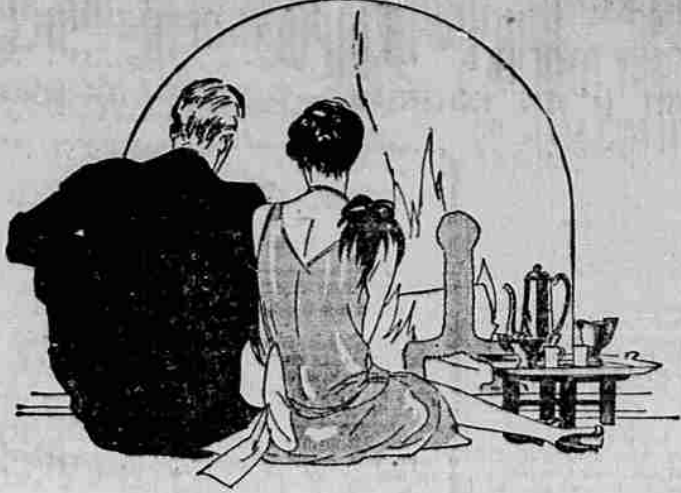

BOSTON BRAVES HAVE FINE TEAM

BOSTON, Jan. 18.—"The best baseball team we've had in the six years I have been in Boston," is the way President Emil C. Fuchs regards his 1928 Boston Braves baseball machine, which gets under way next month with a new driver at the wheel in the person of Manager Jack Slattery. At the same time an integral part of the machine destined to furnish the necessary spark to pull it out of a habitual second division is believed to have been acquired in the season's outstanding deal which brought Rogers Hornsby to Boston from the Giants to captain the 'Braves at second base.

For the rest, the squad will shape up as mostly veterans with one or two promising additions to a pitching staff which last year suffered the lack of an outstanding left-hander. Johnny Cooney, veteran southpaw who underwent an operation on his left elbow, will attempt a comeback, while among the new additions are Ed Brandt, a big left-hander from Seattle, and Art Delaney, formerly of Oakland. The veterans include Kent Greenfield, Joe Genefich, B. Smith, Charlie Robertson and Henry Wertz.

A gaping hole appears at present at the other end of the pitching alley due to the departure of Francis Hogan, last year's young but regular backstop, who went to the Giants with Outfielder Jimmy Welsh, in exchange for Hornsby. A replacement in the form of an experienced big league catcher is promised soon, however, to bolster a catching department at present headed by Luke Urban, former Boston college star who came from the Braves from the Giants.

Dick Burns, slugging first baseman who led the tribe with a .318 average last year, again is on deck, with an understudy about to be groomed in the person of big Ed Brown, a foot 2 outfielder, whose weak throwing arm, but otherwise healthy baseball attributes decided Manager Slattery in an attempt to make an infielder out of him.

With the coming of Hornsby, the Braves now consider they have a keystone combination worthy of the name. The new team captain will run things from second base and across the bag in the short-stop berth will be Eddie Farrell, last year's regular and a former team mato of the slugging ex-Giant.

Little Doc Gautreau probably will be switched from second base to third base to compete for that position with Andy High, while Eddie Moore, last year's guardian of the hot corner, probably will become an outfielder rather than reserve material due to his hitting ability.

The outer garden patrol will be chosen from Lance Richbourg, Moore, Jack Smith, next to leading batter of the squad a year ago, and Earl Clark, who was purchased for \$15,000 from Richmond last year.

With Moore, Brown and Burns in the line-up, the Braves can present an entire team of 300 hitters, exclusive of battery men, on the basis of last year's averages.

THREE GANGSTERS ARE FOUND SLAIN

CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—Three men, believed by police to be bootleggers or gangsters, were found slain in Chicago suburbs today. Two of the bodies were found in a ditch beside the road near Chicago Heights and the third was found in Steger.

The three men appeared to be foreigners. One of the bodies of the Chicago Heights victims was identified as that of Joseph Sarno, of that town. The bodies at Chicago Heights were discovered by a man on his way to work and shortly afterward the body of the third man was found in Steger.

The police said there was every indication that the men had been "taken for a ride" by their enemies and that they were not.

The body of the second Chicago Heights victim was identified as Joseph Casacendi, 26. Sarno also was 26 years old.

PRINCE LEOPOLD NEARLY KILLED

BRUSSELS, Jan. 18.—Considerable excitement exists here over a mysterious explosion which occurred at Bellevue Palace Monday morning.

The explosion has been variously reported as a bomb attempt on the life of Crown Prince Leopold and again as the mere bursting of an over-heated ornamental copper ball adorning a fire dog.

