### BRUCE CALDWELL TO PLAY BASEBALL

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 15.—Bruce Caldwell, football star in college last fall, to be in Yale's lineup against Princeton and Harvard because he played a game while a freshman at Brown, will wind up his college days this spring as a varsity baseball player. He is a senior.  
The rule at Yale under which the board of athletic control declared Caldwell ineligible to represent Yale on the gridiron is applicable specifically as to the sport in which the status of a player is questioned and is not all inclusive as regards other sports. Caldwell was deemed ineligible in football but the right to play in any other sport is unquestioned.  
Caldwell is a strong right hand batter, has been on second base, but will try out for the first base. Beyond college days which end in June looms the possibility of demands for his services by a major league team. An injured ankle kept him out of baseball last season.

### CHALIAPIN'S SECOND WIFE IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—Feodor Chaliapin's second wife, whose marriage to the opera singer had been veiled in secrecy, was in New York today.  
The present Mme. Chaliapin, who was Mme. Marie Potchouk, a Russian refugee in Paris, arrived on the Mauretania incognito and left the boat without being recognized. Her marriage to Chaliapin first became generally known when she applied to the American consul in Paris for a visa last month. The visa was held up by the consul pending investigation.  
Chaliapin left his first wife twenty-one years ago, but because of her religious refusal to grant him a divorce. Under the Soviet divorce laws, which do not require consent of the second party, he obtained a divorce in Moscow last November and married his present wife in Paris in December.

### ARRANGING FALL GAME.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Feb. 15.—Syracuse University will play New Brunswick in football at Lincoln next fall instead of at Archbold Stadium as the original contract between the schools called for. Nebraska officials requested the change to allow the addition of army to their schedule and the athletic governing board of Syracuse University ratified the shift.  
The game will be played October 29. The Cornhuskers are now scheduled to appear in Syracuse in the fall of 1929.

## OWNERS OF AUTO CAMPS TO MEET HERE NEXT WEEK

### Annual Convention of State Association Monday and Tuesday.

### OVER 300—EXPECTED

### Governor Will Speak to Group for Few Minutes Monday According to Plans.

Auto camp owners and managers from all parts of the state will meet in Roseburg Monday and Tuesday of next week for the annual convention of the Oregon Auto Camp association. This will be the first convention of the organization to be held in Roseburg since it was organized here five years ago.  
Roseburg has the honor of having been the first place where camp ground owners and managers ever met in a group for consideration of mutual problems. The auto camp industry having at that time been in its infancy. Up to that time auto camps had been operated on a free basis, and it was at the Roseburg meeting, five years ago, that a schedule of uniform rates was adopted. The protest immediately went up that pay camps would not exist, but since they were inaugurated, they have become the rule rather than the exception and now auto camps are to be found every mile or so along the highways of the state.  
Courtesy and service for the tourists are the aims of the camp ground owners and these meetings are being held each year to secure new ideas and to make an outline plans and policies for attracting more and more people to the state.

The local convention is to be held in the Knights of Pythias hall morning and afternoon, Monday and Tuesday. The wives of the owners and managers are also to be present and as the dates permit traveling to Roseburg on Sunday and returning on Washington's birthday, a holiday, the dates are ideal. It is believed, to secure an exceptionally large attendance.  
The local committee is expecting to entertain 300 or more persons. A fine program has been arranged, one of the chief features of which will be a general discussion of the camp industry. Authorities on sanitation, legislation and cooperation will be present to make addresses. A large delegation is expected from California representing the camp owners of that state.  
Monday the governor's caravan is to be in Roseburg at noon on the way to California. It is planned to have the governor meet the auto camp owners for a few minutes and to make a brief address before the convention.
