POULTRY NOTES

LATEST ADVICE PUBLISHED ON INCUBATING AND BROODING CHICKENS

More than 100,000,000 pullets are needed yearly to take the place of the mature hens retired from the flocks and marketed because they have passed their prime as egg producers. It is estimated that there are more than 300,000,000 hens in the United States on farms and in poultry plants, or an allowance of nearly three hens working for each man, woman and child in the country.

To prepare for more efficient hatching and brooding of next year's crop of chicks the United States Department of Agriculture has issued Farmers' Bulletin No. 1538-F, "Incubation and Brooding of Chickens," which brings up to date the best procedure and supersedes earlier bulletins No. 1363-F and 1376-F. It may be obtained by applying to the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

In particular, farmers and poultry specialists are urged to hatch chicks early in order to bring pullets to the laying age in time to supply the autumn market when egg prices are highest, that is, between late August and January first, after which the general run of pullets and hens are laying and prices drop to what is usually the low point of the year in April. The use of the incubator and brooder is recommended as the most economical and labor-saving way of reproducing the flock, and also the most certain means of insuring an early hatch. Another advantage of early hatching is that it allows the cockerels more time to build good bodies and cover them with meat. This is true whether they are sold on the generally high priced July market as broilers, or are held for marketing as roasters for the Thanksgiving and Christmas season markets. "One of the great troubles with the marketing of poultry in the United States," the bulletin says, "is the excessive number of immature, scrawny chickens sent to market. Early hatching will do a great deal to counteract this condition, because the cockerels will have a longer season in which to build proper frame, and then will have some time to put on a finish."

For hatching, a careful selection of eggs is important from the standpoint of profit and for improvement of stock. The male breeders should be placed in the pens a month before eggs are to be saved. Eggs should be gathered frequently to prevent chilling. All eggs for hatching should be uniform in shape and size, sound in shell and of good size—no eggs weighing less than 2 ounces should be used. Eggs deteriorate rather rapidly if held longer than 5 days and none should be saved for incubation more than 10 days.

A new practice advised in this bulletin deals with cooling the eggs during incubation. It has

usually been the custom to cool the eggs daily until close to hatching time. The previous bulletin on incubation advised this. "Recently," says the bulletin, "this practice has been discarded generally and seems to be necessary only when the temperature of the incubator has been a little high."

Another new feature is the great attention paid to the use of electricity in heating both incubators and brooders.

Particular attention is paid to sanitation in both processes, and it is emphasized that it is well to place brooder coops on different land each year. After a season of use the coops should be removed and the ground cropped and cultivated for a year before it is used again for rearing young chickens.

Other sections give detailed advice as to the details of incubation, the proper location of incubators and brooders, the treatment preferred when hens are used for hatching and brooding, the day-old chick industry, and the care of chicks after the brooding season.

FARM REMINDERS

Oregon fruit growers contemplating the use of oil spray for the control of San Jose scale are advised by the experiment station to spray during moderate weather. Application of oil to fruit trees during or immediately before freezing weather results in serious injury and even death of the trees.

In buying land plaster the grower will find a variation in price per ton of the various brands on the market. This is due to the fact that the material varies in percentage of calcium sulphate. Land plaster is most economically bought on the basis of the amount of calcium sulphate contained. A brand analyzing 80 per cent is worth about 8-9 of what a brand analyzing 90 per cent is worth, the experiment station explains.

Station reports indicate that garden slugs will probably be abundant in Oregon this spring and do much damage. Hard freezing is not particularly harmful to slugs as they may freeze then "come to" and continue to do damage. Slugs also stand high water unless washed away. To protect the plant spray with Bordeaux followed by a bait consisting of chopped lettuce leaves or diced carrots sprinkled with calcium arsenate.

The growth of cover crops in Oregon orchards can be increased with a top dressing of a soluble nitrogen fertilizer such as sodium nitrate or sulphate of ammonia. It is applied sometime during the month of February at the rate of 100 to 200 pounds per acre, says the experiment station.

BAD CHECK ARTIST VICTIMIZES TWO LOCAL MERCHANTS

Transient Giving Name of Geo. C. Wilson Sought by the Authorities; Booty Is \$41.

