OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 18.—Vesta Beckley, sophomore in commerce, and Edna Blomstrom, senior in vocational education, both of Roseburg have been appointed committee chairmen of their departments in the educational exposition. Miss Beckley's work will be in the office methods and appliances and Miss Blomstrom's in the swimming section of the physical education display.

All of the work in the commerce exhibit has been arranged by the students of the different classes, display boards being made by the several divisions of the courses offered. Demonstrations in typing and the use of the various kinds of machines and office appliances will be given.

Delta Psi Kappa, women's national honorary in physical education, Physical Education club and Women's Athletic association will be in charge of the display rooms of the physical education exhibit. Equipment used in physical education classes in team and individual sports, swimming, dancing and corrective work are features of the exhibit. Orange "O" sweaters and awards will be shown by the Women's Athletic association.

The exposition, in which every department of the college takes part, is expected to draw more than a thousand visitors, the majority of whom are regular delegates from the state high schools. The opportunity of becoming acquainted with the work offered here, of comparing it with that of other institutions and of securing expert vocational guidance is offered annually through the exposition.
