## EUGENE YARDMEN PROTEST LOSS JOBS TO ROSEBURG MEN

EUGENE, Jan. 27.—Protest by Eugene yardmen employed by the Southern Pacific company in being planned as the result of the displacement of 16 of their number from the Roseburg yard.

Announcement of the change in personnel in the local yard took the form of an announcement from the company to the yardmen a few days ago. This notified them that 16 men are being cut in on the Eugene yardmen's seniority board from the Roseburg yard. Eleven of the Roseburg men will displace 11 Eugene men of a seniority date subsequent to Sept. 1, 1923. The other five Roseburg men displace five Eugene men according to their seniority date of employment in the Roseburg yard.

Eugene yardmen state that in this way the local group will be thrown entirely out of employment and that under the articles of agreement between yardmen and the railroad, yardmen hold seniority privileges only in their respective yards and in no other.

Four of the Roseburg men are understood to have gone to work in the local yards Thursday afternoon, with others on the way. Difficulties arose over the recent diversion of traffic on the new Cascade line, whereby the traffic out of Portland did not materially increase. Eugene's labor need, but by dividing the traffic south between the division points of Roseburg and the route through Crescent lake, the Roseburg yard lessened its demand for men. The Crescent lake division point has no yard, the traffic being simply routed straight through. Had this point a yard the Roseburg men could have been transferred to it, local yardmen say, but as the situation now is they are being cut in here.

L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, and L. C. Gram, assistant superintendent, could not be reached Thursday, both being out of the city.

Next meeting of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen will be held Tuesday, Feb. 14, although it is possible that the matter may be taken up in a special session before that time.

## SPEAKER MAY GO BACK TO BOSTON

(Associated Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Personal files which shifted Trix Speaker to various major league ports appeared in a position today to carry him back to his first love, Boston.

He has been released from the Senators and there are reports that he is being sought by the Red Sox and Giants.

The Boston setting would bring Trix back to the club where he made his start to fame on the big circuits and with Bill Carrigan at the head, he would be under his old boss of the pennant days of 1915. He took part in two championships with the Red Sox, in 1912 and 1915. On April 12, 1918, he was traded to the Cleveland Indians for Thomas and Jones and a cash consideration. The deal brought protest from the fans, but in spite of his loss Carrigan went out that same year and annexed another pennant for the Indians.

## GENERAL PERSHING GREETED OLD FRIENDS

Joe Genna and Milton Brasseaux, convicted of the murder of J. J. Breville, taxicab driver, in August, 1926, in Bertrand parish, were yesterday denied any further stay of execution by Governor Simpson as was Byron Dunn, sentenced to death for slaying Deputy Sheriff Sam Duhon, near Starke, in Calcasieu parish, in March, 1925.

## CHICAGO GANGSTERS DEFI IS ACCEPTED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—The dynamite defy that bombers laid on city completed Fitzmorris' doorstep yesterday has been snatched up by the administration. "This is a direct challenge from the lawless," Mayor Thompson said, following an investigation of the bomb damage to the homes of Fitzmorris and Dr. William H. Reid, a close associate of the mayor.

"We accept the challenge. When our fight is over, the challengers will be sorry. We shall work harder than ever to break the gangs back of this double outrage."

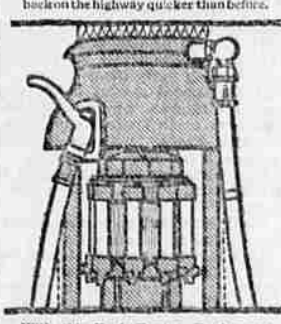

## TOM HEFLIN—A POLITICAL ENIGMA

Both have beset him sorely this last year.

Heflin to the Breach  
Last year the Knights of Columbus decided to aid the church cause in Mexico and one or two Catholic congressmen demanded a diplomatic break. Many members felt we should leave Mexico alone, but it remained for Tom to denounce the Catholic hierarchy from the senate floor.

Immediately Tom's two nemeses were at work. On one hand he received hundreds of laudatory letters from ordinary inarticulate anti-Catholics; on the other hand he was labeled and jumped on by Catholics and tolerant Protestants alike. At the end of the season he was invited to many places to make anti-Catholic speeches.

He answered it as a call from real Americans and he viewed his tour as triumphal. His ego pulled by one force and prodded by the other, Tom went from bad to worse. His charges against the church would have ended had he been completely ignored, but now they reached the heights of the absurd. He became a fantastic modern Don Quixote in a big white vest, regarding the hundreds of letters with which he deluged the congressional record as certificates of vindication for a shining knight and altogether impervious to the complete lack of proof for his weird accusations.

Can't Be Ignored  
More and more windmills he created for himself; lighter and lighter his obsession gripped him. Almost anywhere else he would have been nagged or ignored. But in the senate you can't gag a man and, when he repeatedly devoted hours to oratory designed to stir up religious antagonism, you can't ignore him.

And so you have Tom today, undaunted and inviolate. The more his followers flatter him and the more others attack him, the more likely it becomes that Tom will lead an anti-Catholic political schism of his own in case Al Smith is nominated at Houston.

## FASCISM IS NOT FACING A CRISIS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) ROME, Jan. 27.—The report published in the London Daily Herald that a crisis similar to the Trotsky crisis in Russia threatened Fascism today was declared to be unfounded. Those in authority were at a loss how to adequately characterize the report.

The allegations of the Herald that Roberto Farinacci, former secretary of the Fascist party, and Edmondo Ronconi, head of the Fascist trade union, were threatened with disciplinary measures were laughed at as were statements concerning discontent among the rank and file of the party.

The theory is held here that the story originated among a small anti-Fascist coterie in Switzerland.

## SPANISH AUTHOR SERIOUSLY ILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MENTONE, France, Jan. 27.—Vicente Blasco Ibañez, noted Spanish author, is seriously ill at his villa here. He is suffering from a grave complication of bronchial pneumonia and diabetes. The condition of the writer, who is now in exile from his native land, because of his opposition to the present political regime, is regarded as critical, and several physicians have been called to his bedside.

Vicente Blasco Ibañez has

been active in two fields, politics and literature. His most widely known works are "Blood and Sand," in 1923, "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," in 1918, and "Mare Nostrum." All three of these books were published in translation in the United States

and also were made into motion pictures. Politically, Ibañez is a Republican, early in life becoming an impassioned political writer and suffering exile or frequent imprisonment from his opinions. He was returned to parliament on

eight occasions by his native city. His opposition to the present regime in Spain, particularly direct criticism of King Alfonso, caused him to go into virtual exile in France.

Ibañez was born at Valencia January 29, 1867.
