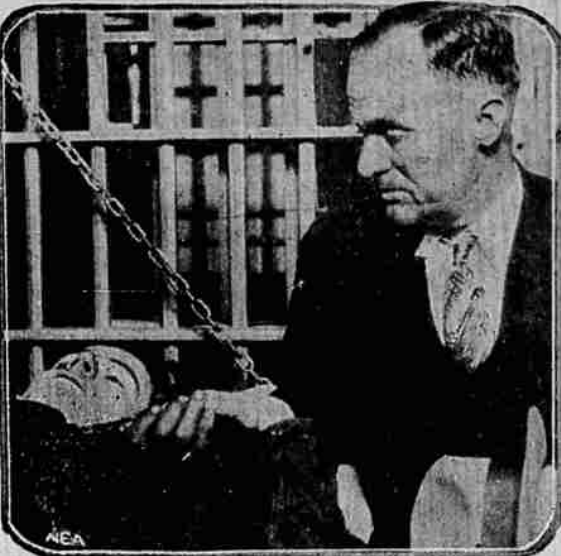


## "Fox" and His Father Meet in Jail

NEW MARKETING  
SPECIALIST NAMED  
AT STATE COLLEGE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 27.—The position of marketing specialist of the extension service, vacant since the death last summer of C. J. Hurd, has been filled by the appointment, announced today, of George O. Gatlin, at present economist in the division of cooperative marketing, at Washington, D. C. Mr. Gatlin has resigned and will come west to his new position early in February.

Mr. Gatlin is a native of Kentucky, where he owned and operated a pure bred hog and poultry farm after completing his education at South Kentucky college and Cumberland University, Tennessee. He acted as market agent for a group of farmers in his community while in the stock business himself.

In the department of agriculture Mr. Gatlin has for nine years been carrying on extension, research and administrative work in the marketing division. He is the author of two widely recognized bulletins on cooperative marketing and has written numerous articles and circulars on the subject.

ROBBERS' LOOT  
IS FOUND BURIED

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27.—Buried loot to the amount of \$28,460 from the City Bureau of Light and Power payroll holdup of last September, was dug up in a vacant lot last night by police officers.

Working by the light of lanterns, a squad of police dug at a spot indicated on a map said to have been drawn by one of the accused holdup men, and several feet underground found the currency in two canvas sacks.

Earlier in the day detectives escorted Fern Sadler, former clerk in the bureau and the first of four men arrested in connection with the holdup, to a place in the Verdugo hills, where he said he had buried a part of the loot. The officers found nothing at that spot, however.

BOOMING TEXAS  
MAN FOR TICKET

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The possibility of a ticket headed by Alfred E. Smith for president and Jesse Jones, of Houston, Texas, for vice president, was discussed in democratic circles today.

The boom for Jones as a running mate to New York's governor developed a breakfast dinner at the National Democratic club and followed receipt of word from Governor Dan Moody of Texas that he positively would not be a candidate for either president or vice president and did not want his name discussed.
