PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Egg prices are considerably higher on the dairy exchange board here today occasioned by weather conditions. All grades were advanced at the exchange meeting yesterday, rises ranging from 2 1/2 to 4c a dozen. Quotations are as follows: Standard extras 37c; standard firsts 36c; medium extras 33c; medium firsts 32c; and undersized 30c.

Butter quotations are also slightly higher here today. Extras are up 1c to 4c, standards are a cent higher at 46c, and prime firsts are up 1c at 45c. Firsts are unchanged at 44c. Nothing is coming in to the local wholesale poultry market and prices are decidedly firm. All classes cleaned up well during the holidays and it is said that prices will rise in all divisions unless shipments pick up materially today.

Heavy hens are exceptionally scarce, but demand this morning was quite limited. Country dressed meats are quoted steady at Saturday's figures although the market is practically cleaned out on choice stock. Veal is especially firm and higher prices probable should today's receipts prove limited. Obstruction of highways by the heavy snowfall has kept most of the early offerings out of the market. Supplies of hogs and lambs are also limited although shortage is not acute as most dealers carried over considerable stock from last week.

Practically all the local markets are paralyzed to some extent by weather conditions and price trends in the next few days will depend largely on how rapidly transportation conditions improve.

Thirty Million Radio Fans to Listen To Big Four in Dodge Brothers Program



"Victory Hour," January fourth, contributed to by Will Rogers, Fred Stone, Paul Whiteman and Al Jolson will mark a new high point in nation wide radio broadcasting. Not only will the Dodge Brothers hour, from ten thirty to eleven thirty, E. S. T., be the costliest program ever broadcast to the entire nation, but it will be the greatest achievement in combined radio and telephony ever attempted.

Will Rogers, master of ceremonies, will be in Hollywood, Cal. Fred and Dorothy Stone will broadcast from Chicago, while Paul Whiteman and his band will be in New York and Al Jolson will address the microphone in New Orleans. The program will be so synchronized that, to the millions listening in on the forty-three stations of the National Broadcasting Company's Red Network system located from coast to coast, these great stars will seem to be in the same studio.

The occasion of this big program is the initial step in an extensive advertising program by Dodge Brothers announcing a new six-cylinder motor car, the "Victory," embodying entirely new principles in motor construction. According to engineers of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, the plan involves the performance of a feat entailing the overcoming of tremendous difficulties. Three transcontinental telephone circuits will be used. One will serve the 43 stations, another will transmit the programs of the artists to New York, where in turn they will be distributed over WEAJ to the broadcasting stations, and a third will be used for emergency purposes should bad weather interfere with one of the other two.

More than two hundred men will be operating the broadcasting stations in the hook-up. Hundreds of engineers, before the program and during the hour, will be at work on the three lines. Twelve thousand miles of telephone lines will be used in transmitting the program and additional thousands of miles will be used in sending messages to the engineers at work.
