CHICAGO GRAND OPERA COMPANY TO DRAW CROWD

Three hundred people, including 28 world renowned opera stars, will make up the personnel of the Chicago Grand Opera Company which is scheduled for a season of four performances of grand opera at the Public Auditorium in Portland March 22, 23 and 24. The entire company, with two special trains and a third train made up of 18 75-foot baggage cars full of scenery and equipment, starts for the Pacific coast the first week in March.

The Portland engagement, which has been underwritten by a committee of 100 citizens, will cost \$62,000 and will be by far the biggest theatrical and civic attraction of the year. It is to be presented by the city as a civic undertaking with all profits going to the Portland Community Chest.

The performance in Portland will be on the same mammoth scale as the operas are presented in Chicago. The operas will be presented by the same artists and with the complete Chicago orchestra, ballet and chorus and scenery, costumes and effects. The magnitude of the stage at the Portland Auditorium will enable use of all the company's scenery and equipment with alteration and the operas here will be on the same magnificent scale as in the eastern musical centers where the company appears annually.

The sale of seats has been opened at Sherman Clay & Co.'s music store in Portland. Orders from out of town are being taken by mail and all information as to prices and repertoire is being forwarded from that office. Every indication points to capacity houses at all four performances.

FEBRUARY TERM OF CIRCUIT COURT CONVENES MONDAY

The grand jury for the February term of circuit court met this morning for the regular session. Owing to the illness of one of the members it was necessary to take a recess until afternoon. The grand jury has several matters of importance for consideration and will probably remain in session for the rest of the week. The McConnell poisoning case will probably come up for investigation as will a statutory charge against a young man from Days Creek, who was arrested some time ago, and is now out on bail. Several matters of a secret nature are also awaiting investigation.

Judge Hamilton called the lawyers of the city together today and went over the docket, getting cases set for trial and otherwise making ready for the regular term which opens on next Monday.

Due to the new law, which allows persons arrested for crime to plead guilty without grand jury indictment, the work of the circuit court has been materially reduced and few criminal cases have been brought up for trial since this law became effective, and as there are few important civil cases ready for trial it is not expected that there will be any large amount of work for the jury during the February term.

pool hall swung open and Owsley and Porter, their faces flushed with excitement, entered, revolvers drawn.

They opened fire almost immediately. At such range a bullet on the wall behind the bar was reduced to splinters of glass. There was a general exodus of inmates of the pool hall. Out the windows, through the back door streamed scores of cowboys and livestock men, fearful lest a stray bullet should "pick" one of them.

Owner Takes a Shot

Howard was not in the pool room when the trouble started, the report to authorities stated. He was in a rear room of the building. Hearing shots he grabbed an automatic pistol and striding into the pool room as others were trying to get out, he commanded the two young men to cease firing.

They laughed at him, the sheriff's office was informed, and continued firing at bottles and lights. Again the aged pioneer issued a sharp command and again the cowboys laughed.

Suddenly the grizzled veteran who had seen 50 Lake county summers leveled his revolver at Porter and fired. The shell was defective, but the bullet went true, however, and struck Porter on the breast, inflicting a black and blue mark on the chest, authorities said.

Old Man Wounded

Then, authorities said, one of the two men leveled his revolver at the old man. The revolver cracked and a bullet pierced the old man's mouth, ranged down and came out in the back of the neck. He fell seriously wounded.

Today these two young men are behind the bars of the Lakeview jail. The fun of Sunday's spree is but a wild dream and they are now faced with prosecution by the state.