A man using the name of George C. Wilson cashed bad checks in large amounts on two local merchants Monday afternoon and is now being sought by local police, who have sent out descriptions to officers both north and south of this city to aid in the apprehension of the check artist.

Wilson is believed by local police to have come to Roseburg Saturday. He had rented an empty house on South Stephens street belonging to Carl Ohman of this city. Yesterday afternoon he went to the McKean, Darby and Baldwin furniture store where he purchased furniture, giving the firm a check for \$50 and receiving \$16 in change. He later went to Powell's Furniture store on Jackson street, there also making purchases in furniture amounting to \$25. A \$50 check was cashed, and half that amount received in return. After making the purchases at both furniture houses Wilson left instructions that the goods was to be delivered to the South Stephens street residence.

When the two firms attempted to cash the checks at the bank it was found that Wilson had no credit there. Upon calling at the house on South Stephens street it was discovered that Wilson was not there but had left the furniture in the place. Search for him here proved futile and police have notified officers in other cities north and south to be on the lookout for the man. He is about five feet ten inches in height, weighs about 160 pounds and is about 35 years old. He wore a reddish brown suit, officers learned and was seen last week to be dressed in a logging outfit.

HEFLIN AGAIN IN ERUPTION; CLAIMS PRESS DAUBS HIM

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Senator Heflin of Alabama renewed his attacks in the senate today on newspapers which he said had misrepresented him during his controversy with Senator Robinson, the democratic leader, over his remarks about Governor Smith and what he termed the "Roman Catholic political machine."

Reading from a prepared manuscript—which is unusual with him—the Alabamian declared that the entire list of papers "which have slandered me" were controlled by the machine.

"These newspapers responded with their attack as the pig responds before the avill with a happy squeal," the Alabamian shouted.

Certain Massachusetts democrats, who said several days ago that they would not attend the Houston democratic convention if Heflin were not repudiated, were declared by the Alabamian senator to have "placed the Catholic machine above the democratic party."

EMPTY TITLED GRAND DUCHESS ENROUTE U. S.

Daughter of Assassinated Czar of Russia to Be Mrs. Leeds' Guest.

EXPERIENCES SEVERE

Jaw Broken by Rifle Butt, Suicide Once Tried and Son Stolen From an Orphanage.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—Mme. Anastasia Tchaikovsky, around whose claims to the title of Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna, daughter of late Czar Nicholas of Russia, an international controversy has raged, will arrive in New York tonight to be the guest of Mrs. William B. Leeds, the former Princess Xenia of Greece.

She is aboard the liner Berengaria under an assumed name, said Cleb Botkin, son of the physician to the late imperial family, who has an affidavit from Mrs. Leeds naming him as her representative arranging for the woman's entry to this country. Mrs. Leeds, he said, had arranged with Washington officials for Mme. Tchaikovsky's entry before leaving for the West Indies on January 28. Mr. Botkin says he played with the grand duchess Anastasia as a child and he regards the claims of Mme. Tchaikovsky as genuine.

Identity Disputed
The Russian woman's identity as the daughter of the late czar is credited by Prince Constantin Gabriel, leader of the Russian refugees in Berlin, as well as by Mrs. Leeds and other followers of the Romanoff family in this country. The claims have met with frequent denials in Europe. The woman has been variously called the wife of a Polish assassin posing as the grand duchess, a demented Polish peasant and an escaped patient from a German insane asylum.

Mrs. Leeds is bringing Mme. Tchaikovsky to this country in the hope that new scenes will revive in her the desire to live. She has been under the care of physicians in Berlin for several years. While in this country she will also consult dentists. Her jaw was broken, she says, by the butt of the rifle of one of her guards and later badly resal.

Marries Rescuer
Mr. Botkin says that she escaped the fate of the imperial family, killed in the Ural by guards after the overthrow of the dynasty, through the aid of a young soldier, Tchaikovsky. Then, as this version has it, she went to Rumania where she married her rescuer and gave birth to a son. Leaving the boy in an orphanage near Bucharest after her husband was killed by Soviet agents, she went to Berlin to place her claims before Russian royalist there. After an attempted suicide in Berlin in 1920 she was confined to a hospital for months. The boy was taken from the orphanage by three persons whose identity has never been learned.
