FARM REMINDERS

When eggs are on the downward trend the poultrymen need a full egg basket to pay the feed bill. The experiment station advises the use of lights where possible and the feeding of wet mash in Oregon to guard against a drop until spring conditions assure high production.

Clothes moths can be reduced in any home or establishment, say station authorities, if proper control measures are used. Persons owning clothes subject to attack can afford to buy chests or cabinets that are very tight in which to store them. Red cedar chests keep out the moths and the characteristic odor of their wood kills any newly hatched or young moth larvae that may be in them with the clothes.

Spring harrowing of fall sown grain is not recommended as a result of many trials at the Oregon experiment station. The harrowing very often reduces the yield by tearing out many plants.

Good barley seed is hard to obtain unless ordered early. Because of high feeding value the best varieties of barley are sometimes gone by seeding time. Hanchen is the best variety for western Oregon, finds the experiment station.

Flax will be guarded against by treating the seed with formaldehyde before planting. This disease was noted in Oregon last summer in seed which had not been treated. Further soil infection also prevented by this treatment.

VICE-PRESIDENT OREGON U. TELLS OF FUTURE PLANS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—Happy to be back in what he has always termed "his native state" Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the University of Oregon, arrived in Portland today. He was accompanied by Mrs. Barker, who also declared she was glad to be "home."

He will take care of public relations for the university and will also direct the activities of the Barker, son of Oregon pioneers who crossed the plains in 1847, announced upon his arrival that his salary earned at the university would be used to erect a memorial to "the Oregon pioneer mother." While details of the memorial will be announced later, Barker said that it would probably be named in honor of his own mother, and that it would symbolize and pay homage to all brave women who came to the Oregon country in the early days. The memorial will be placed at Salem.

In an interview Barker summarized his plans for the University of Oregon.

To increase the size of the campus in order to prepare for the future growth of the university.

To have beautiful surroundings for the homes of the university teachers.

To have men eminent in the fields of the arts, science and literature on the faculty—men and women who are world famous in the special work.

To provide a pension system for the professors.

To have every graduate and every former student of the university give it a stated sum each year as a part of that person's annual budget.

Unless Joie Ray stages a successful comeback, Hahn appears likely to be the only first class miller Uncle Sam will have available for the trip to Amsterdam.

Hahn has made a show of all his rivals so far, including Ray Connolly, the national mile champion, and the best of the middle distance crop from the east and middle west. He has won eight straight races and should haul up his ninth victory in the Newmark A. C. games tonight.

Only at the half mile is Hahn up against much opposition. Over that route Phil Edwards, the fleet New York University negro star, is capable of pushing Lloyd but that is about all.

MALE COMPANION OF YOUNG GIRL IS JAILED AT EUGENE

Renton, Washington, Pair Picked Up in Stolen Auto; Elopement or Kidnapping?

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 8.—Charged with kidnapping the young girl with whom he was arrested here last night, Ernest Waterhouse, 26, is being held in the Lane county jail at the request of Tacoma, Washington, authorities.

Waterhouse and Miss Ada Bunfill were arrested by Chief of Police Jess Smith and Traffic Officer Herbert Moore, both of Springfield, four miles from here, last night.

The girl claims to be 18 years of age, but officers declare she appears to be but about 13. The two were reported to have stayed at an auto camp ground at Mabel Monday night. The two were arrested without resistance. Lane county authorities declared this morning they were absolutely convinced that the couple were not married.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 8.—Ernest Waterhouse, 26, arrested near Eugene, Oregon, last night, in company with Ada Bunfill, 15, is wanted in Seattle on an open charge. A search was instituted for the girl, who disappeared with the girl Monday, when she left her home at Renton, on the outskirts of Seattle, ostensibly for school.

The girl's parents said they did not know whether their daughter had left voluntarily with Waterhouse, or was kidnapped. Reports to sheriff's offices were that the couple were riding in a coupe bearing the Washington license plate 44-393, reported stolen from A. C. Miller of Port Townsend.

UMPQUA POST HAS PLAN FOR FLYING FIELD

fore the council with a request that a special election be called to consider the issuance of \$25,000 in bonds to purchase and improve the field.

There is no question but that such a field is of absolute necessity if Roseburg is to keep in step with aviation. The fast moving ships of the present time, carrying heavy loads, require fields with long runways and open approaches. The field selected by the American Legion post has these advantages, and, in fact, will afford even more room than the Portland field, which is considered one of the best in the state.

The tract of land is nearly 5,000 feet long by 1200 feet in width. Except for one small knoll in the extreme south end the field is level and open. Open fields at each end give additional space for emergency landings after takeoffs.

With such a field in prospect, Roseburg has an opportunity to take advantage of its natural geographic location to become an air center of the state. With its highway connections with the coast, Roseburg has an ideal situation as a passenger terminal for air transport lines. Then, too, the climatic conditions are such that a landing may always be made at Roseburg when conditions elsewhere prevent flying. This has been found by the mail planes to be a great factor in handling the air mail during inclement weather and will doubtless affect passenger flying similarly.

Aviation has made such progress on the Pacific coast and is gaining ground so rapidly that cities that do not meet requirements now will soon be in the discard so far as aviation activities are concerned. Roseburg does not desire, it is believed, to lose such an opportunity, and consequently the American Legion organization has been very active and has expended much money and a great deal of time to bring this proposition to the residents of the city for their approval.

It now rests with the voters as to the final action to be taken. There is no question but that the field selected is entirely suitable and by far the best that can be had in the immediate vicinity of Roseburg. This was proven yesterday when three navy planes, seeking an emergency landing field, selected that place as the only field upon which they could make a safe landing, and despite its unimproved condition came down there without mishap.

Each of the navy pilots stated that the field, with little improvement, would be ideal. It is now very wet, but drainage will take care of that difficulty and the presence of a stream along one side of the field makes drainage inexpensive and easy. The old county road, formerly used as the highway between Roseburg and Winchester, is within 100 feet of the east edge of the field, so that it is easily accessible.

The council will be asked to call a special election to consider the proposed bond issue for the very near future and it is hoped that the field will be approved by the voters of the city at that time.

FORUM LUNCHEON WELL ATTENDED

There was a good attendance at the forum luncheon held today noon at the Umpqua hotel, with a splendid musical program provided by Mrs. C. S. Helms, Lymon Spencer and Bill Whitpie. President J. A. Harding presided and introduced the local speakers, which included Joe Denn, Dr. A. C. Seely, C. H. Parker and A. C. Masters, each of whom spoke on a subject of vital interest to the community. Secretary Cully made a number of important announcements concerning future conventions to be held in Roseburg and the governor's caravan to carry greetings to the governor of California, which will pass through the city Monday, Feb. 20. He urged that representative citizens join the caravan here and go to Sacramento, stressing the advertising advantages to be gained. The meeting closed with an announcement from Tom Newcomb concerning future programs of the forum.
