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BOWS NEAR HEAD OF ORNAMENT CLASS

With a Dozen Manifestations, They Have Record-Breaking Decorative Importance

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—The bow-knot's vogue is assuming unprecedented importance. Bows play a new part in late winter fashions and presage a popularity for spring that will put them at the head of the ornament class.

The bow as a decorative motif appeared last season in the form of kerchiefs knotted on the shoulder, and uncollared necklines trimmed with a neat or perky bow.

New Coats Be-bowed But now the bow has dozens of manifestations. There's the huge squashy bow of velvet that gives substance to a diaphanous lace gown; the delicate lace bow that adds a feminine touch to a brocade tailored costume; the bow in the collar, the bow in the belt, the bow in the sleeve, the bow in the pocket.

Some of the new coats have bow tie collars. An evening coat of cerise velvet, gold lined, has a supple collar of gold cloth shirred and tied with bow ends hanging. Bows are coming in for the proper hat trimming for Palm Beach. Even felts are using the bow of self-material more and more as a sense of continuity. It could never be good taste to merely perch a bow here or there without some artistic or useful reason for so decorative touch.

In all of this profusion of bows, however, one should use some ingenuity. I show today two frocks that illustrate quite different reasons for using bows for decoration. First is a charming two-piece

dinner costume of three shades of green satin. The coat over her arm is of the deepest, a rich bluish green of dark tone, lined with the second, intermediate green. The gown itself is of a light green with a bluish cast, and has pipings of the dark green here and there.

Accents the Droop Here the bow functions perfectly to accent a drooping silhouette that in reality droops little. Glancing first at this gown with its two back bow-knots and flowing ends, one's impression is that here is one of the modish peacock silhouettes.

This type of gown, however, with accompanying coat, should never have such a swooping hemline as a lacy evening gown might. By slightly drooping the back hemline and exaggerating this droop by the double bow effect, an illusion of the peacock silhouette is attained. The front of this gown is merely V-necked, without any decoration.

The Square Contrasts the Round In the second frock the square neck and the deep square yoke contrast with the circular skirt to give novelty. Two most little bows of self-material, its square neck and square yoke have four rows of hand-crooping to outline them, quite appropriate to the hand-made little bows that it sponsors.
