## TEXT BOOKS NOT TO BE USED IN EXCESS SIX YEARS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 4.—Requests by some school districts in Oregon that they be allowed to continue the use of textbooks that have been in use six years cannot be granted. Attorney General Van Hinkle yesterday informed C. A. Howard, state school superintendent, that use of any text in excess of six years is illegal. Several districts desired for economic reasons to avoid changes. The state textbook commission meets every two years, and all changes made are good for six years.

## SIGNING OF NEW TREATY EXPECTED

PARIS, Jan. 6.—(Special)—The Franco-American arbitration treaty with a denunciation of progressive war in its preamble can be signed very shortly.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 5.—(Special)—Mrs. Sophronia Howe, 71, of Eugene, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Karl K. Mills, at Cottage Grove Tuesday night.

Mrs. Howe was a native Oregonian, being the daughter of O. P. Coshow Sr., of Brownsville, an Oregon pioneer. She was born at Brownsville March 9, 1856. She was married to John M. Howe in Brownsville in 1877. Five children were born to them, all of whom are living. Mr. Howe died April 28, 1914, at Eugene. The family has resided in Eugene since 1890.

The children are: O. P. Howe, Portland; E. D. Howe, Portland; Miss Lola Howe, Eugene; R. L. Howe, San Jose, Calif.; Mrs. Elizabeth Mills, Cottage Grove.

Mrs. Howe was a sister of Hon. O. P. Coshow, associate justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

## NEW INSURANCE PLAN

(Associated Press Local Wire) SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6.—Effective January 1 all state departments, incorporated cities, counties, school districts, irrigation districts and all political subdivisions of the state or county are required to come under the insurance plan of the state workmen's compensation act. No choice of rejection or acceptance is permitted as in the case of private concerns. This amendment to the compensation act was made by the 1927 legislature.

### NEW INSTRUMENT WILL GIVE RECORD WIND VELOCITY

A new type of anemometer has been adopted by the Weather Bureau and one has been put in use at the local office, according to A. W. Pugh, local meteorologist. It is known as the Robinson 3-cup anemometer. This new instrument runs so close to the true velocity of the wind that errors in the anemometer itself are smaller in magnitude than errors from other sources, such as those due to exposure, variability, mechanical condition, and limitation in making and interpreting the record. Hence the indicated values are recorded, reported and published without correction. While mechanically similar to the old anemometer, the new instrument differs materially in dimensions. The cup arms are somewhat shorter and the cups are larger than those of the old 4-cup type, and the new instrument turns 640 times for each mile of wind as against 500 by the old instrument. Records in Roseburg from this new instrument are expected to result in maintaining the low wind velocity record here if not actually tending to reduce the same to a still lower average. The old anemometer was adjusted to register correctly at normal velocities, but when higher velocities were reached it became necessary to make adjustments for mechanical errors. The new type registers correctly at all speeds. It has already shown a considerable reduction in the recorded velocities for Roseburg since the installation.

## WHEN IS A MAN REALLY DRUNK?

(Associated Press Local Wire) BINGHAMTON, N. Y., Jan. 6.—Supreme Court Justice, Leon G. Rhodes has handed down a decision that the forcible examination of an individual to determine whether he is intoxicated is contrary to constitutional provisions and is therefore illegal. The decision follows the appeal of a prisoner sentenced to the penitentiary for driving an automobile while intoxicated.

## National Guard Notes

It is interesting to know that there has been \$270,000 appropriated by the government in Washington, D. C., for improvement of four national guard camps in the nation. This appropriation is noted in Roseburg for the fact that Camp Clatsop, the place of encampment for the Oregon National Guard, where Company B, 125th Infantry, with other companies, has training during the annual two weeks period, is one of the camps on which this money is to be expended. One fourth of the amount will be used at the Oregon camp for the improvement of roads, mess halls and recreation halls.

The new year drill started off in a very satisfactory manner on Tuesday evening, at which time regular training period was held instead of Monday, which was a holiday. A definite program and schedule is being outlined as the work toward the annual inspection of the company, which will be held in February. Lines of advanced machine gun training are to be stressed. A regular army officer will be here from Vancouver barracks to conduct the inspection. Infantry training will start from the recruit stage, following straight through to the various stages of the advanced work which all companies are required to know.

A basketball game followed the usual practice this week as a part of the regular athletic period. A good workout was made by the company members. No games for the season have been scheduled as yet.

Company D, the local machine gun unit, has several vacancies in membership at the present time, which enables those interested in the work of the company to join the national guard, which extends valuable and interesting program of training to recruits.

## Typhoid Fever

An epidemic of thirty-seven cases of typhoid in a city in the southern part of this state points out the fact that eternal vigilance is necessary to prevent the outbreak of epidemics. Before the days of modern water purification, typhoid fever was held to be chiefly a water-borne disease. During the past few years, however, we find that typhoid is more often milk-borne in origin. Few diseases present the striking contrast of the past with the present as does typhoid fever. Not many years ago this disease was a plague which was present in the population all the time and each fall it was expected in epidemic proportions. It is now within the power of any community to bring down and keep down the typhoid fever rate to, or nearly to, the vanishing point.

Since water supplies have been largely improved, milk has become probably the most common vehicle in the transmission of this disease. It has numerous opportunities for contamination. The hands of the milkier may not be clean and the utensils may have been washed in unclean water. If the typhoid germs get into the milk while it is warm, it finds an excellent culture medium and as a result increases, so that a slight contamination becomes massive.

The utmost care must be taken in handling milk. Milk epidemics present characteristic peculiarities. The cases follow a certain milk route. They are found mostly among women and children, or at least among those who use milk in its raw state.

It is practically impossible to isolate the typhoid bacillus from a suspected sample of milk and it is even more difficult to find signs of dangerous contamination by laboratory methods. Many milk-borne epidemics are traced to "carriers," convalescents, or "walking" cases who have had some part in handling milk.

The first thing to be done in controlling an epidemic is to determine the source of infection. Dairies should be inspected, food handlers examined and the milk ordered pasteurized. Each and

every case of typhoid fever comes somewhere from some previous case. Typhoid fever never rises spontaneously.

No person should handle foods who has recently had typhoid or who is a typhoid carrier. Washing the hands before handling food and before eating is not a fact. It is the best of common sense and prudence. Nobody should eat without washing the hands.

Boil your drinking water and your milk unless you are sure that the supply is pure.
