JOIE RAY PLANS STAGE A COMEBACK

 CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—The lure of the 1928 Olympic games and a determination to square accounts with Pavo Nurmi, have brought Joie Ray, one of America's fastest milers, out of his two-year retirement.

Shortly after Ray's defeat by Nurmi, he announced his retirement. But the spell of the track was too much for him, however, and every morning of work he reports to his coach, Johnny Behr of the Illinois Athletic club for practice.

Behr, like Ray, is confident his pupil has more than an even chance to return to his old time form, make the American Olympic team again and possibly turn tables on Nurmi. He reports Ray is training hard and seriously.

Ray, who is still under 30, was the ace of American milers from 1915 to 1923. He still holds the amateur athletic union records in the 1,000 yards and one mile.

EARLE SANDE IS BACK FROM EUROPE

 NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Back home after a vacation in Europe, Earle Sande, famous jockey, is anxious to get back in "harness" once more.

Sande arrived yesterday on the Aquanilla. "I'm in great shape," Sande said, "and I'm just six pounds or so over my regular weight. Never felt better and never was so anxious to get back into harness."

While reticent about his plans on seeking reinstatement as a rider, he said he planned to apply to the Maryland state racing commission shortly for a license. He was suspended by the Maryland commission last November on a charge of fouling Reigh Court when he was up on Beaufort, in the running of the Pimlico future.

WORK TO START ON SUMMER RESORT IN NEAR FUTURE

Markets

 PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 27.—Price movements on eggs at the dairy exchange meeting yesterday afternoon, were mixed, both grades of standards advancing a cent while both grades of mediums declined a cent. Underized remained steady. The changes bring the differential between standards and mediums back to 2c per dozen. Quotations follow: Standard extras 32c; standard firsts 31c; medium extras 30c; medium firsts 29c; underized 28c.

Trading in butter was moderate at yesterday's meeting and prices today are unchanged. An easier tone prevails in the country dressed meat department with demand somewhat slower and receipts comparatively large. Veal was moving early today around 18 and 19c, about a cent below yesterday's figures, while hogs were also easy to go lower. Lambs were likewise draggy with most sales around 22 and 23c.

The wholesale poultry market is steady with supply and demand good. Good local cabbage was rather scarce and is bringing 3c. Onions were quoted steady but trading is exceedingly dull. About 150 cars are reported in storage here with buyers holding off. Supplies in eastern markets are reported ample for immediate needs and little change in prices is anticipated soon. Officers to growers are nominally around \$2.50 per cwt. with practically no sales.

The potato situation was unchanged with trading decidedly dull.

BOSTON, Jan. 27.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The demand for wool in seaboard markets is less active but prices are fully maintained with the tendency still against the buyer. In the west the demand also is less heavy but prices are tending, if anything, upward still.

Foreign markets are buoyant and prices decidedly firm, both in London and in the primary markets.

"The trade is awaiting with interest the initial opening of heavy-weight lines by the American Woolen company on Monday.

"Mohair is rather quiet but very strong."