Despite formal denials the impression prevails that the explosion was connected with a plot.

The prince was at work in the room when the fire dog burst, smashing a large plate glass door. The debris imbedded itself in the ceiling and furniture. The prince was not injured.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The Daily Sketch said today there was a "haunted" house in Battersea, a suburb southwest of London.

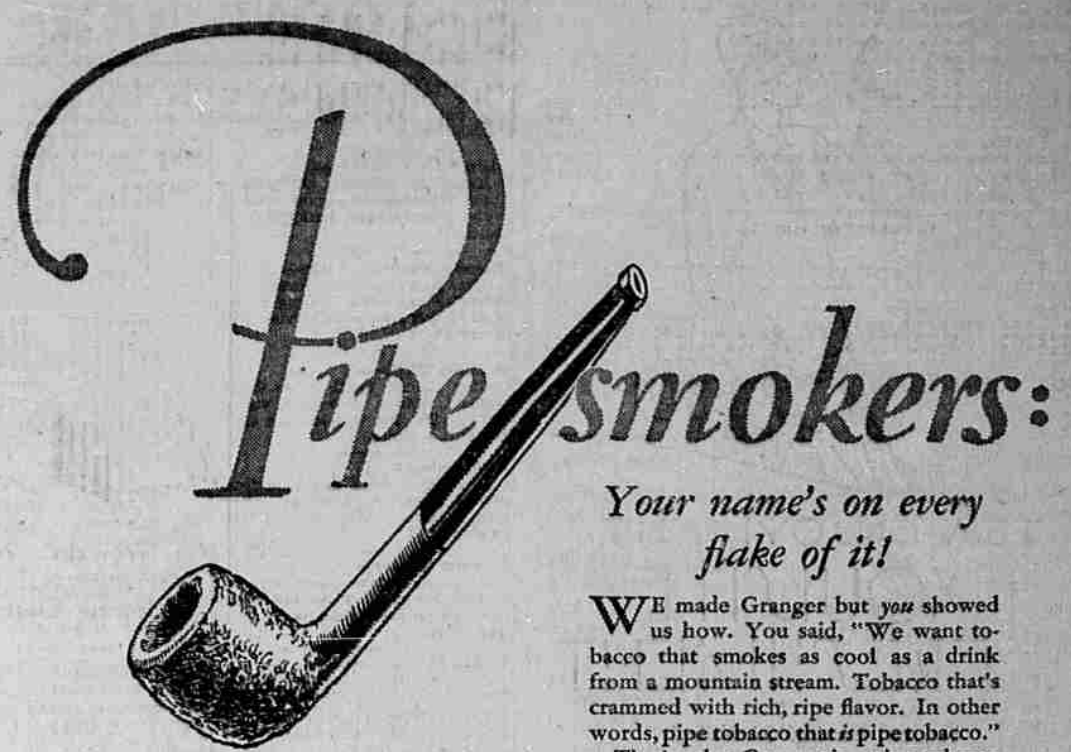
Police called to investigate were also pelted, furniture has been upset mysteriously and other strange manifestations have occurred.

The Hornsby Deal

Readjusting Teams

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—If the Yankees keep up their present pace in pennant winning as well as in player-purchasing it may be necessary for them to put a "Y" on the field, as some of the colleges are doing in football, to revive American league competition and give the surplus talent something to do.

They will have the material to do it by 1929, at any rate. The club already has a second baseman, shortstop and a few pitchers tagged for delivery next year or later. The two team idea would relieve Miller Huggins of no little embarrassment when his recruits, such as Lynn Lary and Jimmy Reese, start reporting for action and bidding for places on an outfit that looks good enough now to withstand most tests for at least two or three years to come. Games might be arranged on the home-and-home basis, if the other American league clubs fell in with the idea. While team "A" was engaging the Athletics at the Yankee Stadium, team "B" would oppose the Philadelphia Athletics at Shibe Park. Or Huggins might split up his first string nine and put Gehrig or Ruth with team "B" occasionally to attract the customers. To offer a further alternative, Huggins might borrow the Notre Dame system, starting his second string team as shock troops and rushing in the regulars when the reserves appeared to be weakening. It would be an interesting sight to see Ruth, Gehrig, Lazzari, Meusel and the rest of the regulars dash out of the dug-out along about the fifth inning and swing into action against a visiting aggregation that had been floundering in the defense put up by Lary, Reese, Gazella, Panchal and other reservists.

Now that the Yankees and Giants have dipped into the player market with a few startling captures every club in either major league has something to show for a record breaking season of dealing.

