GERMAN RUNNER TO HAVE COMPETITION

(Associated Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—Dr. Otto Peltzer, German track star, came back from New York today to begin intensive training for the Illinois Athletic Club games Friday night.

One of the men entered against him is Ray Dodge, a product of Oregon State College, who has run many a winning race for the I. A. C. and who will prepare himself on the same track as the German flash. Word from New York is that Lloyd Hahn will not take part in the meet, although I. A. C. officials said they had expected him to be here.

The games Friday will be run on a dirt track, said to be more popular than the board tracks with most entries. Additional competition for Dr. Peltzer was seen in the entries of Ray Conger and Jack Sittig.

Four crack college relay teams—Ames, Notre Dame, University of Michigan and the University of Iowa—are outstanding features of the meet. Laddie Myers, twice a member of the United States Olympic team, and Drockmueler, of Northwestern University, Big Ten star, are entered in the pole vault events.

Harold Osborn, holder of the world's record of 6 feet 8 1/2 inches, and Anton Burg, a probable Olympic entrant, are among the high jumpers to compete.

Gaines was convicted of slaying his daughter, Sylvia. The state supreme court affirmed the decision of the trial court that he should hang.

TO WIDEN HIGHWAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire) GRANTS PASS, Ore., Feb. 6.—Widening of the Caves highway is to be started immediately, equipment having arrived here this morning for the work. A steam shovel of one yard capacity is being taken to the road today. This work was started a year ago and it is expected that it will be completed by the opening of the tourist season.

CHAMPION SKI JUMPER

(Associated Press Leased Wire) REFSWING, Minn., Feb. 6.—For the fifth time in ten years Lars Haugen, St. Paul veteran, is the class A champion of the National Ski association. He outshone a large field at the national tournament yesterday, defending the honors he won at Denver a year ago. The judges gave him a total of 18,338 points for first place with Pedar Falstad of Canton, S. D., in second, with 18,258. Haugen's best jump covered 151 feet, three feet ahead of Falstad.

The class B title went to Steve Trostad, of Superior, Wis., who had graceful leaps of 149 and 137 feet. His point total was 18,392.

TRIS SPEAKER LANDS BERTH WITH ATHLETICS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Tris Speaker has landed with the Philadelphia Athletics. The veteran outfielder who was released a few days ago by the Washington Senators came to terms with Connie Mack and as a result will report at the Athletic training quarters at Port Myers, March 1.

Neither Tris nor Mack would comment on the salary arrangement.

LOWDEN INDORSED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Frank O. Lowden was endorsed today for the Republican presidential nomination by the house from Illinois districts outside of the city of Chicago.

McNARY'S FOREST WATER CONTROL BILL IS PASSED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Expenditure of \$40,000 over an eight year period on forest lands along watersheds was approved today by the senate. A bill by Senator McNary, Republican, Oregon, calling for the project was passed and sent to the house. An amendment by Senator Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, would restrict the purchases to 1,000,000 acres except for purposes of flood control.

FINAL HEARING ON MERGER PLAN OPENED BY COMMERCE COMMISSION

(Associated Press Leased Wire) TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 6.—Taking up the fourth and what is expected to be the final public hearing on the case, the Interstate Commerce Commission opened the question of the Great Northern-Northern Pacific railway merger for the testimony of northwest interests here this morning. Extra Brainerd, Jr., and C. D. Mahaffie of the commission are in charge of the hearing. A small army of officials and legal talent represents the two railways directly, while the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and three others are opposing the consolidation, has witnesses and attorneys present. The hearing is expected to take at least two days.

Portland is favoring the consolidation. The state of Oregon also has approved the merger plan. Seattle has thus far officially taken no position on either side. Yakima, Ellensburg, Auburn and other cities of this state are also opposing the consolidation program.

BROTHER MRS. HINKLE DEAD

George Fred Burger, a half brother of Mrs. Sarah Hinkle, pioneer of Douglas county, died January 25, this year, at his ranch home near Lakeport, California. He was 73 years of age. Mr. Burger was a native of Iowa. He came to Douglas county with other members of his family in 1863, spending a year on Deer creek, east of Roseburg. Then he moved to California, settling on the ranch that continued as his home until his death. He made a second visit here in 1879. He is survived by his wife, five sons and one daughter. He also leaves two sisters and a brother, Mrs. Hinkle, his half sister, resides in San Francisco with her daughter.

QUAKE REPORTED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MANILA, Feb. 6.—A severe earthquake took place today in Davao province, Mindanao Island of the Philippine archipelago. The quakes lasted two minutes. No reports of casualties or damage had been received late tonight. Davao province has a population of about 120,000, the majority of the inhabitants being moros. The region is almost entirely mountainous, rising abruptly from the seashore.

THREE DROWNED WHEN AUTO BREAKS THRU ICE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) OAKLAND, Maine, Feb. 6.—Of four persons who essayed a short cut in an automobile across the ice of Lake Umbagog yesterday, three were drowned, all of them women and the fourth, Brett Morse, 35, of Waterville, driver of the enclosed car in which all were riding, was saved.

Morse escaped from the machine as it sank in 18 feet of water and was pulled out by Harry Ware, husband of one of the women who perished.

The other two victims were Mrs. Eugene W. Strong and Miss Natalie Cole. Ware was riding in a machine which Morse was driving.
