NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 3.—Mayor William Hale Thompson of Chicago was slightly cut about his face today when an automobile in which he was riding with Mayor Arthur J. O'Keefe of Los Angeles, struck a rut in the road and threw him against the top of the machine.

After being treated Mayor Thompson said the injuries were of no consequence and he and his party continued to the fair grounds race track. He arrived last night amidst a noisy din of riverboat, locomotive and factory whistles, heightened by the booming of cannon, to present the \$50,000 prize and gold cup to the winner in the New Orleans handicap today and to witness the William Hale Thompson handicap run at the fair grounds.

FORMER PROFESSOR DIES

EUGENE, Feb. 3.—Benjamin James Hawthorne, 90, retired attorney and former professor of the University of Oregon, died Friday morning at 11 o'clock at his home here.

Professor Hawthorne was born in Lauenburg county, Virginia, June 19, 1837. He was educated at Randolph Macon college from which he received the degree of master of arts in 1861. He taught in various schools and colleges and universities from 1865 to 1901. He spent one year in Virginia as principal of an academy, three years in Louisiana as headmaster of a collegiate institute, then as president of West Tennessee college 1873. He was professor of languages in Corvallis college, Oregon, until 1884, then professor of English literature and philosophy in the University of Oregon from 1884 to 1910, when he was retired as professor emeritus of psychology, and received from the university the degree of doctor of letters.

Funeral services will be announced later.
