UMPUQUA RIVER
LISTED GREAT
POWER STREAM

One River Alone Has More
Resources Than More
Than Half of States.

TWENTY-TWO SITES

Geological Survey Estimates Potential Power
of River at 216,000
Horsepower.

In a statement just issued by the department of the interior through the geological survey, the Umpqua river basin possesses huge potential power resources, exceeding those of any one of more than half of the states. Despite this wonderful power possibility, the statement says, there is only one small developed site in the entire basin, that being at Winchester. Proposed power sites at Rock creek, Boundary, Toketee Falls and one on Clearwater creek, a tributary of the North Umpqua, are being investigated by the California Oregon Power company under a permit from the federal power commission.

Twenty-two power sites are proposed for the Umpqua and North Umpqua rivers, the statement says, and continues as follows:

The estimated potential power at these sites without storage amounts to 216,000 horsepower for 90 per cent of the time and 477,000 horsepower for 50 per cent of the time. With storage, it is 213,000 horsepower for 90 per cent of the time and 460,000 horsepower for 50 per cent of the time. If all plants were operated as one system, a minimum output of about 350,000 horsepower could be obtained in an ordinary year. In 1924, under the assumed conditions of operation, a minimum output of 287,000 horsepower could have been obtained. These estimates of potential power with storage assume that the Perdue and Days Creek reservoirs on South Umpqua river would also be built.

Fifteen power sites are proposed on South Umpqua river at Fish Lake creek, including the two proposed reservoirs at Perdue and Days Creek. The total potential power at these sites without storage amounts to 8,300 horsepower for 90 per cent of the time and 61,000 horsepower for 50 per cent of the time. With storage, these figures can be increased to 369,000 horsepower for 90 per cent of the time and 561,000 horsepower for 50 per cent of the time. With unified operation the power available 90 per cent of the time could be increased in an average year to over 400,000 horsepower, of which 350,000 horsepower would be developed on Umpqua and North Umpqua rivers, 17,000 horsepower on Clearwater river, and 9,000 horsepower on Mill creek.

The geological survey has collected the fundamental data for the basin, such as records of stream flow and river surveys, and these have been supplemented by a field examination by B. E. Jones, hydraulic engineer, and H. T. Stearns, geologist, who have assembled and analyzed the data in a manuscript report. This report may be examined at the geological survey, Washington, D. C., or at the district office of the geological survey, Post Office building, Portland, Oregon.

REVISED FARM
RELIEF BILL TO
BE GIVEN HEARING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The revised McNary-Haugen bill will be the basis of farm relief discussions by the house agricultural committee, it was decided today at the first meeting of that committee to consider farm proposals made in both house and senate.

A move to prevent a recurrence of previous extended hearings was made by Representative Adkins of Illinois who expressed the opinion that the committee could agree on a bill within a week. The sentiment was approved by other members of the committee with the suggestion that the present hearings be sharply curtailed by allowing testimony only from those who had new ideas or suggestions for relief. It was also suggested that priority be given to those who

PROSPERITY OF

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Declaring that he would not unfairly state the conditions of the country, Senator Robinson, the democratic leader, today challenged recent statements by President Coolidge and republican leaders, in the senate that the country is in a prosperous industrial and agricultural condition.

The Robinson speech opened the debate on the McNary resolution regarding the senate as in favor of a general revision downward in tariff rates, which is to reach a vote this afternoon.

"Living costs in the United States continue too high," the senator said, "and there is an intimate relationship between the tariff and the present condition of agriculture."

Citing the record of bank failures in recent years, Senator Robinson asked why President Coolidge and republican leaders insisted upon making prosperity "the sole issue."

"Do they believe the people of this country are so ignorant," he asked, "that they can be deceived into believing there is prosperity in the face of the facts we know?"

"It is amazing how the president and republican senators can boast of prosperity."

RANCHER FROZEN TO
DEATH NEAR HOME

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 16.—Huddled under what scanty shelter was available, the body of Carr Dalton, prominent Klamath rancher and son of W. C. Dalton, president of the American National Bank of Klamath Falls, was found one half mile from his home in Tule Lake at daybreak this morning by Ralph Yorke, Malin deputy sheriff.

Dalton had been frozen to death while walking home from a point one half mile south of Malin. A companion, whose name authorities did not learn, forged on for help when Dalton collapsed on the lonely country road at 1 a. m. today.

The companion's feet were badly frozen and he could not lead a party to where Dalton lay slowly dying as the cruel cold wind took its toll.

Dalton and a companion started by automobile from Malin to Dalton's residence on Tule Lake about midnight last night. A short distance out of the Klamath farming community their car broke down. Instead of returning to Malin the two men decided to brave the cold and walk 8 1/2 miles to the Dalton ranch.

The mercury sank to 12 below zero. The men were poorly clad. Dalton gave out first. His friend kept on.

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FAVORABLE TRADE
BALANCE FOR U. S.
IS ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—A favorable trade balance for the United States of \$681,707,000 last year was announced by the Commerce Department, which fixed exports at \$4,866,169,000 and imports at \$4,184,462,000.

Discussing the gold movement, Grosvenor Jones, chief of the department's financial section, said that in addition to taking the metal out of the United States, foreign countries had set aside about \$30,000,000 in the metal here during the last four months of 1927, meaning that foreigners exercised ownership over considerable quantities of the gold stock still left in the United States.

The final results for the year show a net reduction of about \$151,000,000 in our total gold stock. Mr. Jones said, "earmarking (setting aside) for all practical purposes tantamount to export. The bulk of the gold exported went to Latin America, Argentina taking \$62,000,000, Brazil \$34,000,000, Uruguay \$2,000,000 and Venezuela \$1,000,000.

Fairly large amounts were shipped to the Far East. During the early months of 1927, Mr. Jones added, the United States exported a great deal of gold from Great Britain and other European countries, but during the closing months this was in part returned.
