A Trio of Bill Hohenzollerns



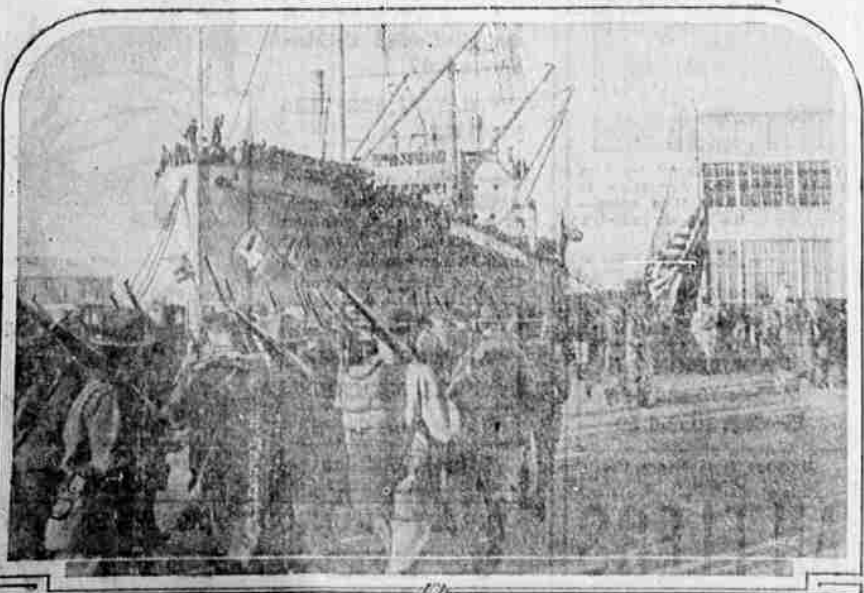
Here are all three of the William Hohenzollerns in one picture. The ex-kaiser is in the center; at the left and right, the former crown prince and his son. They posed at Doorn.

Arrives



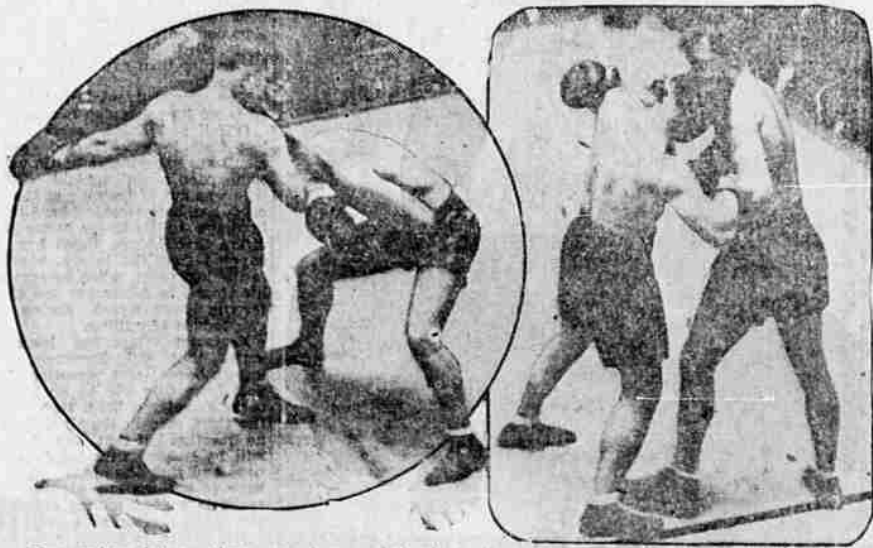
