DR. HALL GIVEN HIGH TRIBUTE BY SCIENCE COUNCIL

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 7.—(Special)—Rapid development in the Social Science Research Council, an organization international in scope, is reported in the annual report for 1927, which was made public today. Not only was the past year successful in progress, made on various scientific projects, but the coming year promises to see many more problems tackled and many more solutions advanced, the report states.

The high regard in which the council is held by educators and scientists throughout the United States is shown by the fact that finances exceeding \$2,000,000 have been subscribed for work during the next 10 years, and further funds are also in prospect.

The council has flourished under the direction of Charles Merriam, of the University of Chicago, retiring chairman, and much of the success of the work is attributed to Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, who has served as chairman on the committee on problems and policy. Dr. Hall also had charge of the annual session of the council, held at Hanover, due to his duties in Oregon. Dr. Hall is relinquishing his place as head of the committee, although he will remain a member.

Among the important research

projects authorized and under way by members of the council are: "Migration and Mechanization of Industry," "Internal Migration of American Negroes," "Survey of Social and Economic Research in Agriculture," "Statistical Inquiry into the Extent to Which the Business Activities of the County are Carried on by Corporations," "Study of the Trend of Pacific Agriculture from Subsistence Farming to Cash Crop Farming," "Study of the Pioneer Areas of Canada and the Northern Great Plains."

High tribute is paid Dr. Hall, of the University of Oregon, in the annual report. "President Hall has guided the research committee on problems and policy with energy and rare good nature," it says. "To the council's organization must be attributed much of the success of the Hanover Conference."

The committee of which Dr. Hall was the head has ten sub-committees, which undertake the supervision of all the research activity of the council.

MINER WHO "DUPLICATES" CRUCIFIXION REFUSES FREE SHOW FOR POLICE

VIENNA, Feb. 7.—Paul Diebel, a Silesian miner, well known for his simulations of the crucifixion of Christ on the cross with nails driven in his hands and feet, has been forbidden to perform in Vienna because he refused to give a free exhibition before police in order to prove genuineness of his performance.

Diebel says he does not mind performing before the police, but law but thinks he should be paid for it. In Munich he remained nailed to a cross for several hours, smoking cigarettes and joking with his audience.

MANY PAY LAST TRIBUTE AT BIER MARSHAL HAIG

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Feb. 7.—The body of Field Marshal Earl Haig, who was born in the county of Fife and rose to high command in the British army, lay in state in St. Giles Cathedral today.

Coming from London, where the British empire and the world paid the marshal last honors, Earl Haig received the tribute of his native countryside.

A detachment of the London Scottish regiment accompanied the body here and two squadrons of Royal Scots escorted the coffin from the station to the cathedral.

DEFUNCT BONDING HOUSE MAY FACE CRIMINAL TRIAL

Overbeck and Cooke Broke for Two Years Past, Is Declaration Made by Creditor.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 7.—Investigation of the books of Overbeck and Cooke, brokerage house which closed Tuesday, continued today, and county officers were considering whether criminal action may be taken as a result of the crash.

At a meeting of about 500 creditors at the Central Library last night, there were stormy outbursts and lively exchanges.

William G. McInnes, local accountant for the wrecked firm for the past seven years, was one of the speakers. He was jeered at and one creditor shouted indignantly, "Well, if you know so much why didn't you tell us before this?"

McInnes succeeded eventually in telling what he knew of the crash. Briefly, it was: The firm had been virtually bankrupt for the past two years. James P. Cooke, president, who is now suffering from a nervous breakdown, drew a salary of \$18,000 a year, and in addition to this had drawn during the past year something around \$150,000. Charles S. Goodwin, vice-president, drew \$10,000 and Howard F. Philpot, \$6,000 annual salaries. Philpot served as secretary.

Dan Malachuk, who had been attorney for the firm, declared that he had acted only in a minor way and that the crash was all news to him. He, too, had made investments and lost. He said the first he knew of the firm's financial troubles was when he was called by telephone at 4 o'clock in the morning and informed of conditions. He at once called a meeting in his office for the purpose of protecting both the creditors and the firm.

It developed that Logan and Bryan, the New York connection of the Overbeck and Cooke company, sent out detectives to check up on the investments of the local firm when the company was suspected of improper practices.

It also was disclosed that the company invested heavily in Underwood Typewriter stock and was caught in the juggling—buying long and selling short.

PLANS REVISED FOR DORMITORY AT UNIVERSITY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 7.—(Special)—Plans for the men's dormitory, to be erected at the University of Oregon within a few weeks, have been revised, according to a statement issued by Ellis F. Lawrence, university architect.

The revision provides for the accommodation of 271 students instead of 228 as first announced. The building will be located near the university tennis courts, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth avenues. It will be east of the Women's building, and north of the R. O. T. C. barracks.

Instead of units to hold 28 men each, the plan has been changed to hold from 37 to 51 in each unit. There will be six units in all. The design of the units is such that only two men will occupy a suite, which will consist of a study and dressing room and a sleeping alcove.

The building will be "U" shaped, and practically four stories in height. The first floor will be slightly below the level of the ground, but will be in no sense a basement. Style of architecture will be Georgian, and the structure will be constructed of reinforced concrete and steel, with a wooden roof over which will be laid slate shingles. This will make it practically fireproof throughout, since all partitions will be of fire-proof material.

The cost of the building is to be approximately \$300,000, and the increase in student capacity will raise the estimate only slightly.

The kitchen facilities are capable of feeding 500 men, and all men quartered in university buildings, and others who now board at Friendly Hall but live elsewhere will take their meals here. A special training table for athletes will be used, and a "regents dining hall" will be for special committees.

Excavation for the new building is expected to start within a month, and it is planned to have the structure ready for occupancy by the time the University opens next fall.
