WANT BRANCH OF PENITENTIARY TO QUARRY LIME

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30.—A branch state penitentiary, located on some lime deposit in the state as a means of segregating prisoners and reducing costs of administration, was advocated today at the Salem Chamber of Commerce luncheon by Colonel W. B. Bartram, manager of industries at the prison.

"The penitentiary, as it is today, is badly located," he said, "and the time is not far distant when the city of Salem will surround it. The buildings and other facilities are inadequate to meet the needs of the rapidly growing population. During the past 12 months the population (of the prison) has increased 17 per cent. For reasons already expressed it is not desirable to make any considerable extensions to the buildings. There is no opportunity to segregate the confirmed criminals apart from those who are first offenders, and particularly the very young men. Having regard for the best interests of the state and these men, the management feels we should draw your attention to these conditions. As a remedy we would suggest that a branch penitentiary be located and built on some lime rock deposit. Large areas of land in western Oregon and Washington are badly in need of lime. The requirement, when made available at a low cost to the farmers, will run hundreds of thousands of tons. At the present time the state is grinding agricultural lime rock in a small way at the penitentiary. This lime costs \$1.25 per ton at the quarry and a further charge of \$2.25 per ton freight. Most of these charges will be eliminated by larger operations as suggested."

Colonel Bartram advocated abolition of the prison wage system and the parole board. He said that "if all inmates connected with the industries or otherwise permanently employed were to work and live while in the institution on a merit basis in lieu of money wages and the benefits credited to them in the reduction of sentences, it would cause more contentment, develop greater efficiency, and by constant good behavior would in time improve them as a character."

TELLER OF BANK KIDNAPPED AND VAULT IS ROBBED

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—The "kidnaping" system of bank robbers, used for the third time within a month in Chicago today netted its practitioners \$35,000. James Dillon, teller of the Industrial State Bank of Chicago, told police that he was held a prisoner in the bank all night while his four captors waited for the time lock in the vault to open at 7 a. m. The quiet escape after looting the vault, leaving the cashier bound and gagged.

Dillon, 26, said he was kidnapped while returning from church at noon yesterday by two men who forced him into an automobile, threatening to shoot him if he made an outcry. He said he was taken to a small garage and kept for six hours, then was forced to call his landlady and inform her that he would be out for the evening playing cards, after which he was taken to an apartment and finally to the bank, which he was forced to open at 6:30 o'clock last night.

He was taken inside and a negro porter was seized, the robbers standing watch until the time clock was released. They bound their victims before they left but Dillon crawled to a telephone and knocked the receiver from the hook, which resulted in the police being notified.

It was the third such robbery here in the last month.

EARL HAIG, HEAD OF BRITISH ARMY IN WAR, IS DEAD

lowed publication of news that Earl Haig was dead. One was from David Lloyd George, England's war premier, who speaking of the time when unity of command in the war was decided upon and the British army was placed under Marshal Foch said: "Whatever might have been his personal views he carried out honorably every particular of understanding arrived at. He behaved, not merely like a great patriot, but like a great gentleman."

The military achievements of Lord Douglas Haig consumed seven centuries of military service by the ancient and aristocratic family of Haig of Bemeraye in Berwickshire. Like so many other clans they rose from the quire of Bruce and Balliol and once established they were represented whenever the history of Scotland was being made.

Haig were warriors. They reared their sons for the service of Bruce and his Stuart successors and when their country took on the obligations of union with their southern neighbors, the Haigs fought under Clive Earl, the duke of Wellington. In more peaceful times they were distinguished as such the family fortune was made and increased through several centuries.

From the day he was born, June 19, 1861, the third and youngest son of John Haig, J. P., of Cameronside, Fifehire, a military career was planned for Douglas Haig. His father, a member of one of the younger branches of the family, gave his sons a thorough academic education, a necessary part of the make-up of Her Majesty's officers of those days.

Accordingly, young Haig went to Eton and then to Sandhurst, where he was commissioned in the 7th Hussars in 1885 and then settled down to the dull existence of an army officer awaiting war. In the ordinary course of events he had attained the rank of a captain in the 17th Lancers when he was ordered to the Sudan to serve under Kitchener. He accompanied that officer to Khartoum, his distinguished service winning for him the admiration and friendship of his commander. Captain Haig's fortune changed with this friendship and from then onward his advancement was meteoric. He was said to have the record for rapidity of promotion in the cavalry.

