MAN IS KILLED BY ESPEE TRAIN

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 9.—Harry H. Haskins, 70, was killed instantly at 11:30 Sunday morning when the engine of the northbound Cascade Limited train, of the Southern Pacific struck him near N. train.

Haskins was walking to town with a basket of eggs and witnesses said that he walked in front of the approaching train at a grade crossing, apparently neither seeing or hearing it. He lived alone and is said to have three brothers, Charles, Henry and Thomas Haskins, in Baker, and a stepson in Eugene. Coroner Branstetter, who investigated, said the accident was unavoidable on the part of the trainmen.

SIX MEMBERS OF FAMILY BURNED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 9.—Death of six members of a family of nine, in a fire early yesterday morning at a ranch house in the Pacific district near here, came as one of the most gruesome week-end tragedies in central California. Those who lost their lives were K. Ivoska, 48, vineyardist, his wife, two sons and two daughters. Three other children tried ineffectively to rescue their parents, brothers and sisters.

Another meeting is to be called at Eugene in about a week to complete the constitution and by-laws. Local organizations are to be formed in each county headed by a county committee.

Attending the Albany meeting were veterans from all parts of western Oregon, including Portland. The council claims to be independent of all existing patriotic organizations, most of which bar political activity.

SAMMY FIGHTS TONIGHT

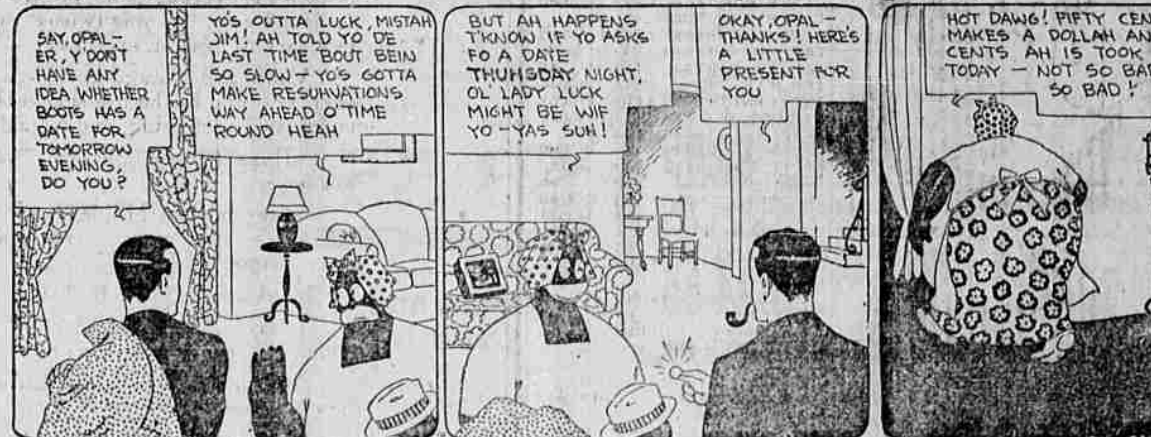
