producers of prunes are eligible to membership. Membership exists only so long as a marketing agreement remains in effect, and when ever the marketing agreement shall be allowed to lapse or is surrendered, then the membership of the grower is terminated. The annual meeting of the membership is fixed for the second Monday in April of each year. The by-laws carry the usual regulations concerning meetings, notices of call meetings, quorums, etc.

It provides for a board of directors composed of seven growers, and vests them with authority to "conduct, manage and handle the affairs and business of the association and make rules and regulations for the guidance of the officers and the management of its affairs," and "to appoint and remove at their pleasure all agents, officers and employees of the association, prescribe their duties, fix their compensation and require from them, if advisable, security for faithful service."

The directors receive no remuneration but may recover any actual expenditures in the way of expenses incurred in traveling, investigations, etc.

The directors are authorized to enter into contracts with members for receiving, shipping and marketing of their products, and to prepare suitable contracts for such purposes and to enter into contracts and agreements with persons, firms, associations or corporations for packing, handling, storing and selling the products of the association and its members.

Further authority is given to arrange for advances or loans to members on prunes delivered to the association.

The by-laws provide for the usual officers and outline the duties of each.

Marketing Agreement

Marketing agreement, signed by the grower, and detailing the

duties of each, is as follows:

Douglas Cooperative Prune Association Marketing Agreement

THIS AGREEMENT made this day of 1928, between the Douglas Cooperative Prune Association (a non-profit, non-capital stock association formed under the laws of the State of Oregon) having its principal office at Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, hereinafter called the Association, and the undersigned owner, grower or producer in said county, hereinafter called the Grower,

WITNESSETH, as follows:

1. Subject to the conditions mentioned in paragraph 2 below, the Grower agrees to deliver to the Association (for marketing) at shipping or processing point or points in said county that the management of the Association may designate, all evaporated prunes that the Grower may raise or control, produced within said county during the years 1928, 1929, 1930, 1931 and 1932; provided, however, that the Grower shall have the option and privilege, between March 15th and April 1st of any year after the year 1928, of declaring in writing this agreement at an end as to evaporated prunes thereafter to be grown or controlled by said Grower, and thereupon this agreement shall be at an end except as to settlement relating to previous deliveries.

2. This agreement is signed upon the express understanding that it shall not be binding upon the parties, or either of them, except pending the determination mentioned in this paragraph, unless and until similar marketing agreements for said years shall be entered into between similar associations, pools or corporations and the Grower, or controlling seventy-five (75) per cent of the total estimated prospective prune crops of the States of Oregon and Washington for the year 1928, the question of fact as to the signing up of such percentages to be determined by the Board of Directors of the Association, and upon the signing up of said percentages of crops said Board shall thereupon notify in writing all Growers of said county signing this and similar agreements, of that fact, and thereupon this agreement shall be deemed binding. Said determination may be made and said notice issued at any time prior to July 1, 1928, and the said determination of said Board of Directors shall be final and conclusive, except as to express fraud, and this agreement shall thereupon be in full force.

3. The Grower shall use due care to see that all prunes delivered under this agreement shall be seasonably and properly harvested, evaporated and delivered at his own expense. Prunes which the management of the Association shall deem to be in an unmarketable condition may be rejected.

4. The Grower signing this agreement must be a member of the Association and abide by its by-laws.

5. The Grower shall pay to the Association one (\$1.00) dollar per ton upon all evaporated prunes delivered under this agreement, which sum shall cover all expenses payable to the Association for handling and marketing said prunes (excepting storage and insurance charges) which \$1.00 per ton shall be deducted by the Buyer and be paid to the Association from the proceeds of sale before settlement with the Grower.

6. The Association agrees to use its best efforts and all due diligence and good faith in the sale of evaporated prunes delivered to it under this agreement, handling the same through an experienced sales manager, and endeavoring to obtain the best possible prices for said prunes, without commision, profit or compensation to itself other than said one dollar per ton above mentioned.

7. (a) While said prunes shall be in possession of the Association they shall be insured against loss by fire by the Association at the expense of the Grower, the premiums thereon to be also deducted by the Buyer from proceeds of sale and paid to the Association.

(b) Storage charges on all prunes held in storage shall be paid by the Grower, such charges to be also deducted by the Buyer from proceeds of sale and paid to the Association.

8. The Association shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules as to harvesting, evaporating, inspection, grading and handling of said prunes, for the protection of all growers.

9. If the Grower should desire to release to any particular packer his prunes for any year the Association will consent thereto provided it shall approve the price to be paid, that there may be no price-cutting to the detriment of growers generally. Without the express consent of the Association the Grower shall not deliver any prunes covered by this Agreement to any other person, firm, association or corporation.

10. The management of the Association shall issue to the members during each season such bulletins as to market conditions as may reasonably be necessary in order to keep the Grower informed as to such conditions.

11. The Association is not to be deemed an insurer of the prunes themselves, or liable for any loss or damage thereto not due to its own negligence. The duties and responsibilities of the Association are those resting upon a selling agency, subject to the terms and conditions herein expressed.

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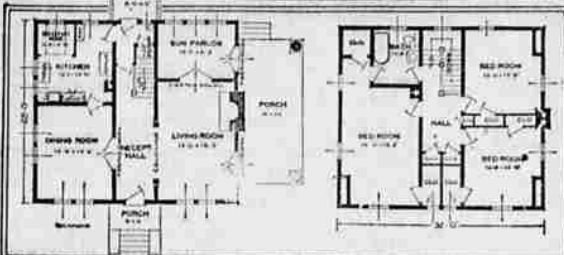
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"RICHMOND" WARMTH

BROCCOLI CARS TO START MOVING ABOUT FEB. 15

Present indications are that carload movements of broccoli will commence from the county between the 15th and 20th of this month. Fred Hamilton has already shipped out one carload to his firm, but the majority of the shipments are now being made by express and auto freight. Portland and Seattle are receiving the bulk of the early carload shipments.

