CRUDE RUBBER CARGO IS BURNED

DR. KERR BANS PEACE LECTURE OF KIRBY PAGE

Prominent Author Says He Was Not Allowed to Talk at O. S. C.

BUCK WAS PASSED

Pacifist Leader Declares Military Authorities Conspired to Prevent His Address.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 11.—Kirby Page, who addressed university students here last night on "the outlawry of war," discovered the day before that the discussion of peace had been outlawed at Oregon State College.

"The question of peace cannot be discussed on the campus there," said this prominent author on international problems after the intervention of President Kerr of O. S. C. had resulted in the cancellation of his engagement. The entire affair was carried off very quietly, said Mr. Page. Students were simply told that the noon campus meeting sponsored by the Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. campus groups had been cancelled. No explanation was made to the would-be audience.

"When I came west," Mr. Page explained in relating the suppression incident at Corvallis last Monday, "I allowed ten days for the coast engagements to be scheduled at the discretion of the Y. M. C. A. leaders in Portland. Oregon State requested three of these convocations and they were all arranged. The first one on Monday was off the campus. The noon meeting, to be held in the campus tea room, was never held."

Aware of the attitude of the convocation committee, of which Colonel George William Messershead of the Oregon state military department, is an influential member, further attempts to have the eminent pacifist leader reach the students were discontinued by the sponsoring organizations. All that is actually known of the restrictive proceedings on the part of the college officials was gleaned by Mr. Page from his associates there.

"Three days ago President Kerr called up the chairman of the advisory committee in charge of the program and referred to my West Virginia university lecture which was barred by military officials last month. He further told the chairman that I was a radical socialist, and also he did not flatly refuse me the right to speak, he seemed very nervous about the consequences if it were allowed. The president's suggestions to the advisory committee, as nearly as I could discover, 'You handle the matter.'"

The chairman of the advisory group accepted the buck so passed him, Page went on to tell, and then discreetly buried it.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 11.—Officials of Oregon State Agricultural College did not deny Kirby Page, peace advocate an editor of "The World Tomorrow," right to speak on the campus Monday, inquiry revealed today. Page, at Eugene last night, was quoted as saying that he had been barred from speaking on the campus.

Page was scheduled by campus Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. organizations for three meetings in this city, including a noon luncheon in the college tea room with a small group of students.

The Y. M. C. A. advisory board members recommended cancelling the noon meeting following rumors of protest from undetermined origin which came in the absence of the "Y" secretary and too late for investigation by the administration.

Page spoke to students, faculty and townsmen at an evening banquet, and at a night meeting in the largest city church.

In recent years they have been making their home in Umpqua Park. Both are religiously inclined and Mrs. McConnell, in particular, is an active church worker.

HEARST PAPERS JUST PURE FAKE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Branded as spurious the Hearst documents which named four United States senators as proposed beneficiaries of a Mexican slush fund, Chairman Reed of the special investigating committee informed the senate today that he suspected Miguel Avila, who procured the material for the Hearst papers, of having manufactured them.

WELL KNOWN S. P. EMPLOYEE IS DEAD

William Alexander Campbell, who died at Mercy hospital late Monday afternoon after suffering from injuries from a fall while on duty at the Southern Pacific shops the day previous, was born near Springfield, Mo., April 25, 1865. He was united in marriage to Minnie Harrison on February 11, 1886 and to this union three children were born, one dying in infancy.

Last fall Mr. Campbell traded his property on Mill street in this city for Dixonville land and his wife and son moved to that place. He had been continuing his duties in the employ of the Southern Pacific company, of which he had been an employee for the past six years. Mr. Campbell was a member of local Shopcraft. He was well known in Roseburg and had a wide circle of friends here. Surviving are his wife and son, Chester G. Campbell, of Dixonville, a daughter, Mrs. Eula Ratcliffe of Dalhart, Texas; one brother, Dr. M. E. Campbell, of Abilene, Texas; a sister, Mrs. Ella Lipe, of Bellview, Texas. The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral Home and arrangements for the funeral will be made as soon as the relatives arrive from Texas.

LACK OF THANKSGIVING VACATION IMPROVES THE HEALTH OF STUDENTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 11.—Although the students of the University of Oregon were profuse in their complaints when the school officials banned the Thanksgiving holidays, there has been a very noticeable decrease in the amount of sickness for the fall term, according to the University health service.

Usually following vacations there is a period when the infirmity and dispensary are quite rushed. General Thanksgiving dinners, combined with occasional late hours, and rides in study trains, cause a drop in student health immediately upon return to the campus. The rush was lacking this year, it is declared by Dr. Fred N. Miller, University physician.

In the dispensary the number of cases after Thanksgiving compared to those before Thanksgiving was 89 per cent, while last year it was 92 per cent. Thus a gain of 3 per cent was shown in these cases, and the consequences also were not so serious as last year. It is said, "The Thanksgiving vacation was dispensed with last November due to the danger of infantile paralysis contagion. No cases of the disease have appeared on the campus."

PRESERVE THE KNEES

That's advice to women and girls by pediatricists. The Philadelphia Pediatric society was told last night by Dr. J. Torrance Rugh that the wearing of high heeled shoes causes the foot to assume an unnatural position with the result that the muscles and bones are thrown out of balance. When that happens, he said, the knees become less stable, the knee action becomes much less secure and fatigue results.
