SALVATION ARMY IS MAKING PLEA FOR MORE MONEY

The Salvation Army is in this week conducting a campaign to secure additional funds to carry on its work in this city. While this organization is included in the Community Chest budget, the failure to secure the full amount fixed as a goal by the chest this year leaves the Salvation Army without sufficient funds to carry on its activities. Many people have expressed a willingness to give an additional sum to help in this worthy cause and permission has been obtained by the officials of the organization to carry on an extra campaign, which will continue throughout the present week. With the money raised by the community chest, the Salvation Army receives only \$25 per week, making it plainly evident that there can be no continuance of the activities in Roseburg unless additional funds are forthcoming.

The following report is a copy of the summary of December's activities as reported to the treasurer of the Community Chest by Lieutenant Thos. McGowan, who is in charge of the local post, showing the work carried on in one month by the local Salvation Army workers, and demonstrating the actual need for more money: Income: total collections, \$9.54; profits on trade, crys., etc., \$2.50; Y. P. work, \$3.35; Xmas' effort,

\$35.23; Community Chest, \$25; total, \$76.62; balance from last month, \$11.60; grand total, \$88.22. Expenditure: Rent for hall, \$15; divisional fund, \$7.22; O. S. B. & B. fund, \$36; light, heat, water, \$1.00; salary O. O., \$9.50; trade profits C. O., \$2.50; expense Y. P. work, \$3.35; other expense, \$15.79; relief expense, \$27.14; total, \$81.86; balance at close of month, \$6.36; grand total, \$88.22.

Relief statistics: Number supplied with meals, 82; number garments given away, 167; number pairs of shoes given, 6; number persons given garments and shoes, 56; total number afforded temporary relief, 125; number persons given lodging, 5; number persons interviewed and advised, 92; number families relieved by any means, 30; number persons in families relieved, 114; total value of all relief given, \$232.50.

REQUEST TO BUILD GRADE CROSSING IS DENIED LUMBER CO.

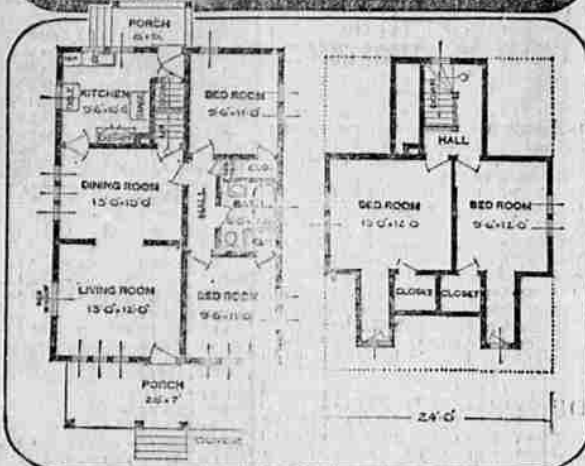

BODY OF DENNIS WEBB FOUND IN BAY SATURDAY

MARSHFIELD, Jan. 9.—Through a dream of a North Bend youth, the body of Dennis Webb, 26, of Roseburg, who was drowned November 29th when his car went off the North Bend municipal dock at the foot of Virginia street, was found at 9:30 Saturday morning by Rudy Whittick. The body was floating under the wharf of the Stout Mill A. After discovering the body he notified Coroner Phil Kelzer.

The body of Mrs. Webb has not been found yet. Rudy Whittick went out alone this morning searching for the bodies after dreaming last night that the bodies were under the Stout mill wharf. He had helped in the search on the first day after which the thought had haunted him that the bodies must have lodged under a wharf. Feeling uneasy about the whole thing last night he went to sleep having the thought on his mind. His dream was realized when he found the one body this morning.

Mr. Whittick is well known in North Bend being employed by Matt Klockars on the pile driver. The body was taken to the Peterson Funeral Home in North Bend but was beyond identification after being in the water so long. The man was clad in a blue serge suit and a pocket knife, watch and chain and a leather belt with a silver buckle were on his person. The watch had stopped at 8:25 which Coroner Kelzer considers the best clue for identification as Webb and his wife left the hospital shortly after eight o'clock on the evening of their disappearance. Dr. A. K. Harris who examined Mr. Webb that evening said that he was wearing a dark suit but that he did not notice the color.

The body of his wife, Delle Webb, who was with her husband on the fateful night has not yet been found. Whittick and a number of other men began a search for her body shortly after finding the first one.

REEDSPORT TO VOTE BONDS FOR WATER SYSTEM

Negotiations have been completed by which the city of Reedport may secure a loan of \$25,000 from state funds with which to repair and extend their present water system, providing, however, that the voters will allow a bond issue to cover the amount, according to John H. Austin, chairman of the finance committee, says the Port Umpqua Courier.

The bonds which are to be authorized by the voters will be sold at par, the first time in the history of the city that such has been the case. Immediately following the authorization of the issue, the money will be forthcoming and immediate construction on the water system is to begin. This means that just as soon as the finance committee secures the bonds the committee will secure the \$25,000 to expend upon the system. At the present time the water system is in a deplorable condition, due to the floods made upon the pipes because of the tide water.

A special election is to be called to present the matter before the people at the earliest possible moment. It is imperative that action be taken at once as the present system is badly in need of repair. Those who appeared before the state board last Friday were J. H. Austin, Fred Varelmann, J. R. Browne and Mayor C. McC. Johnson.

The water is conducted to the city users in wooden pipes and the portion in the fill of the city has been broken down and has caused undue loss to industries and citizens. It is contemplated to replace with steel pipe.

MOUNTAIN GIRL IS OPERA SINGER

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—When a girl from the Tennessee mountains appears on the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House February 7, the New Year will have seen two more native singers added to the role of those who have achieved that much sought goal. Miss Dreda Ayres of Galveston, Texas, made her first appearance before a critical audience in a Sunday night concert, singing the title role of Verdi's "Aida."

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MAC SMITH WINS LOS ANGELES OPEN

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9.—MacDonald Smith, Great Neck, Long Island, and golfing stylist, is \$1,000 richer and the possessor of the \$10,000 Los Angeles open crown. Spraying the difficult Wilshire Country Club course yesterday with brilliant and steady golf to run up final round scores of 69 and 71, Smith led an imposing field of national professional and amateur stars well behind him and came home with a final card of 284. His previous rounds read 74 and 70.

"Lighthouse" Harry Cooper, former Dallas, Texas, pro and now of Los Angeles, faltered slightly yesterday to take 75 in the morning round, but for a time led the early finishers when he toured the final 18 holes in masterful fashion for one below par 70. His
