PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—Prices on the higher grades of eggs are easier today with stand-

ard extras a cent lower at 36 cents and standard firsts down 2 cents to 34 cents. Other grades are unchanged. Receipts yesterday were light and storage stocks were reduced 273 cases.

Butter is steady with the exception of prime firsts which are quoted 1 cent higher at 45 cents. Storage holdings decreased yesterday 6,282 pounds.

An easier tone is noticeable in the country dressed meat department along the wholesale way here today as a result of increased receipts yesterday. Prices are firm, however, with the exception of pork which is down 1 cent at 13¢ 13½ for choice light hogs.

Oregon yellow danvers onions are still inclined upwards, with bids to growers ranging as high as \$2.25 for No. 1's. Movement so far has been nominal, however, as stocks on hand here have been sufficient to supply local demand. POPE DEMANDS ENTIRE ACCORD WITH HIS FAITH

Dissenters Cannot Return to Catholic Church on Limited Belief.

ENCYCLICAL ISSUED

Cultivation of Christian Charity Opposed When Detrimental to Its Basic Tenets.

ROME, Jan. 10.—Pope Pius today issued an encyclical which was taken here to remove all hopes concerning the possibility of the resumption of the famous "Malines conversations" of recent years, which sought to find a means of reuniting the Anglicans with Rome.

The later Cardinal Mercier, archbishop of Malines, Lord Halifax of England and other prelates and laymen took part in these conversations.

The pontiff, in his encyclical, said that a union of Christians can only come by a return of the dissenting element to the original church of Rome.

In the document, which is the first encyclical of the New Year, the pontiff restated the church's long-standing position on the question, emphasizing that while it is good to cultivate charity among Christians, it should not be done to the detriment of the faith upon which that very charity is founded.

The document concludes with a refutation of various non-Catholic theses in favor of the unionist thesis and says that union cannot be achieved except by a return of non-Catholics to the church of Rome.

It concludes with an appeal to the "separated sons" and with the wish that the day may come soon in which "all the erring will finally return to the paternal embrace of the successor of St. Peter."

Opposes Partial Accord

However, the pope says, those who separated deny this unity of faith and the government of the real church of Christ and would therefore prefer a union by means of an accord on a few points which they regard as "fundamental" and as to the rest each one would obtain his own opinions from which they in other times separated from the church.

That, continues the pontiff, is leading truth into error and into bargains and human transactions which would be treacherous and which the Roman church has always resisted and necessarily continues to resist.

Faith Before Charity

The Roman church, the encyclical continues, proposes one clear entire evangelical doctrine for all, since God has not spoken for a few but for everyone. Certainly, it is a good thing to cultivate charity between Christians, the encyclical says, but not to the detriment of the faith upon which that very charity was founded.

The pontiff concludes: "It is impossible for Christ's disciples to differ among themselves on the verity of their faith. It is impossible to conceive of a Christian society of faithful who are free to follow each one his own way of thinking of faith."

ROME, Jan. 10.—Pope Pius in an important encyclical issue today, deals at length with the question of a possible union of Christians whatever may be the particular form of their religion.

After recognizing the general contemporary tendency towards better international union between peoples, the pontiff deplores the fact that some seem to wish to transfer it from the political to the religious field, "thus blending the true religion with the false," holding all religions to be equally good and praiseworthy.

Under the appearance of doing good, the pontiff continues, some people promote a fallacious religious unity among Christians, especially those calling themselves "Pan-Christians," tending to "uproot the very foundations of the Catholic faith."

Against such "pernicious error" the pontiff calls the attention of all bishops in order that they may warn their flocks and clear up the principle of the real religious union to be promoted.

"God the Creator," says the pontiff, "is also the revealer to man of the way in which He wishes to be honored and served. That is the real religion for which He founded His church on earth. The duty of the human being therefore is to believe God's revelation and consequently to adhere to the church; but not that which is supported by erring on the contrary to that church which in verity was willed and founded by Christ and which by the promise of Christ's own assistance perseveres as one and identical throughout the centuries, namely the Catholic Apostolic Roman Church."
