HOOVER-LOWDEN BOTH "DRYS" SAYS TEMPERANCE UNION

EVANSTON, Ill., Feb. 17.—The Women's Christian Temperance Union gives Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, and Frank O. Lowden, former Illinois governor, "dry" records.

Both Hoover and Lowden have signified their willingness to have their names entered in Republican presidential primaries.

In letters to Iowa W. C. T. U. officers who sought information for primaries soon to be held in Iowa, Mrs. Anna Marden de Yo, secretary of the temperance organization, wrote of Hoover:

"In the interview at Washington, Mr. Hoover said 'There is no question in my opinion that prohibition is making America more productive. There can be no doubt of the economic benefits of prohibition. I think increased temperance over the land is responsible for a good share of the enormously increased efficiency in production which statistics gathered by the Department of Commerce show to have followed passage of the dry law.'"

"Former Governor Lowden has had a consistently dry record," Mrs. De Yo commented, "and in a recent statement to newspapers at Washington said in effect he was standing for the 18th amendment and the enforcement of the law."

UNKNOWN MAN IS HERO IN GIVING BLOOD SAVE LIFE

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 17.—Mrs. Mary Delajays, 28, had a chance for life today—a chance afforded by the blood of an unidentified man, one of scores who responded to a radio appeal for blood to save her life.

Mrs. Delajays entered a hospital here January 29, suffering from a complication of diseases. Yesterday her condition became worse. Dr. Otto J. Printz asked if there was anyone who might give her blood.

"There's no one except my husband," she said. "He is at the county jail charged with robbery."

Last night a blood transfusion became imperative. The county jail was called but the husband had been taken to the penitentiary at Jefferson City.

Then Dr. Printz called the radio station of the Kansas City Star, asking that an appeal for blood be broadcast. The man was selected and transfusion made as the wife looked on. Mrs. Delajays was reported greatly improved.

STUDENT FOUND DEAD

COUNTY'S FIRST W. C. T. U. HEAD IS DEAD AT 89

Mrs. Lusina C. Williams
Long Identified With Purposeful Work.

EX-OFFICER W. R. C.

Biblical Historian and 40 Years Methodist; Many Descendants Mourn Her Demise.

Mrs. Lusina Clark Williams, one of Oregon's pioneer women and organizer and first county president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in Douglas county, passed away at about 12 o'clock last night at Mercy hospital, Mrs. Williams had not been in good health for some time. She was 89 years of age.

She was a native of Indiana, born March 3, 1838, and spent her early girlhood in that state. She married Joseph Knight of Dover, Delaware, at Greencastle, Indiana, and to their union were born eight children, four of whom survive her. Three died in infancy, and one, Ralph Monmseler Knight, died at Canyonville about two years ago.

Mrs. Williams was a descendant of the Marsters family, one of a long line of prominent people. She was one of the first women of Indiana to take up medical science and was a wonderful Biblical historian.

Come to Oregon in 1888
When all the children were small Mr. Knight died, and his widow and family came to Oregon and settled in the early Coos river country. After this brother passed away, Mrs. Knight again married, this time to Henry Williams, a soldier of the Civil war. She was again widowed and after the death of her second husband brought her children to Roseburg, where she lived for many years.
