassador to Italy; and one of America's foremost authorities on international law, Dr. James Brown Scott, Washington, another international law authority; Judge J. S. O'Brien of New York; President Willard of Leland Stanford University; former Senator Oscar Underwood of Alabama; and Dr. Leo S. Rowe, director general of the Pan-American Union.

The Pan-American Union was founded following the first international conference in Washington in 1890. Its avowed aims include preservation of peace, facilitation of commercial, cultural and social intercourse between the American nations and development of all kinds of communication between North, South and Central America.

The union is ruled by a governing board with headquarters in the Pan-American Union building here. The building was a gift of Andrew Carnegie. The board is composed of the heads of diplomatic missions of American nations in Washington, and the secretary of state of the United States. Countries not having diplomatic missions here may appoint special representatives on the governing board.

President Coolidge's plans include a trip in a special train to Key West, Fla. There he will board the U. S. S. Texas, flagship of the United States fleet, if it is not raining, and proceed to Havana. If the weather is inclement, a navy cruiser will speed him on his way, as the Texas is too large to enter the harbor there and the trip to the battleship in an open boat would be too uncomfortable.

After delivering his message, the president will start back as soon as possible for Washington.

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STANFORD LEAVES FOR ANNUAL GAME

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Dec. 29.—Thirty-eight members of the Stanford University football squad will leave tonight for Pasadena to meet the powerful Pittsburgh University Panthers in the annual Tournament of Roses game on January 2.

The Cardinals depart for the Southland with the knowledge that they are facing on Monday the team their own coach, "Pop" Warner, has characterized as the best in the east, but Warner believes that sixty minutes of real football at top speed will give the Stanford an even chance for victory, despite their inconsistent play this season.

The strength of the Panther line, which has limited opposition to three touchdowns this year, will probably cause the Cardinals to resort to the aerial game. With Bill Hoffman, leading the long passmen, and either Frankie Wilton or Dick Hyland shooting the short ones, Stanford is well equipped for an overhead game.

While the Cardinals' starting lineup has not been definitely announced it is generally accepted by critics that the three doubtful positions, left end, quarter, and right halfback, will be filled by Johnny Preston, Mike Murphy and Doc Hill, respectively. Preston has a bad knee that may preclude his playing very long, in which event "Mush" Muller will take his place. Murphy, it appears, has definitely superseded "Spud" Lewis as field general, while Hill, although pressed by Bob Sims, will probably get the call because of his experience and superior defensive ability.

The Pittsburgh squad is scheduled to arrive in Pasadena Saturday in time for a short workout that afternoon.

SPANISH PINE CONES
GIVE PEASANTS INCOME

VALLEDOLID, Spain, Dec. 30.—Throughout December and January when the snow lies thick in this district, most of the country folk gather millions of pinecones from the resinous trees abounding here, and extract from them the kernels, which are regarded as a luxury in cooking and confectionery.

The air is filled with a delicious aroma as the workers in family groups rake the crops together and transport them in hand-barrows to waiting wagons, which carry them to the peasants' cottages. In the courtyards under the winter sun the cones open and disclose the kernels, which are placed in primitive hoppers turned by hand until the shells drop off, and then they are placed in sieves which remove all the dust and debris. Then they are emptied into sacks for market, all white and ready for consumption.

The kernels provide a considerable income for the peasants besides furnishing them with a delicacy for their own consumption. Fuel is a by-product for the debris of the cones is used for firewood and is almost the only combustible obtainable by the poorer peasants.

SLAYER OF WIFE
WILL NOT APPEAL

BUREKA, Kansas, Dec. 29.—Ivan M. Hart, sentenced to 30 years hard labor in the state penitentiary for killing his bride of three weeks by slashing her throat with a pocket knife July 8, will not appeal to the supreme court, his attorneys announced. Hart, convicted of second degree murder by a jury in district court December 10, has been denied a new trial by Judge A. T. Ayres.

Judge Ayres conceded the defense contention that Hart seemed to have no motive for killing his wife, but scored the practice of criminal lawyers in advancing the plea of insanity to avoid the consequences of crime. The defense had contended Hart was subject to an insane delusion when he committed the deed, a delusion communicated to him by his wife.

HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics—O. A. C.)

Attractive and appetizing salads may be made for winter use. The cupping salad is made by sticking "needles" cut from unblanched almonds into halves of canned pears.

Fruit salad in a water box is made by tying three saltines together with ribbon and filling with a lettuce leaf and fruit salad. A garnish of marshmallows or candied cherry adds to the appearance.

Butterfly salad is made from canned pineapple. A slice is cut crosswise and the cut edges placed opposite each other to form wings. Apple cubes and mayonnaise form the body. Strips of pimento make feelers.

An attractive holiday salad is made by adding chopped walnuts, celery and cranberries to a cranberry gelatin.

Shamrock salad is made by stuffing green peppers with a mixture of chopped olives and cheese, seasoned to taste. Ribs are stuffed with a mixture of three or four placed on lettuce in shape of a clover leaf.

Poinsettia salad is made by placing petals of pimento on a piece of canned pineapple. The center of the flower is made of mayonnaise, celery and nuts.

Daisy salad is made by slicing the white of a hard-boiled egg lengthwise, and placing it on bed of shredded lettuce in the position of petals. Centers of grated egg yolk and mayonnaise are used.

Individual servings of fruit salad are attractive when served in cups or baskets of orange or grapefruit peel.
