It is necessary to secure about 100 new members in order to retain the branch office in Roseburg, and as this office is a very important factor every effort will be put forth to secure the needed names.

Present members of the association have been well satisfied with the services furnished by the organization, which provides tire changes for lady drivers on the highway, delivery of gasoline to cars stalled on the road, towing service for a distance of 10 miles, legal service, court bail and general service to the members. In addition to the benefits to the individual members the association does a very important work in directing tourist traffic, providing road information, furnishing maps and recreational circulars, making roads and highways and giving assistance to prospective settlers.

This activity is of great importance to any community and Roseburg has been very fortunate in being able to maintain a branch office of the association enabling a closer contact with the numerous tourists passing through this section of the state.

TWO BANK BANDITS SHOT AND KILLED

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 12.—Two unidentified men, who are said to have forced their way into the First State Bank of Rankin, Upton county, Texas, were shot and killed at 4 o'clock this morning by officers, who had been tipped off that the bank was to be robbed.

Sheriff O. Barfield and two deputies, Clarence Shannon and Hugh Gillespie, drew the fire of one man as they approached the bank after watching one of the men force the door. Officers returned the fire and their attacker fled dead. The other man, the elder of the two, fled but was dropped by gunfire and died within a few minutes, officers said.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH HOLDS QUARTERLY BUSINESS MEETING

The quarterly business meeting of the Christian church was held last night with an exceptionally fine attendance. The reports were received showing the various departments of the congregation to be very active, while the financial report disclosed a balance in the treasury of each organization connected with the church. The spiritual work of the church was also given a good report, showing 19 additions since the beginning of the ministry of W. R. Baird, the new pastor, who recently came from Santa Cruz, Cal.

The congregation is greatly enthused over the prospect of soon moving into their new building, which is rapidly nearing completion. Practically all details connected with the building have now been taken care of and it is expected that the structure will be ready for occupancy by the first of April. Plans are being made to hold an evangelistic campaign when the new building is opened.

MANY UNIVERSITY STUDENTS BENEFIT FROM LOAN PLAN

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Students at the University of Oregon received \$5,535 through the student loan fund during the fall term, it is announced here by officials administering the loan.

Of the fifty students using the fund, twenty-two were men, borrowing the sum of \$2,090 as compared with 27 women, borrowing \$2,735. The average loan to each man was \$127.27, and to each woman \$94.13.

The amount of loans outstanding on January 1, 1928, totaled \$27,485.46. \$16,815.10 was paid back into the fund during the last three months of 1927.

Loans are granted to sophomores and upper classmen at a rate of 5 per cent interest. To date, it is stated, the loan fund has never suffered a loss.

BODIES ARE IDENTIFIED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—The Navy department today announced the identification of the bodies recovered from the submarine S-4 yesterday. They include:

1. Lieutenant Donald Weller, Los Angeles; Donald Fred L. Goening, electrician's mate Vallejo, California; Rudolph James Rose, electrician's mate, Alberta, Canada.

With the recovery and identification of the fifteen bodies there remained in the S-4 today the six bodies in the torpedo room, the names of which are known.

USING THE PRUNE FOR A MILK-SHAKE

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 12.—A new market for California prunes was seen by agriculturists here today with the announcement that Professor W. V. Cruess, of the University of California, working in connection with the California Prune and Apricot Growers association, had succeeded in producing a prune milk shake. It is expected that this new creation will become one of the "best sellers" in malted milk shops throughout the country.

EDUCATORS WILL BROADCAST TALKS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Instruction of leading educational authorities of the country will be available to universities and schools throughout the country by radio through a new service to be incorporated into the program of the National Broadcasting company, and affiliated stations.

Announcement of the feature, made by M. H. Aylesworth, president of the company before the board of governors of the general federation of women's clubs, said three test programs would be broadcast, the first to be presented by Walter Damrosch, New York, on the night of January 21.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12.—Butter prices are a trifle easier on the dairy exchange today with extras quoted 1/2 cent lower at 46 cents. Other grades are quoted the same as yesterday. Storage holdings decreased 6,101 pounds yesterday.

Eggs are unchanged with weaker undertone noticeable in the market. Dealers expect moderate declines on quotations in all grades later in the week and early next week.

County dressed meats are firm for the most part on local wholesale markets except for hogs which are decidedly weaker. The market is druggery and best light hogs were bringing 13 cents top this morning.

Beef, veal and lamb are steady to strong with prospect of advancing prices in beef due to high prices prevailing in eastern markets. Beef is moving around 22 1/2 cents, veal at 19 1/2 cents, and lamb at 23 1/4 cents with demand good.

In the poultry division prices remain strong with live white pekin ducks bringing unusually high prices. There appears to be a temporary shortage of ducks and available stock in good demand around 25 1/2 cents alive which approximates the usual range for dressed birds. There is also good demand for heavy young tom turkeys which are moving at 35 cents dressed. Young hens are bringing 30 1/2 cents. Chickens are steady with upward tendency in prices for springs.

Fruit and vegetable markets continue steady with onions holding the chief interest on account of the wide range in prices offered growers. It was reported yesterday that buyers were offering as high as \$2.40 for U. S. No. 1 grade Oregon yellow danvers in some localities. Most sales by growers, however, have been around \$2.25. Presence of California buyers is given as the reason for the price advance coupled with the recent severe weather which prevented shipments for nearly ten days.
