LINDY IS GIVEN ROYAL WELCOME IN SAN SALVADOR

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
SAN SALVADOR, Jan. 2.—The inhabitants of the smallest Central American republic turned today from welcoming the advent of a New Year to acclaiming the coming of an ambassador of good will, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh.

After spending today here Lindbergh is expected to fly 140 miles to Tegucigalpa, Honduras, less than thirty miles north of the section of Nicaragua where United States marines are engaged in a severe campaign against rebels.

From Tegucigalpa to Managua, Nicaragua, his route by airline passed over this district, and he had been warned to fly high or to detour to avoid rebel rifle and machine gun fire. Lindbergh landed here at 9:15 and was greeted by a great throng. Visitors came from the smallest hamlets to welcome Lindy.

At a reception in the presidential mansion, Lindbergh was presented to members of the cabinet, diplomatic corps, military officials and prominent citizens. In the evening President Bosque gave a banquet in Lindy's honor.

The mystery of the visit to Hickman's cell yesterday of three strangers, accompanied by a counsel, Jerome Walsh of Kansas City, was partially solved in the expression of official opinion that further moves were being made toward constructing a defense basis of insanity. Although Walsh declared the trio were making a private investigation of Hickman's activities and the men insisted on concealing their identities, it was learned that one was a physician. The strangers, Walsh, Joseph Ryan, resigned member of the district attorney's office who admitted he is considering associating in the defense of the youthful criminal and Hickman were closeted for nearly an hour in Jailer Frank Dewar's office.

Buddy Burnett, a well known young resident of Drain, died very suddenly today at his home, a short distance out of that city, heart failure being given as the cause of his death. He went out to look after his sheep and when relatives, alarmed by his continued absence, went to search

for him, they found his lifeless body. Coroner Ritter was called to make an investigation. He was about 30 years of age, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Burnett, of Drain. He leaves, besides his parents, a widow and small child.

DISTURBANCE IS CAUSED BY A WAX DUMMY OF HICKMAN

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2.—A wax dummy of William E. Hickman, displayed hanging from a gallows to advertise movie news reels at a theatre in Belvedere, a suburb last night necessitated the calling of sheriff's deputies to disperse a mob of several hundred. The officers said that the crowd believed the alayer of little Marian Parker was being hung in effigy and that several clashes occurred in arguments over the kidnapping murder.

The advertised news reel featured scenes of Hickman's return to Los Angeles from Oregon, where he was captured and of his incarceration in the county jail under constant guard.

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
