NICARAGUAN'S QUELL REVOLT IN SHORT TIME

Loyal Guardsmen in Control
of Situation Marines
Announce.

PLANE IS WRECKED

Marine Aviators Uninjured
as Ship Crashes to the
Ground and Bursts
Into Flames.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 11.—A short lived revolt in Somotillo, department of Chinandega, was ended by loyal Nicaraguan national guardsmen and they were in control of the situation today, marine corps headquarters announced.

The revolt followed the desertion of a number of members of the national guard, inspired, according to marine headquarters, by followers of the rebel general Augustino Sando.

A marine detachment was sent to Somotillo when it was reported the whole town was in revolt. While they were on their way the cheering word was received at headquarters that loyal troops had gained control of the town.

Colonel Louis Mason Gulick, in command of the marines in Nicaragua, said that about six guards and a sergeant had deserted under persuasion of the Honduran rebel general Porras.

A marine corps plane engaged on a photographic mission crashed yesterday near Trinidad, midway between Managua and Quilich. It was the second crash in two days. Marine headquarters said that both planes were old machines of a type now being superseded.

The machine burst into flames when it hit the ground and was destroyed. The pilot and photographer were not injured.

Marines killed a man on trial for murder at Bluefields when he attempted to escape. P. Escobar, the accused man, dashed away as a marine corps lieutenant started to lock him up in prison on his return from the court house.

When his command to stop went unheeded, the lieutenant fired and hit Escobar in the left shoulder. Two enlisted marines then opened fire and Escobar fell mortally wounded.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 11.—Rebels attempting a concentration four miles north of Quilich in the province of Nueva Segovia yesterday were attacked by a United States marine plane commanded by Major Ross E. Powell. Nine of the rebels were killed and three wounded.

United States marines occupy Quilich and a careful watch for an attempt of Sando forces to make a sudden raid led to the discovery of the rebel contingents assembling from various quarters for a possible assault of the town. Flying over the groups, Powell dropped bombs and dispersed them. He said he might have done much more damage, had he so desired.

Colonel Mason Gulick, in command of the marines in Nicaragua, declared today that planes would be sent out regularly to bomb the rebels when and wherever they appeared.

TOM HEENEY IS HOPING TO GET WHACK AT CROWN

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The possibility of a fight with Gene Tunney in London for the heavy-weight championship damaged today by Tom Heene's busy hope of the British empire, in Tex Rickard's never-ending hunt for title material. Heene, who left his plumbing tools "down under" in New Zealand to fight his way into a bout with Jack Sharkey, would like nothing better than the match now drifting about in the back of the promoter's mind. First, of course, he must dispose of the loquacious pug from Boston in a 12-round match in Madison Square Garden Friday night. Betting odds are 5 to 1 that he won't, but none have been made within Tom's hearing.

"Bimby," said Heene as he perched on the edge of a ruffling table, trading around over, and stroked his square, bristly chin at the prospect. "Now I'll have the whip Sharkey for a fact."

The curly-headed, blue-eyed giant appeared today to have more than a possibility of facing

a "home" crowd some time next summer in the Wembley Stadium just outside of London, and the hope came straight from Tex Rickard.

"All England needs to gain such a match is courage and a willingness to cooperate," Tex said. With him was Bernard Mortimer, London fight promoter, who assured Rickard that the site was available, that the Olympic season propitious and that financial backing would be forthcoming as soon as he returned to Great Britain. There was also an indication that Heene needed only to make a stirring fight against Sharkey to arouse consideration of a match abroad with Jack Dempsey, who toured Europe in triumph several years ago. Mortimer, who unveiled Joe Beckett, believes that Dempsey, even without the title, would draw as well in England as Tunney.

Heene, 28 years old, stretched out on his rubber table—a stubby-armed but brawny chunk of bone and muscle, 198 pounds in weight. Fighting, he said, came down to him through his dad, another huge fellow, who still acts as engineer in a brewery in Glenburn, New England, where Tom and four husky brothers "grew up battling."

Heene's first experience with trained fighters came during a 15-month enlistment in a New Zealand rifle brigade of the war period. After his discharge, Tom soon "wore out" the amateur heavyweights of Gisborne—"there weren't many in a town of 14,000," he explained—and was certified for professional status by the island boxing authorities. Only the best amateurs are allowed to turn professional in New Zealand.

Several years of professional campaigning brought Heene the championship of New Zealand, South Africa, Australia and Ireland. A year ago, Tom invaded America to beat Jack Demaree, Johnny Rizzo and Bud Gorman; score a knockout over Jim McInerney, and draw with Paulino Uzcudun after losing a 10-round decision to the Spaniard.

Rizzo's left hook—"that curls around your right hand no matter how you defend"—was the most powerful weapon Tom said he faced. Uzcudun was the "toughest" opponent.

ROGER HORNSBY GOES IN TRADE TO BOSTON CLUB

Deal Stunning Surprise and
Was Unexpected by
the Player.

STRENGTHENS TEAM

Only Reason Given for
Trade Is That McGraw
Wants to Bolster
Up Braves.

(Associated Press Special Wire)

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Roger Hornsby was traded to the Boston Braves, "in order to avoid any future conflict in the management of the club and for no other reason," Charles A. Stoneham, president of the New York Giants, said today in explaining the sensational baseball deal, announced last night by which the Giants sent Hornsby to the Braves for Catcher Hogan and Outfielder Welch.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Roger Hornsby, captain of the New York Giants and the biggest star in the National league, has gone in a lightning trade to the Boston Braves.

The deal came as a stunning sur-

prise to baseball circles and was equally unexpected by Hornsby, who at his hotel, first said: "I cannot believe it."

In return for Hornsby, who is the National league's highest salaried player at a reported sum of \$40,000 a year, the Giants receive Catcher Francis Hogan and Jimmy Welsh, an outfielder, both virtually unknown. They are just ordinary players. No cash was involved.

A brief statement signed by President Charles A. Stoneham and Manager John J. McGraw said the trade was made "for the best interest of the club."

Hornsby made a brilliant showing as acting manager of the Giants during the closing days of the 1927 race during McGraw's illness, driving the team into a commanding position for the pennant.

The only plausible explanation of the deal appeared to be a desire on the part of the Giants to bolster a weak member of the National league. The Braves have been battling around the cellar of the circuit for the past few years and the patronage dropped at an alarming rate in Boston.

After receiving a telegram from Judge Emilio Fuchs, owner of the Braves, telling him of the deal, Hornsby said it didn't make any difference to him whether he was with the Braves or any other club, however, Hornsby was puzzled over the "best interests" action of the Giants' announcement and declared he didn't believe McGraw was responsible for that part of the statement.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 11.—Answering the statement of Charles A. Stoneham, president of the New York Giants, Rogers Hornsby said today there never had been a word of controversy between himself and Manager John McGraw and he never contemplated getting the management of the Giants.