For his service at Atbara and Khartoum he was made a brevet major. In the next war, the Boer War, under General Sir John French, his successful commanding of several cavalry columns again won the praise of his commander and he was made a brevet colonel and added to his store of medals.

These campaigns were a basis upon which the colonel was able to build a reputation as a strategist and leader. The friendship of Kitchener soon gave him the command of inspector-general of cavalry in India from 1903 to 1906, and he was gazetted as a major-general in 1914, was eight years after he had been a lieutenant of cavalry.

He was knighted in 1911.

Was at the Marne. When the war started he was director of military training at the war office. He trained and sent the first contingent to France, but at the urgent request of Field Marshal French, he was sent to France to command the First Army Corps.

It fell to General Haig to command the English divisions at the first battle of the Marne and this he did with such skill that his work was singled out by Lord French in his report to the war office. For this service Haig was made a full general and despite the fact that there were older and more experienced officers in the field he came to be recognized as the ablest of the English commanders.

His knowledge of the strategic importance of the cavalry and his faith in that branch of service caused him to use it more than most commanders in the great conflict were inclined to do. The retreats from Mons and Ypres covered by the cavalry have been known as the finest examples of

military science produced in the war. This brought more commendation for the commander of the First Corps, and when on December 15, 1915, French was relieved of the supreme command of the English forces and raised to peerage, the nation in one loud acclaim welcomed the appointment of Haig to the command of his friend.

After the appointment of Foch as generalissimo, Haig's service was so brilliant as to win him further renown.

Named Field Marshal. He had been appointed field marshal in 1917 for distinguished service and when he returned to England after the war the mantle of Wellington by popular desire was thrust upon his shoulders.

In 1919 he was received by the king on relinquishing his command and retiring from the army, when His Majesty raised him to the dignity of an earl. He was later called before Parliament, publicly thanked and voted a gift of \$500,000.

A public subscription was taken and when a fund of \$1,430,000 was raised, the ancestral estates of Bemeraye were purchased and presented to him as a gift of the people. Before retiring to his estates he received the freedom of all the large English cities and was made chancellor of St. Andrews University.

In 1922 he accepted a directorship on the board of the largest whiskey combine in Scotland, which at that time absorbed the distilling interests of the Haig family.

In most of his characteristics Lord Haig was typically the Scotchman. His manner was tipped with that which was considered more adamant than the granite of Aberdeen and he possessed that primary virtue of his country, patience. Lord Haig's manner through the entire war is said to have never changed, never was there depression or elation shown on his face.

His reticence and national aloofness caused him to be accused of a frigid personality but his silence was not the result of a lack of sympathy, his friends say—it was because he used words as he used men, sparingly, but always with method.

Lord Haig married in 1905 the Hon. Dorothy Vivian, a daughter of Lord Vivian. They had four children.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30.—Local wholesale markets were slow this morning with trading dull and prices for the most part steady.

Country dressed meats were a little easier due to fairly heavy receipts and moderate demand. Fancy veal was quoted around 18 to 19 cents while best light hogs were moving slowly at 13 to 13 cents. Lamb were from one to two cents below Saturday with most sales bringing 22 cents to 24 cents.

Butter and egg prices were unchanged this morning with receipts of both fairly heavy. There were no indications early today of any substantial price changes at this afternoon's meeting although slight fluctuations were thought possible by some commission men due to the widespread of prices in various coast markets.

In the fruit and vegetable divisions things were rather quiet today. It appears that most of the excitement in the onion market has subsided and prices to growers have slipped downward somewhat. Top for U. S. No. 1 this morning was around \$2.25 but movement was practically nil. Outside buyers are mostly out of the market, it is said, and most stock that is moving was purchased before the recent flurry. Wholesalers were quoting onions at 2¢ to 2¢ 1/2 for this morning and 2¢ 3/4 for fancy offerings, with demand brisk.

The potato market continues stagnant with growers selling for what they can get for the most part.
