ASKS FOR PARDON

EUREKA, Calif., Jan. 31.—Frank L. Van Deusen, superintendent of the Little River Redwood Lumber company, convicted in Humboldt county in February, 1917, of voting at the preceding state primary election while still a citizen of Canada, has filed an application for a pardon with Governor C. C. Young. Van Deusen was granted a three year probation by Superior Judge Thomas J. Selva.

As president of the Humboldt county law enforcement league, Van Deusen took an active part in local affairs. District Attorney E. E. Metzler said today he had made no recommendations to the governor.

ANCESTORS OF HICKMAN SAID TO BE "NUTTY"

was accused by Brown of making threats to destroy both her children and herself.

It was brought out that the alleged suicide attempt occurred two years before the woman was admitted to the hospital.

Dr. Brown described the woman of "ordinary intelligence" and suffering from "simple depression."

Official records were quoted by Walsh relating that the probate court of Greenwood county, Arkansas, ordered the commitment of Eva Hickman to the "lunatic asylum" at Little Rock.

A hospital report on the woman made by a Dr. Murphy, said:

"She states she knows there have been times when her mind was not right in the past five years, and in these spells she wanted to die and to be out of the way."

Had Domestic Trouble

Dr. H. P. Rath, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who also examined Mrs. Eva Hickman, termed her illness "mild dementia." Under questioning of the state he said he based his opinion on her extreme melancholia, hallucinations of being abused and general appearance of ill health.

Dr. Rath admitted her condition came after she and her husband had had considerable domestic trouble. He admitted having seen Mr. Hickman making a "regular hang" of a Hartford, Arkansas, restaurant, in which worked a woman to whom he gave attention, and that Hickman ran away with this woman.

Young Hickman's brilliant career in Central High school of Kansas City, was the next phase of the killer's history to be put into the trial.

Don Johnson, Kansas City school mate of the prisoner, deposed that Hickman worked "night and day" in winning the representation of the school society of orations for an oratorical contest conducted by the Kansas City Star.

Hickman Disappointed

The witness declared that after apparently overworking in the contest Hickman seemed more quiet and less sociable.

In the spring of 1925 Johnson said Hickman became interested in getting into the national oratorical contest; that he worked hard for it and lost. He said Hickman seemed to take the loss very hard and lost interest in his class and club work.

Johnson deposed that soon after this Hickman displayed his temper for the first time he had ever known. He wrote a note resigning as an officer of a school club, saying he "hated the whole bunch" and hurling his pen on the floor.

Cross-examination of Johnson brought out that he first thought Hickman insane last summer. He testified reasons for so believing were Hickman's many changes of jobs and plans, saying Hickman entered Park College, Kansas City, three times and quit after short periods.

Johnson admitted Hickman always wanted to go to college and that he believed he didn't because of lack of money. The witness also admitted Hickman had high marks three years in school and that he did not know his marks the senior year, but that Hick-

man was equally as good a scholar as himself that final year.

HALL OF JUSTICE, Los Angeles, Jan. 31.—The second day of testimony taking in the sanity trial of William Edward Hickman opened on the minute at 8:30 o'clock today, a half hour ahead of the usual hour by order of the action-impelling Judge J. J. Tra-bucco.

Defense Attorney Jerome Walsh resumed the reading of depositions from the witness stand. The first was that of Spencer Lane, 40 year old veteran of the Ozarks back-woods town of Hartford, Arkansas.

Former Justice L. N. Sullivan of the Idaho supreme court had established himself as a constant devotee of the trial. The venerable white-haired jurist held a recognized seat inside the court railing.

Plenty of "Early Worms" The movies were represented by Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie F. Doras, formerly of New York. Mr. Doras for five years has been production manager for Mack Sennett studios.

Women and colorfully costumed girls brightened the court room scene again today. They had shown themselves the "early worms" capturing about half the spectators seats.

The jurors coming into court before Judge Trabucco appeared, appeared much refreshed and in full view instead of serious mien, chatting gaily and noisily.

Lane deposed that the defendant's grandfather, Otto Buck, was what he called a "nutty guy."

"He had epileptic fits and was what I call a 'fitted feller,'" Lane deposed Buck didn't have "sense enough to say anything when he was in a fit."

"He was what I call crazy," the Ozarkian said.

"He didn't have sense enough to go to work and earn a living."

The state's cross-examination of the Arkansas witness, which was read in court by District Attorney Asa Keyes was taken by the latter's deputy, James Costello, who accompanied Walsh on the middle-west tour for evidence.

Costello brought out that Lane's opinion of Buck's insanity was based mainly on his "fitted" tendencies. The witness also admitted that Buck did support his wife by his labor.

Ancestry Paraded

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—From the hills of Arkansas, the pasts of ancestors, some of them from since dead, have come to a Los Angeles courtroom to be paraded in support of the insanity plea of William Edward Hickman, confessed kidnaper and slayer of little Marian Parker.

Depositions taken from witnesses in Sebastian county, Arkansas, yesterday were read to the court as the first evidence of the defense in an attempt to show a

strain of insanity running through three generations of the young prisoner's family—beginning with his maternal grandparents, Beckie and Otis (Otto) Buck.

About 100 typed pages, the testimony of midwest witnesses, all relatives and friends of Hickman's family, were read into the court yesterday, leaving about five hundred pages more of depositions to be read. Other depositions follow the Hickman family away from Sebastian county and will include the questioning of boyhood companions of the defendant.

Parents Were "Foolish"

The first depositions offered painted the grandfather as subject to "fits," the grandmother as frail and given to tears and "talking foolish" the mother, Mrs. Eva Hickman, as depressed, morose and at one time attempting suicide, and the father, William Thomas Hickman, as "crazy" and "running around with other women."

Thomas Lewis, son-in-law of Beckie Buck, declared in his deposition that "the old lady's mind was awful weak," while anything "battered" Mrs. Hickman.

Mrs. Arlie Smith, of Cameron, Oklahoma, sister-in-law of Hickman's mother, told in a deposition of the "queerness" of Mrs. Hickman. At one time she said, William, the father, awoke to find his wife standing over him with a butcher knife in her hands. Another time, folks in her home town, according to the witness, were shocked to discover Mrs. Hickman dancing a jig in the midst of her household duties.

Except for the defense attorneys, only three witnesses will be presented by the defense, according to Jerome Walsh, chief counsel for Hickman. These will be Mrs. Hickman, William Hickman, the father, and Alfred Hickman, the young defendant's brother.

Last night the jury of eight men and four women, as well as the men and women who were chosen as alternate jurors, were locked up in separate rooms for the night. Under the order of Judge J. J. Trabucco, the jury will remain isolated until the completion of the case. Several jurors, taken by surprise, asked for a chance to arrange their affairs before going into the seclusion ordered by the court. Judge Trabucco denied this request.

Another change in the usual court procedure was ordered by Judge Trabucco when he decreed that beginning today court would be opened at 9:30 o'clock instead of ten in the morning and would close at 5 o'clock.

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
