FRANK FATE OF RIDDLE DEAD AT AGE OF 71 YEARS

Frank Fate, a pioneer resident of this county, died yesterday evening at his home at Riddle. He was born near Dixonville Dec. 2, 1856, the son of David and Mary Ann Fate, early settlers in this county. In 1885 he married May Angela Raymond, who survives him. Two children are also living, Mrs. J. F. Bonebrake of Riverside and Mrs. Glenn N. Riddle of Riddle. A brother, Remick Fate of Myrtle Creek and a sister, Mrs. Theodosia M. Stephens of Roseburg also survive him.

Mr. Fate was a prominent man in the community in which he resided for many years, and has long been one of the best known men of the county.

The body is at the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors and is being prepared for the funeral services which will be held at the Methodist church at Canyonville, Wednesday at 2 p. m. Rev. Knott, pastor of the local M. E. church, will officiate. Interment will be at the Canyonville cemetery.

SENATOR HEFLIN AGAIN SOUNDS OFF

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Before a crowd that overflowed the senate chamber and its galleries, Senator Hefflin of Alabama resumed today his attack on the Roman Catholic "political machine" and assailed Mayor Gunter of Montgomery, the capital city of his state.

Hefflin's remarks on Mayor Gunter resulted from an invitation the mayor extended to Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, to visit Montgomery as the guest of the city and to repeat there his senate speech of last week in which he rebuked Hefflin for his repeated attacks on the Catholic church.

The Alabama senator first paid his respects to Senator Bruce, Democrat, of Maryland, who beat him to the jump earlier in the day and obtained the floor ahead of him.

For an hour Hefflin had sought recognition, but Senator Bruce held his ground. Hefflin accused him of "playing the crowded galleries to press his attacks on the 18th amendment."

He also condemned the defense made recently by the Maryland senator of the administration policy of Nicaragua.

SCIENTIFIC ECHO BEING PERFECTED
