## HERRICK GIVEN WELCOME IN FRANCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)  
PARIS, Jan. 20.—Myron T. Herrick, American ambassador to France, returning to his post after a long sick leave in the United States, was received like a conquering hero today as he touched

the soil of France at Havre. He was met at the pier by Perfet Lalande and other officials in behalf of the French government while military bands played the "Marseillaise" and the "Star Spangled Banner."  
The steam whistles of all craft in the port joined in shrieking their welcome.  
The ambassador then was officially received at city hall. Sheldon Whitehouse, who had been acting as charge d'affaires in Paris and Lester Maynard, American consul at Havre, received the am-

## SANDINO'S DEATH BELIEVED RUMOR

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 20.—American marines feared today that reports of the death of the rebel general Augusto Sandino might be a ruse.  
Around his mountain stronghold of El Chipote, the only evidence noted by marine observers was that of death and desolation.  
Sandino, if alive, it was believed, could have fled through the jungles to Honduras or down the Coco River to the Caribbean. Since the Honduran government promised to allow no concentration of rebels on Honduran soil, it was believed that Sandino, if alive, might be heading for the sea.

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CENTRAL NORTHWEST HIT BY WINDSTORM  
ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 20.—One death resulted today from the windstorm that spread a cold wave over the central northwest late yesterday, sending temperatures below zero over night.  
Miss Cora Pison, 20, died at Fergus Falls, Minn., from injuries suffered yesterday when the wind wrecked the false front of a new building there.  
The mercury dropped as much as 50 degrees within a few hours in some places.  
Temperature reports today were from 18 below zero at Prince Albert, in Canada, and 16 at International Falls, Minn., on up the scale to slightly above zero.  
A snow blanket covered the upper Michigan peninsula. Northern Wisconsin also was hard hit.  
It was declared to be the worst storm of the winter in some places.

WHITE WOMAN IS MARRIED TO JAPANESE  
SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—Mrs. Lucy Banning Ross, who said she was from Los Angeles, last night announced her marriage here to Setsuzo Ota, a Japanese. The couple met three years ago. Mrs. Ross said, on a boat enroute from the Orient to the United States.
