be denying that I have either been aided by the Spanish or am plotting against Premier Primo de Rivera," Ibanez said a few days ago, adding a reiterated denial that he had any connection with various anti-royal Spanish plots covered recently.

"While my sympathies are undoubtedly in favor of Spanish democracy, I have not permitted any person to use my name for such movements and I have not given any money toward them," he declared.

The Spanish writer's last work was a labor of love, and was to transform his estate to the most beautiful on the river to be left as a garden retreat for the writers of the world.

He settled there four years ago and his first step was to remove all telephone wires. He placed a small tombstone where each telephone had been, declaring "the telephone and the radio are the world's greatest nuisances."

Gardeners brought from all parts of France made the estate a veritable flower field, and Ibanez eventually ended their labors by engaging French sculptors to do a series of busts of the world's twelve most famous authors, including Shakespeare and Dickens, but excluding his fellow Spaniard, Cervantes.

The villa here was constructed without thought for material comfort, the sole aim being properly to house his books and manuscripts, of which he had the largest collection in southern France. No room in the villa was considered properly furnished unless there were a thousand books lining its walls.

DEPUTY DID NOT PRODUCE MISSING COLLEGE STUDENT

TROY, N. Y., Jan. 28.—Francis St. John Smith, missing Smith College student, was not produced by Deputy Sheriff James Golden today because the deputy sheriff did not have any such girl to produce.

He told an Associated Press correspondent that earlier in the day he had jokingly told Patrolman William Switzer that he was going to have the girl at the jail at 11 o'clock, and that at the time he did not believe that the patrolman would take the matter seriously.

From other sources it was learned that the deputy had been shadowing a girl, who he believed was Miss Smith, but who proved

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Jan. 28.—Twelve possible motives which may have actuated 19-year-old Miss Frances St. John Smith in her disappearance, two weeks ago, from Smith College here, formed a new basis upon which the state planned to concentrate its investigation.

What the motives were, General Alfred E. Foote, Massachusetts commissioner of public safety, refused to say.

In New York Dr. Lydard H. Horton, biological psychologist of Boston, who has been retained by the family, announced he was seeking figuratively to construct a checkboard of the girl's mind and trace the movement of thoughts and motivating impulses across it.

When the "game" has been played, he hoped to find Miss Smith herself, he declared.

Mr. Wade reports that two-thirds of his ewes have already lambed, 50% of which have produced twin lambs. His flock averaged 101 pounds of wool per head at the 1927 shearing. Mr. Wade secured fame for himself and Douglas County, taking first place in the fine wool commercial class at the Portland Pacific International Livestock show last November.

(Continued from page 1.) tax and \$870,497.98 balance from 1926. The anticipated income for 1928 is \$10,777,077.07, of which \$9,677,077.07 will be from state funds, \$450,000 county funds, \$340,000 federal and \$10,000 miscellaneous funds.

There is already under obligation for 1928 to cover work under contract \$10,257,547.51, leaving \$419,529.56 available for new construction work, betterments, etc.

New construction work during the year totaled 219.8 miles. Concrete paving was only a small stretch of .04 mile, bituminous macadam 3.5 miles, rock surfacing 136 miles and grading 79.4 miles. At the end of the year there was under contract 46.1 miles of rock surfacing and 61.7 miles of grading.

Resurfacing and widening during the year totaled 468 miles. The mileage of improved highway in the state system now totals 4393.4 miles. Of this 207.3 is concrete paving, 688.5 bituminous pavement, 956.7 miles of graded road, 1549.1 miles of graded road and 764.2 miles of improved highways.

tinguish between right and wrong. But none of the jurors was entirely certain he would retain his seat long after the opening of the court Monday.

The mix up apparently left the prosecution with sixteen pre-employment challenges but it was not certain that it could use them and not quite decided whether it wished to exercise them if permitted to do so. And the defense had on its hands four peremptory challenges which may or may not be usable when court resumes Monday.

Keyes Changes Attitude The kinks in the law resulted when the prosecution passed the challenge of the jury yesterday to the defense and Hickman's attorney surprised the court by quickly accepting the jury.

The move brought District Attorney Asa Keyes out of his chair with the request that the prosecution still might challenge if it so desired Monday. Jerome Walsh, 25-year-old defense counsel, declared he would demand the same privilege if it were extended to the prosecution.

Although the jury technically had been accepted by both sides, Judge J. J. Trabucco ordered that the 12 talesmen not be sworn. Monday, he said, he would rule on the prosecution request, declaring: "Both sides would be treated alike in the matter."

At the close of court Keyes said he wasn't quite sure whether he desired to challenge any juror. The defense said the jury was satisfactory to them.

Jurors of Mature Minds All of the technically accepted jurors are well into or past middle age. The three women gave their occupations as housewives. Two are gray haired. Only four of the jurors were from Los Angeles proper, the others coming from suburban points or nearby cities of the county.

Every juror now in the box has declared under questioning that he had read of the Hickman case in the newspapers. Five of them said they had formed opinions as a result of their newspaper reading but could sit on the jury with an open mind.

To place the dozen probable jurors in the box, 47 prospective jurors were questioned. Sixteen were challenged by the defense, four by the prosecution and the rest were dismissed for cause.
