that three others had been left behind. Efforts of rescue parties were handicapped by smoke and heavy fumes which penetrated the mine to the 1800-foot level. The rescuers concentrated in attempting to bring out the men believed to be still under ground.

Long Beach Has Fire
LONG BEACH, Calif., Feb. 10.—An early morning explosion in an absorption plant at 32nd and Atlantic streets, inside the city limits of Long Beach, rocked a considerable section of the city and started a fire which resulted in serious injury to one man and the destruction of four oil derricks.

The blast occurred in the plant of the Signal Gas company. Sheets of flame were shot hundreds of feet into the air.

Ray Thompson of Bellflower, near here, was on watch at the time. He was badly burned about the head and arms and is reported in serious condition at a hospital here. Virtually all of his clothing was burned from his body.

Six derricks were ignited, but two were saved.

The loss was estimated by officials of several oil companies affected as \$100,000.

Voice Saves Crowd
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10.—The songs of a Spanish soprano averted panic in the Iris Theater here last night, when the severest earthquake in several years rocked the city.

So intense was the tremor which occurred at 10:40 p. m., that telegrams were thrown out of order and no official record of the movement was available today. The earthquake lasted for several minutes.

Angela Ottein, Spanish soprano, was giving a concert in the Iris Theater when the building commenced to rock. Terror-stricken spectators jumped from their seats and started for the exits. The orchestra stopped playing, but the soprano sang on, averting a stampede.

At various motion picture theaters people rushed through the darkness for the exits and fought frantically to gain the street. No casualties have been reported, however.

Quake Felt
VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Feb. 10.—A severe earth tremor was felt here last night, lasting eight seconds. Many persons fled from the theaters and their homes.

Two Miners Dead
NORTH BAY, Ont., Feb. 10.—Two men are dead and 34 others in danger of suffocation as a result of fire which broke out in the Hollinger mine at Timmins today. The fire swept thru the 550-foot level, filling the mine with dense smoke and fumes.

Martin Stevens and Harry Graham were suffocated by smoke from burning rubbish in an abandoned section of the mine. Thirty-four of their comrades were trapped between the third and sixth levels, more than 500 feet underground while rescue workers battled feverishly to reach them.
