HICKMAN INDICTED FOR KILLING THOMS IN DRUG STORE HOLDUP

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5.—William E. Hickman, confessed kidnaper and killer of Martin Parker, was indicted for a second murder today when the county grand jury ordered him to trial for slaying of C. Ivy Thomas, Rosehill drugist, during an attempted holdup a year ago.

The indictment also charges Welby Hunt, now under arrest here, with murder for alleged participation in same crime. Thomas was killed when Hickman and Hunt held up the druggist at their gun muzzles Christmas eve, 1926.

A police officer in the store opened fire on the two young bandits. Hickman says both he and Hunt returned the fire. Hunt declares he did not fire a shot. In the interchange, Thoms was killed by a 38-caliber bullet. The gun carried by Hunt was of that calibre. Hickman's weapon was a .32 calibre pistol.

LITTLE HOPE FOR CLEMENCY IN CASE OF SNYDER AND GRAY

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 5.—For two hours today lawyers made a last fight before Governor Smith for the lives of Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray, under sentence to die in the electric chair a week from today for the murder of Mrs. Snyder's husband.

When the lawyers were thru the governor merely said: "Well, the hearing is over," and walked out of the room. It was understood that he will render a decision Monday.

Altho the governor rendered no decision his remarks just before the hearing ended caused many to believe that he would extend no clemency.

He spoke with a dry smile of "this psychosis" and "twilight zone" business and told defense lawyers that much of what they had told him might better have been presented to the jury at the trial.

DEEDS OF BRAVERY MARK RESCUE OF CREW OF SCHOONER

CAPE DISAPPOINTMENT, COAST GUARD STATION, Oregon, Jan. 5.—Deeds of bravery marked efforts to rescue the crew of the stranded four masted schooner North Bend, which went on the sands inside Peacock Spit early today.

Two members of the Cape Disappointment life saving crew were injured when their boat upset in the breakers while an effort was being made to get a line aboard. Captain Alfred Rimer and George Kiffemaker were seriously hurt when dashed to the water. They were rescued by their fellow life savers who managed to right the boat and bring them ashore. James E. Reborn of Ravenwood, New Zealand, swam thru the surf with a line. H. Elsenford, of San Pedro, also plunged into the water with a line, but lost his line before he reached shore.

RUTH MAKES WILL

OSSINING, N. Y., Jan. 5.—Mrs. Ruth Snyder, awaiting execution in the Sing Sing death house, has made her will, leaving her property to her nine-year-old daughter and her mother, it was learned today.

The will disposed of the \$97,000 insurance on her murdered husband, although payment has been contested in the courts and property consisting of an automobile, clothing and jewelry, she left the bulk to her daughter, Lorraine.

DOCTOR IS INDICTED

GOOD ATTENDANCE IS EXPECTED AT FIGHTS FRIDAY

The front row of seats in the balcony will be reserved for ladies without escorts. Mr. Ward is attempting today to arrange for an orchestra to furnish music between bouts.

JUNKETING COURT IS BEING PLANNED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5.—Whether a bill should be introduced at the next legislature to provide for the establishment of an intermediate court of appeals in Oregon will be discussed at the meeting of the state judicial council in Portland tomorrow.

This court would be composed of three judges and would probably be a junketing court, that is it would hold sessions in various parts of the state. It would have jurisdiction over certain cases now appealed to the supreme court.

Judge Fred W. Wilson of The Dalles and Albert B. Rinday of Portland will lead the discussion on this measure.

Another suggested legislative measure that would change the present court system radically would provide for a uniform jury fee of \$25 a day in civil cases, to be assessed against the plaintiff, but reduced from defendant in event of judgment.

Other measures to be discussed will be the following:

Bill proposed by W. Lair Thompson to amend the present law to remedy the present system permitting what is known as the Omnibus bill of exceptions.

Bill to reduce to the supreme court the rule making power. Bill to harmonize and simplify the provisions of the Oregon code relative to appeals to the supreme court.

Constitutional amendment to be prepared and submitted giving to the state the right in the course of a criminal trial before a judge and jury in the presence of his counsel to question a defendant on matters strictly relevant.

Some method to relieve the congestion of the trial docket in Multnomah county.

The propriety of enacting legislation giving to the defendant in a criminal case the right of election as to whether he shall be tried by a court or jury.

SOLDIERS HOME IS FACING A DEFICIT

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5.—With the completion of the first year of the 1927-1928 biennium, indications are that all the state institutions will go thru the two-year period without deficits, and without calling upon the state emergency board for financial aid. Reports submitted to the state board of control today showed all institutions of a sound financial footing.

A possible exception is the state soldiers home at Roseburg. That institution, however, receives a quota of federal funds and may be able to get thru the biennium without a deficit.

NO MEETING UMPQUA CHIEFS

Due to the lack of a quorum, because of the numerous counter attractions last night, the regular meeting of the Umpqua Chiefs, scheduled for yesterday evening was not held. An effort will be made to call a meeting in the near future, as the organization has considerable business demanding attention.

BURNS PROVE FATAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Burns suffered January 2 when her clothing became ignited by flames from a fire she was building in a kitchen stove proved fatal early today to Mrs. John Hargrove, 88. She died at a hospital.

The aged woman, a widow, received first degree burns about her arms, chest and legs.

DEPUTY SHERIFF MISSING

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Homer Johnson, deputy sheriff and jailer of Multnomah county jail, has been mysteriously missing more than a month under circumstances which have caused Sheriff T. M. Hurlburt to suspect foul play.

Johnson drew his monthly pay check November 30, and after paying some bills had \$150 in cash on his person when last seen. His family and friends have had no word from him since he disappeared. He did not take any personal effects with him and gave the sheriff's office no notice that he was quitting. His revolver and star were left at his home. Johnson weighed more than 250 pounds and was considered an efficient officer.