The Giants had to put their foremost stars on the market before their rival clubs and even then, it seems, most of them shied at the idea of making a deal for Hornsby. When Boston finally landed the famous second baseman, it is probable that Judge Fuchs and the other Hub officials expected

to wake up the next day and find out it was all a dream.

It had been a wide open season for dealings in jaded ivory. Most of the big minor league purchases have involved inner workers, such as Chasell, who cost the White Sox the equivalent of \$125,000 and the Oakland pair, Lary and Reese, bought by the Yankees for a reported \$150,000. The sale of Sisler to Washington by the Browns, trading of Hornsby, transfer of Bancroft from Boston to Brooklyn and shift of Lu Blue from Detroit to St. Louis, added to the big parade.

Just for variety the Browns sold or traded a complete set of outfielders, Bing Miller going to the Athletics for Sam Gray; Ken Williams to Boston and Harry Rice to Detroit.

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Revising his heavyweight championship slate, Tex Rickard today revealed his intention of rematching Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey for a 15-round match at the Yankee Stadium in June or July, the winner to defend the title in September against one of five contenders.

These five are Johnny Rinko, Paulino Uzcudun, Jack Delaney, Jack Sharkey and Tom Heeney.

In his program for two title bouts, Rickard previously had planned to hold the Dempsey-Tunney match for a grand climax. He now feels, however, that Dempsey is a logical choice for the first bout.

The promoter has definitely decided on the Yankee Stadium as a site for the first bout but is doubtful about location of the second title match, Windsor, Canada, and Chicago are two cities in the bidding.

The new elimination program for the "big five" still is unsettled but prospects are now that Sharkey and Delaney will meet in an early match while Rinko faces either Paulino or Heeney. Delaney has declined a bout with Rinko now.

Suits Tunney.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 18.—Gene Tunney said here that Tex Rickard's plan to have him meet Jack Dempsey in another title bout in June or July "suits me fine."

JOESTING WILL APPEAR ON STAGE

OLD MARATHONER PLANS COMEBACK

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Willie Kohlmeyner, the world's greatest marathoner two decades ago, has started training for a comeback at the age of 46.

Kohlmeyner, a brother of the famous Hanneke, has temporarily laid aside his bricklayer's tools and donned running togs in preparation for his entry in C. C. Pyle's cross-country race starting from Los Angeles on March 4.

Along with about a thousand of the leading distance runners in the country, Kohlmeyner will try for the \$25,000 prize which goes to the winner.

ILLINOIS WANTS TO CROWN CHAMPION

CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—Elimination contests arranged by any promoter to determine the local contenders for the middleweight and lightweight boxing crowns, now held by Micky Walker and Sammy Mandell, will receive the whole-hearted support of the Illinois Boxing commission.

The commission reached this decision yesterday after it has accepted forfeit checks from Tommy Walsh, manager of Red Uhlman of San Francisco, and Freddie Mueller with Mandell. Walsh desires to match Uhlman against Walker and Mueller with Mandell. Walsh posted two certified checks of \$2,500 each to bind either or both matches.

In the hope of vitiating the 1927 elections.

Sandin's policy is to strike and harass the marines at every opportunity, never fighting in the open.

But with the arrival of additional marines and more equipment, officials here say Sandino will be forced to fight or withdraw from Nicaragua. It is deemed essential that he be driven out or defeated before the elections can be held.

Also, Sandino's presence in Nicaragua is causing considerable un-

rest among Nicaraguans, as they fear the revolt may spread. His long continued activities have produced considerable bitterness between the Conservatives and Liberals, not permitting the parties to settle their grievances.

SANDINO'S MEN FLEE TO HONDURAS

SAN SALVADOR, Salvador, Jan. 18.—Advice from the Port of La Union on the Honduran border state followers of the Nicaraguan rebel general Sandino have fled into Honduras.

The rebels were routed by American marines detachments at Somotillo recently and tried to escape in a northerly direction. This failing, they dropped into Honduras and fled down the Rio Negro in canoes to the Gulf of Fonseca.

Several of the rebels, some of them wounded, reached Napala, Honduras, and La Union.

CHINESE GUNBOAT CAPSIZES AT SEA

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18.—Ship and shore radio sets all the way across the Pacific were quieted this morning while the transmitting station at Wosung, near Shanghai, broadcast word that the Chinese gunboat Hai Shen had capsized, presumably somewhere off the Chinese coast, and that all hands had been saved.

The exact position of the ship and the manner in which she met with disaster were not given. But it was reported that the Hai Shen was floating bottom upward.

No ship of that name is listed in available records here, but due to the variation in the transliteration of Chinese names it was presumed to be the one given under the spelling "Hai Chen."

It was a protected cruiser of 2,550 tons, built in 1928 and carrying a complement of 295 men.
