

LOMSKI LOSES IN CLOSE FIGHT WITH LOUGHRAN

Knocks Champion Down Twice During the First Round

(Associated Press Telex Wire)

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Tommy Loughran continued to hold sway over the light heavyweight domain today by virtue of a decision after a fierce struggle in which Leo Lomski, of Aberdeen, Wash., twice had the pride of Philadelphia on the floor.

Two battering fists, packed with dynamite, knocked Loughran down twice for the count of nine in the first round of a 16-round title engagement in Madison Square Garden last night while a packed patronage of 15,000 enthusiasts roared at the prospective crowning of a new champion.

But a courageous heart and ring mastery served the Philadelphia well, tiding him over the bad start and eventually enabling him to wear Lomski down in ten of the remaining rounds to take the decision and retain the title.

As Loughran said afterwards, it was the most vicious battle of his career and he had to call upon all the science of his trade to pull him thru. The knockdowns were the first scored against Loughran since he was floored by Gene Tunney in a bout at Philadelphia five years ago.

Lomski waged a furious battle, tiring somewhat in the closing stanzas. Loughran ripped a solid right to Lomski's head in the eighth round which opened a cut under Lomski's left eye. The wound bled freely and slowed up the challenger's attack.

Loughran, who won the light heavyweight title by whipping the venerable Mick McTigue last fall, successfully defended the standard against Jimmy Slattery, of Buffalo, N. Y., about a month ago.

SENSATION IS SPRUNG TODAY IN PROBE OF S-4

Commander Coast Guard Destroyer Is Named Defendant

TESTIMONY HARMFUL

Breaks Comes During Explanation of Baylis Concerning Speed Near Crash Scene

BOSTON, Jan. 7.—A sensation was sprung in the navy's investigation of the S-4 disaster today when Rear Admiral Richard H. Jackson, president of the naval court of inquiry, named Lieutenant Commander John S. Baylis, commander of the coast guard destroyer Paulding, which sank the S-4 in collision, as a defendant. Commander Baylis at the time was on the stand as a witness.

Commander Baylis said he had been twenty-six years of sea service and had been in command of vessels since 1919.

He said that on December 17 the Paulding was searching an assigned area in the regular duties of the coast guard service. No speed limit had been specified.

"The ordinary cruising speed of the Paulding is 18 knots," the witness said. "I considered that speed necessary to cover the outer line of my area and examine the approaches to some of the harbors before dark."

The witness said that it was required to have a special lookout stationed on the bridge in hazy or foggy weather and also at night. On the bridge was the office of the deck, a junior officer, quartermaster and wheelman. The commanding officer was always on the bridge as well, during patrol. The sky was overcast and the sea was rough with an easterly swell.

The break came while the coast guard commander was being questioned as to his familiarity with the operation of submarines in the waters along the north Atlantic coast.

After he had replied to several questions put by Commander Leslie E. Bratton, judge advocate, the witness was stopped by Admiral Jackson, who said: "Evidence has now been introduced that will have the effect of making you a defendant before this court. It is the duty of the president of the court to inform you that testimony has been introduced which established you

legally as a defendant before the court.

The judge advocate had asked Commander Baylis what knowledge he had of submarines operating submerged in these waters. The answer was:

"Until the time we had the collision with the S-4 when she emerged suddenly on our port bow, I never saw a submarine operating submerged in these waters."

Commander Reinburg asked that the court adjourn for the rest of the day to enable him to confer with his client. He said the action of the presiding officer had seriously changed the status of Commander Baylis.

"It involves the entire coast guard," Commander Baylis said. Just before the court arose Admiral Jackson said that the decision he had made was a normal proceeding and involved nothing new or novel in such inquiries.

ARCHITECT HAS PLAN

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE OF C. OF C. MEETS GREAT SUCCESS

Renewals Secured at Higher Rate and Many New Members Being Secured by Solicitors.

The Chamber of Commerce membership drive, which has been in progress for the past three days has been exceptionally encouraging, according to statements made by officers of the organization. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 7.—The death of Dr. Alvin C. Kraenzlein, one of the greatest athletes of his time, at the comparatively early age of 61 and from a heart affection, has caused many to ask whether the heart was injured in athletic efforts.

Kraenzlein, whose feat of winning three firsts and one second place in the 1900 intercollegiate track and field championships, has never been equalled, died yesterday in a Wilkes-Barre, Pa., hospital from endocarditis, or inflammation of the membrane of the heart.

DICKERING WITH TUNNEY FOR FIGHT

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—More than three weeks ahead of the zero hour, on February 1, when Gene Tunney's contract with Tex Rickard is scheduled to start developing, A. J. Cermak set out today to dickering with Tunney for a match in Chicago next June 30.

Cermak was associated with him in the venture much the same as he was for Mayor William Hale Thompson and George Getz, that nut over the \$2,600,000 Soldier Field fight last September.

The name of Jack Delaney is the only one bandied around here as Tunney's probable opponent, but Jim Maloney, the promoter who will handle the matchmaking, if any, said today it was too early to talk of the party of the second part. Boxing experts after reading the scathing criticism of Jack Dempsey by Paul Frohn, new chairman of the Illinois state athletic commission, were of the opinion that Dempsey would not be considered.

WEATHER DURING MONTH DECEMBER NEAR AVERAGE

December was a very average month from the weather standpoint, according to the monthly report filed by Arthur W. Pugh, local meteorologist. Temperatures during the month ranged from 63 degrees to 27 degrees, these being the extremes reached. The mean maximum was 44.8 and the minimum 33.3, or a daily average of 39 degrees, as compared with a normal of 41.9 degrees. Rainfall for the month totaled 8.39 inches, as compared with a normal of 5.82 leaving a deficit of 2.57 inches for the season. The average hourly wind velocity throughout the month was 2.2 degrees with a maximum velocity of 13 miles per hour. There were four clear days, 14 partly cloudy, 19 cloudy and 13 upon which precipitation was recorded.
