SOVIETS DECLARE
DEATH SENTENCE
FOR POPE PIUS

MOSCOW, Jan. 17.—The Soviet news agency Tass today stated reports published in foreign countries that the vatican had received notification of a "sentence of death" passed by the Soviet government on Pope Pius, and alleged to have been signed by Stalin, are totally unfounded and regarded as a "malignant joke."

Dispatches from Rome on January 12 quoted the newspapers Brilliante as saying that a "condemnation" of Pope Pius had arrived at the vatican in the form of a registered letter from Moscow, but no mention was made of a "sentence of death" in the above dispatch.

Brilliante said that the condemnation of the pontiff was for having "favored an anti-Bolshevik movement with funds."

The document, the paper said, was signed by higher personages.
