SAN FRANCISCO AIR LINE TO START SOON AFTER FIRST MARCH

(Associated Press Special Wire)
PORTLAND, Jan. 26.—Airplane passenger and express service, with two round trips daily between Portland and Seattle and a round trip every other day between Portland and San Francisco, will be started March 2 by the West Coast Air Transport company, subsidiary of the Pilewick stage system, Charles V. Ecken, president of the transport company, announced yesterday.
Eight passenger Bach cabin type monoplanes will be used. They will be equipped with three mo-

tors and each will carry a crew of two, a mechanic and pilot. The mechanics also be licensed pilots. All pilots, Mr. Ecken said, will be ex-army fliers with long experience in the air. Captain L. G. Deveney will be chief pilot.

The new planes are now under construction at Santa Monica, Cal. Two will be held in actual operation and one held in reserve. They will have a cruising speed of 120 miles an hour, with maximum speed of 150 miles an hour. The trip to Seattle will be made in one hour and ten minutes, including a regular stop at Tacoma. The Portland-San Francisco run will be on a six-hour schedule, with stops at Medford, Ore., and Corning, Cal.

A temporary hangar will be built at the Rankin airport on the directly cutoff until the Swan Island aviation field is completed, when the company expects to build permanent quarters on the island.

Sixty days after starting the San Francisco-Seattle service the

company plans to extend its lines to Los Angeles and later to El Paso, Tex., via Phoenix, Ariz. "Feeder" lines also are planned for the future to serve Salem, Eugene, Corvallis and Roseburg in Oregon, and the smaller Washington cities between Portland and Spokane also is contemplated.

The new planes will be equipped with every convenience for air travel, Mr. Ecken said. There will be a two-passenger smoking compartment with electric cigar lighters, a lavatory with hot and cold running water and an ice water drinking fountain.

By next summer the company plans to equip the planes with radio sending apparatus which will permit passengers to send messages directly by voice for 25 miles. Ground stations will be established at Seattle, Portland, Medford, Corning, Eugene and Los Angeles to keep pilots informed at all times of weather conditions.

One Wasp motor of 425 horsepower will be installed on the "nose" of the plane, and two wing motors of 140 horsepower each, Mr. Ecken said, the planes were capable of traveling 120 miles an hour and could fly 50 miles with only one of the wing motors in use.
