CONSOLIDATION OF ROAD DISTRICTS IS CONSIDERED

The county court at the present term is giving considerable attention to proposed changes in road district boundaries. There are several districts in which minor changes are proposed, but the court states that there will be no major changes made, so far as is now known. The most important proposition is the proposed consolidation of districts 1 and 59, Cleveland and Coles Valley. Some of the Coles Valley residents want the road between Coles Valley and Cleveland improved so that they can come directly into Roseburg by way of Cleveland and Melrose. Others want the road left as it is at present with the main road between Coles Valley and Sutherlin. Valley there has been little improvement work done, and some of the Coles Valley people object to the expenditure of the district's money in extending the road up Hubbard creek, where the county is spending a good deal of money in road building each year. Instead of building a better road between Coles Valley and Cleveland, it is the plan of these folks to consolidate the two districts so that money from both can be used upon the common road, there is a strong opposition, however, contending for the main road into Sutherlin. Lengthy petitions have been submitted by each faction, the court has the matter under advisement.

SAFE-CRAKER FOUND AT WORK

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Spying a man kneeling in front of a safe in the office of the Pouch Electric Manufacturing company early today. Special Officer Hickey summoned police and then knocked on the door and covered the man with his gun. Hickey held the man at bay until police climbed thru a rear window and arrested him.

The man gave his name as Alvin Gleason, 27. He admitted ransacking the safe, which was unlocked.

STUDENT JAILED ON THEFT CHARGE

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Eddie Erdreich, 20-year-old college student, was in jail today while detectives investigated charges that he stole \$35,000 from his employers so that he might complete his education.

Since November 30, last, police said, Erdreich systematically forced checks of the New York News chandlery company, where he had worked since boyhood, winning promotion by his intelligence and application. The poverty of his family, he said, drove him to grand larceny as the solution of his problems.

His bank accounts totalling \$7,000 were opened with the stolen money, the youth confessed. He gave \$25,000 in cash to the detectives who arrested him as he sat in a class room at New York university last night.

BUILDING CODE COMMITTEE NAMED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6.—Appointment of a state building code committee of 13 members, provided for in a senate resolution adopted by the 1927 legislature, was announced today by Governor Patterson. The members are: Representing the legislature, A. M. Collier of Klamath Falls; from eastern Oregon, H. L. Stoddard of Joseph; from southern Oregon, A. C. Dixon of Eugene; from state

federation of labor, Ben T. Osborne of Portland; from Association General Contractors of America, Carl M. Siebinger of Portland; from American Institute of Architects, O. R. Dean of Portland; from Oregon Technical Council, H. E. Plummer of Portland; from Oregon Building Congress, H. E. Cushman of Portland; from Oregon League of Building and Loan and Savings and Loan associations, A. C. Cammack of Portland; from Pacific Northwest Real Estate association, Frank B. Upshaw of Portland; from Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau, Fred D. Weber of Portland; from Oregon Manufacturers' association, C. E. Cowdin, of Portland; from State Board of Health, Dr. W. B. Morse of Salem.

Although the resolution stipulated that the governor should make the appointments within 90 days after adoption of the resolution he deferred it until this time. The first meeting will be held at the governor's office January 19.

The duty of the committee is to draft a state building code for submission to the 1929 legislature.

THAWING WEATHER CLEARING ROADS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Hope for continued thawing weather was voiced today by men directing work of clearing the blocked Columbia river highway. Drifts eight to twelve feet cover the highway at points west of Hood River and rain and thaw have been adding snow plow crews but a sudden freeze would transform the snow into solid ice, requiring dynamite for removal.

All highways except the Columbia river and North Bank highway of the Washington side of the Columbia river were open yesterday.

HIGHER PAY FOR JURORS OPPOSED BY JUDICIAL BODY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—Contending that higher pay for jurors would impose a burden upon the poor classes, inasmuch as it would increase the cost of a civil suit wherein a jury was required, the state judicial council, consisting of members of the legal fraternity, today voted down a proposal to make the fee \$25.

Among those who opposed the proposal were Chief Justice McAdams, Judge Hamilton of Roseburg and George Shepard, a local attorney.

The council approved a proposed bill which would eliminate the necessity of making an entire transcript of a case that has been appealed to the supreme court.

Judge Morris of Multnomah county urged upon the council that measures be taken to speed up trials and that judges take steps to prevent bickering between attorneys when lengthy discussions are not necessary.

A committee was appointed to study and make recommendations as to the proposed measure. This afternoon the council took up the discussion of a proposed measure requiring that all police officers and others making arrests be prohibited from talking with persons arrested until they have had an opportunity to procure an attorney. The measure would also require that the attorney be present at all times.

This proved one of the bitterest subjects of the meeting, many disapproving this plan on the ground that it would hinder justice. District attorneys were the most bitter in denouncing the proposal, while others maintained that the "accused" method are used by police officers in procuring confessions.

his client would plead guilty to the Thoms' murder charge and throw himself on the mercy of the court, court attaches predicted that the trial on the hotup killing would find Hunt testifying against his former accomplice in crime.

