## YOUTH SHOT BY DEPUTY WANTED AT TRAINING SCHOOL

Roy Jackson, alias Jack Lester, the young man recently wounded by Deputy Sheriff Leas, and now held on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, is to be taken to Salem tonight to complete a sentence in the Oregon state training school. He escaped from that institution August 5, 1926, and is wanted there to complete his sentence, which has five years to run. Sheriff Webb has been informed.

Jackson, or Lester as the boy is known at the state training school, has the reputation of being a "bad actor." He was first arrested in 1924 for forgery and served a short term in the state training school. In 1925 he shot and killed a playmate in an argument over a gun, and was sent to the training school again to remain until he reached the age of 21 years. He is now 17 years of age.

## PEGGY MARSH IS GIVEN A DIVORCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) LONDON, Feb. 1.—Peggy Marsh, the London chorus girl, who as a result of a wartime romance with Henry Field, Jr., grandson of Marshall Field, Chicago merchant, became involved in litigation over the Field estate, has been granted a divorce.

The petition was granted Monday in the London divorce court. It was filed in the name of Mrs. Annabel Bertha Fenwick, who was a widow at the time of her marriage in January, 1925, to Keld Robert Fenwick, of Witham Hall, Bourne, Lincolnshire. She charged her husband with misconduct at a hotel in Southampton. The suit was not defended and the court granted a decree nisi.

Peggy Marsh, in 1915 met Henry Field, Jr., and a romance followed which lasted a year. Afterward he married Miss Nancy Perkins, a niece of the Tanghorne sisters of Virginia. He died in June, 1917.

Miss Marsh brought suit in 1919 against the Field estate for her share. Henry Anthony Marsh, who was conceded to be a natural son of Henry Field. Two years later the supreme court of Illinois decided against the baby's claim on the ground that the will specifically excluded illegitimate offspring from inheritance. She received \$100,000 in the settlement of Henry Field's estate.

Miss Marsh married Albert L. Johnson, a nephew of the late mayor Tom L. Johnson of Cleveland, at Greenwich, Conn., on January 5, 1921. He died in New York in 1924.

## COURT TO MAKE CHANGE SPEEDING UP RUSH OF WORK

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—By limiting attorneys to less time for oral arguments, hastening work more rapidly to the judges for written opinion, and keeping one department of the court work in Salem when the other is at Pendleton for the eastern Oregon sessions, the supreme court expects in a few months to catch up with all pending work.

The change will be effective March 1, rules for the purpose having been amended yesterday.

The present attorney for the appellant has 30 minutes to open arguments, attorney for the respondent 30 minutes and then the appellant's attorney ten minutes for reply. Under the new rule the latter will be cut off, but appellant's attorney may, if he chooses, split his time and use ten minutes of it for reply. This will reduce the time from one hour and 10 minutes to one hour.

Department No. 1 will preside at the first Pendleton term following adoption of the rule, and thereafter the departments will alternate. Heretofore, with the entire court going to Pendleton, the court chambers at Salem have been idle during that time. Cases to be heard en banc will be heard at Salem.

Beginning March 1, two cases will be heard each forenoon, and three each afternoon, four a week. After the day's hearings, the judges will consult and each of the five cases will be assigned to a judge for written opinion. This new ruling will dispose of 30

cases a month. Since only 250 cases are now ready for hearing, this rate of progress should within a few months dispose of all pending cases.