Estimates have placed the yield this year at about 500 carloads, the percentage of maturity being higher than ever before, due to the perfect growing conditions experienced during the year. The quality is the best in the history of the industry and will command top prices. With the canneries preparing to utilize a large percentage of the crop not suitable for shipment, growers will have sufficient outlet for their product, and with a fair market should realize good returns.

Time Is Ripe

It is believed that the association planned by the Douglas County growers is by far the best ever advanced. Unless organization is perfected now it is doubtful if another plan can be put over for many years to come, for so many attempts have resulted in failure that another futile attempt will doubtless prevent any further action and will leave the growers disgruntled and at the mercy of a speculative and uncertain market. However, no other marketing plan has ever been started at such an opportune time as the present. Heretofore such efforts have always been just before the harvest season when growers were too busy to give attention to the plans, and such haste was required that the details were not carefully worked out. This plan has been in course of preparation for three months. It embodies all of the best ideas advanced in previous plans, and eliminates many of the objections, giving as it does central control in each county, yet linking all prime centers in Oregon and Washington in one system. It is being presented to the growers in plenty of time for them to give the matter careful consideration so that they need not rush blindly into something of which they have little knowledge. gregarious singing was under the leadership of Mr. Charles McElhinny. Dr. Louis Albert Banks led in prayer. Mrs. Elsie Carlton sang "The Old Rugged Cross." Rev. W. R. Baird, of the Christian church, preached on "The Message of Calvary." Mr. Baird said in part:

"If I were to ask you what is the highest mountain in the world you would answer Mt. Everest. Which the most powerful? You would answer some great volcano. Which the most beautiful? You Oregonians would answer Mt. Hood. But I want to talk to you tonight about a mountain whose height reached to the very throne of God—the power of which has affected the world more than all the volcanoes multiplied a million times, and from which has gone forth the most beautiful story ever told. The influence of this mountain, Calvary, will reach throughout eternity. Many crosses were set up on this mountain, but let us look at just three of them as pictured by Luke one of the Gospel writers.

"The first cross pictures death in sin. This man was a criminal and by man's judgment must die a physical death. He was also a sinner in God's sight, and was dying without any hope in the world to come. Near him was the Savior of the world, the One who could save to uttermost all who call upon Him. This man called but his call was the call of unbelief. 'If thou art the Son of God save thyself and us.' That little word 'If' kept him out of heaven, and it has kept millions of others since his day. Let us not be too hard on him. Please remember he was going through awful suffering, and probably his right mind, Man out of Christ tonight, you say must die a physical death. Are you going to die in sin? Near you, too, is the Savior tonight. What is your attitude toward Him? Are you letting that little word 'If' keep you out of the kingdom?"

"The second cross pictures death to sin. This man, too, was a criminal, and condemned to die. He, too, was a sinner in God's sight. Near him was that same Savior, but see the difference in his attitude toward Him. Hear him as he cries out, 'Lord when thou comest in Thy kingdom, remember me.' Think of his great faith. When the others had forsaken Him this dying thief confessed Him as Lord. Oh wonderful faith, no if. Hear Christ's answer: 'Verily, verily, I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise.' Friend out of Christ if you haven't this faith tonight I beseech you to study this blessed old Book until you get it.

"The third cross pictures death for sin. He who had never sinned was dying for the sins of the world. Why must He die? He died to reveal God's love. Romans 5:8, 'But God commendeth his own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us.' He died to shed his blood for the remission of sins. He died to reconcile man to God. He died to open a new and living way to God. He died that He might send the Holy Spirit. He died that He might be our advocate with the Father.

"Friends what does this cross mean to you tonight? If you haven't accepted and confessed Christ will you take your stand for Him now?"

Tonight and during the rest of the week, the meetings continue at the Presbyterian church. The musical program begins at 7:15. Tonight is Sunday school night, and teachers and pupils are to come in groups. Along with the other music the men's chorus from the M. E. church will sing.

GIANT AIRPLANE CARRIER PASSING THROUGH CANAL

COLON, Panama, Feb. 6.—Having climbed a narrow flight of three steps from the Atlantic Ocean, the giant aircraft carrier Saratoga today rode at anchor in Gatun Lake, 650 feet above sea level. Because of the great width of the ship it was considered that its voyage through the Gatun locks was the most difficult operation ever tried in the canal.

The anti-aircraft standard, part of the superstructure on the port side of the ship, peeled several feet of concrete from the top of the lock wall in passing through the middle and upper chambers. The concrete was peeled to a depth of three inches. This damage was considered slight and there was no damage to the Saratoga.

The Saratoga is 106 feet across at its widest point and the locks but 110 feet wide. The three locks through which the ship passed are 1,000 feet long and the Saratoga 888.

So carefully was the maneuver

ing of the great ship done that it required five hours for the trip of six miles from Colon to Gatun Lake. Three thousand persons gathered along the locks to watch the Saratoga pass through.

Three more lock chambers of the same dimensions lie between the ship and the Pacific, one at Pedro Miguel, lowering it to 55 feet above sea level, and two at Nippones before the level of the Pacific is reached.

Because of the heavy traffic in the canal, the Saratoga will not attempt this passage until tomorrow.