Despite the fact that the juvenile court to which Hunt's case first was referred, sent it back to the superior court for handling, due to the seriousness of the charge, the youth's attorney said he would attempt to have Hunt tried in the juvenile court. In any event, he said, he would ask a separate trial. California law provides that the death penalty can be inflicted on no person under 18 years of age. Hunt's superior court arraignment was set for January 19.

Although the bullet which fatally wounded Thoms at the time of the holdup has been shown to have been the same calibre as Hunt's pistol, California law provides that in such a case each of the accused would be held equally guilty regardless of which youth fired the shot.

EXECUTION DATE OF RUTH SNYDER NOT BE CHANGED

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Hope of Mrs. Ruth Snyder for postponement of the date of her execution on January 12 was apparently dashed again today when it was announced that argument on a motion for a jury trial in the suit brought against her by the Prudential Life Insurance company was adjourned until January 13.

Edgar Hazleton, of Mrs. Snyder's counsel, made the application for a jury trial and it was considered possible that the date of Mrs. Snyder's execution might be postponed in the event that Supreme Court Justice Levy ruled that she would be needed for a witness.

Should Justice Levy decide that Mrs. Snyder is necessary as a witness, he may order her execution postponed. The decision would have no effect on Gray.

Gray last night received the well wishes of two doomed men who shook hands with him as they searched past his cell in the Sing Sing prison death house on the way to the electric chair. They were Charles J. Moran, 19, of Albany, and Louis Mason, 39, negro, of Buffalo. Both were executed for murders committed during hold-ups.

Mrs. Snyder, who is in another part of the death house, did not see the two men. She was said by prison attendants, however, to have displayed extreme nervousness when told the governor had refused Doran clemency.

"Two more going and no hope apparently," she remarked.

Remarks by Governor Smith at the clemency hearing for Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray were intercepted by newspapers today as indicating he would not override the decision of the courts that the two must die in the electric chair next week.

country had taken this tall smiling youth into its heart. "Vivo los Estados Unidos!" they cried as Dr. Dana G. Muro, the American charge d'affaires was greeting the filer and presented him to officials.

A silver key to Managua was handed Lindy by the mayor. Children and motorists threw kisses at him as he sped by automobile direct to the historic Camp de Marte, home of President Diaz.

The president and the filer chatted in English. From the balcony of the congressional hall Jose Griesche, minister of war and foreign affairs, presented the filer to the people, speaking in Spanish.

Lindbergh's brief reply in English was translated by Roscoe R. Hill of the American high commission. Lindbergh said: "Ladies and gentlemen, I want to thank you all for the welcome I have received here today."

During an interview at the American legation, a Nicaraguan asked the filer when he expected to get married. The reply was a smile and the remark: "I hardly believe that refers to aviation."

COOPER BILL IS OPPOSED IN STATE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6.—The Cooper bill which would prohibit interstate shipments of prison made articles in competition with merchandise manufactured by free labor threatens the industries of the state penitentiary. The state board of control will ask the Oregon delegation in congress to oppose the measure.

Superintendent Henry W. Meyers, of the state prison told the board Thursday that passage of the measure might interfere seriously with the flax industry for the reason that much of the low made at the prison is shipped east.

TILLAMOOK HAS BIG FIRE TODAY

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Jan. 6.—Fire today destroyed the stock of the A. A. Pennington department store, the office and store room of the Mountain States Power company, the Masonic and Eastern Star lodge rooms, and the quarters of the post office. The aggregate loss was estimated at \$50,000.

Four firemen were overcome by smoke but were revived quickly and removed to the side lines. The volunteer fire department battled five hours with the flames.

The fire was believed to have started from a fuse in the basement.

WASHINGTON GIRL DIES ON HER WAY HOME

Maria W. Adlain, of Bellingham, Wash., died near Glendale yesterday afternoon, while a passenger on the northbound Shasta. Miss Adlain was taken to California recently for her health, but as she made no improvement she was being taken back to her home when death occurred. She was born at Chastanaut, Montana, Nov. 2, 1907, and spent practically all of her life in Montana and Washington. Her stepfather and her mother, Mr. and Mrs. William Robinson, of Bellingham, were with her at the time of her death. The body was taken off the train here and prepared for burial by the Roseburg Undertaking company and is being taken to Bellingham for interment tonight.

SELLING GINGER ALE AND ICE FOR MIXING LIQUOR IS ILLEGAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Under a ruling today by Assistant Secretary Lowman in charge of prohibition enforcement, night clubs and restaurants which serve ice, gingerale, and other ingredients that may be used for mixing drinks, do not violate the prohibition law unless they give the service with the knowledge that it is to be used for intoxicating liquors.

If they serve these ingredients with the knowledge that it is to be mixed with liquors, however, they come under a technical violation of the law prohibiting sale of liquor and will be subject to the padlock law. Several arrests have been made under these circumstances.
