## TEAMS PREPARE FOR GRIDIRON TITLE BATTLES

California and Pennsylvania Squads Go Through Light Workouts.

### POP WARNER BUSY

Stanford Practicing for New Year Game—Membership Rules Committee Cut.

BERKELEY, Calif., Dec. 30.—Light workouts to put the finishing touches on the squads' condition were on the program today for the football teams of the University of California and Pennsylvania. The two eleven clash tomorrow in the memorial stadium here in an intercollegiate contest.

Both of the teams indulged in short workouts yesterday that were marked by the absence of scrimmage. Head Coach "Nibs" Price of California used four backfield combinations in the morning, and despite the fact that he has announced that Evans, Lom, Newman and either Dougery, Cockburn or Schmidt will be in the back field, it is certain that Marcus Eisan and Breckenridge will see service.

Coach Lou Young of the Quakers announced that his team is in first class condition. The starting line-up of the Pennsylvanians remains unchanged.

Stanford Has Workout  
PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 30.—This city's historic Rose Bowl, scene of the annual Tournament of Roses football classic between representative eastern and western eleven, was thrown open today to this year's western defenders, the Cardinals of Stanford.

With the task of beating the powerful and generally favored University of Pittsburgh Panthers before him, "Pop" Warner, veteran Stanford coach, feels that his men need all the practice they can assimilate and planned to take his men out to the Rose Bowl Field shortly after their arrival here this morning. Although he has shown no worry over the betting odds, the canny western coach intends to have his veteran team well versed in the intricate reverses and double reverses he likes so well.

Thirty-eight players made the trip down from Palo Alto. While the Pacific coast team was brushing up for the final game of the season, Pitt's Golden Panthers were "pounding the rails" across the continent in the last stages of its long train ride. They will arrive here Saturday morning.

Membership Reduced  
NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Reduction of membership on the National Football Rules committee from 13 to 10 ended the 29 year domination of the eastern section of the country's legislation regarding the game.

At the meeting of the rules committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association yesterday, a new arrangement was adopted whereby the place held by the late Fred W. Moore of Harvard was left vacant, and the posts held by Professor C. W. Savage of Oberlin College, Ohio, and Dr. James A. Habbitt of Haverford College, Pennsylvania, were adopted.

Under the reorganization the committee is made up of a member from each of eight districts established by the collegiate association with two members at large, Edward K. Hall of Dartmouth, the chairman, and W. S. Langford of Trinity, the secretary.

Five coaches were given places. The district delegates are: Coach T. A. D. Jones, Yale; Coach W. W. Roper, Princeton; H. G. Stegman, athletic director of University of Georgia; A. A. Stagg, football coach and athletic director of University of Chicago;

Rejoins Olympic Body  
NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The National Collegiate Athletic association is back in the Olympic fold. The collegiate group bolted in the Olympic ranks a year ago at Washington along with the National Amateur Athletic Federation, the Y. M. C. A., and the Western Conference.

The federation agreed to rejoin the Olympic body on Wednesday and the other two organizations are expected to take similar action in the near future. Under the present program now instituted, the 1928 championships of the N. C. A. A. will be on the same basis as the A. A. U. sectional tryouts with the winners qualifying for the final Olympic trials.

Sectional trials of the association will be held as follows: Wrestling, at Ames, Iowa, March 30 and 31; swimming, at the University of Pennsylvania, March 30 and 31; track and field, at Chicago June 8 and 9.

St. Louis, Dallas and Los Angeles bid for the 1928 convention but New Orleans was chosen.

Coaches to Meet  
LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30.—Members of the Pacific Coast and Rocky Mountain Football Coaches association will hold their annual meeting here Sunday. More than 50 grid mentors are expected to be in attendance.

Discussion at the meeting will center around the present football rules with the association planning to send its report east for consideration by officials there. The meeting will be called to order by William (Bill) Spaulding, coach at the University of California at Los Angeles. Nibs Price of California is also president of the association and Milton Romney, of Utah, secretary.

A. A. Stagg, famous Chicago coach; Jack Sutherland, Pittsburgh mentor; Glenn "Pop" Warner of Stanford; Andy Kerr of Washington and Jefferson; and Howard Jones of the University of California will be speakers.

### LUMBER SHOWS HOLIDAY SLUMP

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Lumber production fell off heavily last week due to the usual holiday relaxation and suspension of operations for semi-annual repairs, the National Lumber Manufacturers' association reports. Shipments held up relatively well but orders fell off noticeably. Reports came from 110 fewer mills than the week before, making comparisons uncertain. Increases in production and new business were shown by soft wood mills. Unfilled orders of 210 southern pine and west coast mills were 520,285,393 feet against 569,717,427 for 214 mills the week before.
