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LIFE TERMER IS SUING FOR LIBEL

BOSTON, Jan. 6.—Jesse Pomeroy, world famous "lifer" who entered the state prison at Charlestown, a 17 year old boy, nearly 61 years ago, is the plaintiff in a \$5,000 action in which he seeks to prove untrue charges that he has been cruel to animals while in confinement.

Pomeroy remains in his cell while two attorneys represent him before the Suffolk superior civil court.

The defendant is Alice Stone Blackwell, of Dorchester, publisher of a magazine for women, who as the first witness in the case told the court that "she felt it a public duty" to write a letter to a Boston newspaper in 1925 in opposition to a pardon for Pomeroy.

The letter described Pomeroy's crime as much worse than that of Leopold and Loeb and repeated that Pomeroy, when allowed the companionship of a kitten, "had skinned it alive."

Miss Blackwell has long been prominent as a leader in women's movements. She is a daughter of the celebrated Lucy Stone, suffragist.
