## DEMOCRATS OF SENATE RALLY BEHIND LEADER

(Continued from page 1.)

Heflin by name, but it did take direct issue with him on one feature of his attack on Robinson. The Alabama had demanded Robinson's removal from the Mexican slush fund committee, and the conference voted its confidence in the leader's work on that committee. The text of the resolution follows:

"Resolved, that this conference of Democratic members of the senate expresses its confidence in the leadership of Senator Robinson and in his service on the special committee named to investigate the alleged secret Mexican documents."

**Heflin Heeds Advice**  
Senator Heflin told newspaper men that in its original form the resolution mentioned him by name, but that the conference eliminated the reference during its three-quarters of an hour of discussion. On this point the senators who attended were not talkative.

The Alabama also said he himself had thought of going before the conference with a request that it take some action regarding his passage yesterday with Robinson, but that Senator Tyson of Tennessee and Overman of North Carolina asked him not to do so. Tyson later said he merely had advised the Alabama not to continue his attacks on the party leader.

The discussion behind the closed doors of the conference room began after Robinson had called the meeting to order and had turned the chair over to Bayard of Delaware.

Wheeler of Montana moved a vote of confidence and it was on that proposition that the debate opened. Bruce of Maryland made an extended address in which he assailed Heflin for his attacks on the Catholic church.

Others who joined in the discussion included Simmons of North Carolina and Copeland of New York. As the debate progressed, Senator Glass of Virginia drew up a resolution which contained several "whereases." These were adopted by the conference and the declaration was adopted.

Glass declined to discuss this action of the conference, saying that all information would have to come from the temporary chairman, Senator Bayard.

Informing that Heflin had said the conference eliminated his name from the original resolution, Senator Bayard said: "Senator Heflin was not at the conference. That is all I have to say."

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"I thought that was going to be taken up," he explained, referring to today's Democratic conference. "I was merely expressing my own opinion yesterday about Senator Robinson. I thought his conduct was strange, unwarranted, inexcusable and inexplicable."

**ASK RESIGNATION INSURANCE COMMISSIONER CLARE A. LEE**  
(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—Certificate holders under the assessment plan of insurance written by the Bankers Life association prior to 1911 when the association changed over to a legal reserve basis and became known as the Bankers Life company of Des Moines, Iowa, last night adopted a resolution addressed to Governor L. L. Patterson asking that the governor ask the resignation of Clare A. Lee, insurance commissioner of Oregon.

Complaining members of the association placed a petition before Commissioner Lee under date of September 19, 1927, asking that the Bankers Life company be forced to accede to certificate holders' demand for revision of assessment rates or be protected from writing further business in the state.

Hearing on the petition was held in Salem before Lee on November 20. Lee has not yet made a decision, having received an opinion from Attorney General Van Winkle who advised Lee to await decision of the Iowa supreme court in a case involving the same question as that brought up in this state.

The certificate holders complained because their rates were advanced when the association was reorganized in 1911 from the assessment plan to the legal reserve basis.

Company officials pointed out that the change was made because under the assessment plan mortality cost was divided among all members each year, which resulted in low cost while the average age of the members remained low, but could not provide adequate reserves to pay death claims when the majority of members attained advanced age.

## MONOPLANE IS FORCED ABANDON TRY FOR RECORD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—The monoplane "Spirit of California," attempting to set a new world's endurance record, failed by less than four hours when it was forced down at Mills Field at 10:16 a. m., Pacific time.

The monoplane was forced down due to exhaustion of fuel supply. It took off at 8:09 a. m. Tuesday. Its time in the air was approximately 50 hours and 7 minutes. The record, held by two German fliers, is 52 hours, 22 minutes and 31 seconds.

To set a new record the fliers, Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and Lieutenant George R. Pond, U. S. N., would have had to beat that by an hour.

The fuel gave out, due to the extremely cold weather, Lieutenant Pond said. Low temperatures, due to cold winds off the snow capped Sierras, compelled the pilots to work their engines harder than they would have done in higher temperatures.

The Spirit of California flew up and down the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys in search of warmer and smoother air currents where the gasoline supply might have been conserved.

**OREGON TO RECEIVE OVER MILLION FOR FOREST ROAD FUND**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The appropriation of \$7,500,000 for road improvement in national forests has been approved by Secretary of Agriculture Jardine. The fund was authorized by congress in 1926, and will be disbursed during the fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1928.

Allotments include Oregon, \$1,074,899.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—Use of \$1,074,899 allotted to Oregon for forest roads will be decided at a conference later this month among officials of the bureau of public roads, forestry service and state highway commission.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and Umpqua Highway association expect to make a plea to the highway organization named in the above dispatch for a portion of the forest road appropriation to be used in extending the North Umpqua section of the Umpqua highway.

## HEAD CONFEDERATE VETERANS VISITS NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Major General Harry Rene Lee, 82, adjutant general and chief of staff of the United Confederate Veterans, visiting New York for the first time in 67 years, finds that the city "hasn't changed a bit."

General Lee is here to attend the 101st birthday anniversary of General Robert E. Lee at the Hotel Astor next Thursday.

General Lee served 37 months in the confederate army, being mustered out in 1865 as a sergeant. He came to New York shortly thereafter and worked as a printer on various newspapers. He left New York in 1872 and later joined the British navy, taking part in the bombardment of Alexandria and the Egyptian campaign.

General Lee is still actively engaged in the printing trade as foreman of a printing firm in Nashville, Tennessee.
