STONE QUARRIES ARE SEARCHED FOR BODIES OF OFFICERS

KOKOMO, Ind., Feb. 10.—Search was begun here today of four stone quarries in quest of John P. Grove and Wallace McClure, deputy sheriffs of Tippecanoe county, who mysteriously disappeared Tuesday while enroute to the Pendleton, Indiana, state reformatory with two prisoners.

Acting on word purporting to have come from Samuel Baxter and John Burns, the prisoners who likewise disappeared, Sheriff Charles M. Johnson and a posse arrived here from Lafayette, Ind., today.

A letter postmarked in Illinois, Johnson said, contained this statement: "You will never get us but if you want your two deputy sheriffs you will find their bodies in a Kokomo stone quarry."

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 10.—A jury in the circuit court last yesterday, after three minutes deliberation, returned a verdict for E. G. Dow, who was sued by John Bovard for \$25,000 alleged damages, for remarking in the presence of others, that Bovard had broken into his house last November.

Dow admitted the impeachment, but said it was spoken in jest, and that when he learned Bovard's feelings were hurt, apologized.
