CIRCUIT COURT MEETING TODAY IN REGULAR TERM

Contract Violation Charged in Case Being Heard by Jury—Two Are Sentenced.

Circuit Court met today in the regular February term, the first case for jury action being that of James M. Watkins against Henry Denley. The action is one in which Mr. Watkins claims to have entered into an agreement whereby Mr. Denley was to grow, permit on land to be furnished by Mr. Watkins and the proceeds were to be shared. Watkins claims that Denley failed to fulfill the contract and asks damages in the sum of \$500. Denley, on the other hand, claims that the agreement provided that Watkins was to furnish the peppermint roots. He says that he prepared the land and made it ready for planting, but that when he demanded the roots in accordance with the agreement, Watkins failed to provide them. He asks for damages in the sum of \$75 from Watkins. Attorney R. L. Whipple appears for the plaintiff and Attorney John Long for the defense.

The court today granted citizenship papers to John Lamoreaux, who, although a native born American, took out papers in Canada while living there, and since returning to the United States desired to have his citizenship restored.

Eldon Swan, who was indicted by the grand jury for larceny, being accused of stealing a circular saw from a sawmill, entered a plea of guilty when arraigned before Judge Hamilton and was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary but was paroled in the custody of Jess Hodges.

Eben Mode, indicted for carrying concealed weapons in a motor vehicle, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and paroled. He is now serving time for possession of liquor.

Herman Dunkel, indicted on a charge of attempted larceny, entered a plea of not guilty and his case was set for March 2.

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LIST OF MISSING FROM FERRY BOAT INCREASED TO 5

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—With the reported list of missing persons increased to five by the addition of a young woman's name the federal investigation into the accident aboard the ferryboat Peralta was scheduled to reopen in the custom house here today.

Miss Isabel Robertson, Oakland, was reported missing yesterday by her mother, who said her daughter had been absent from home since Friday afternoon. The girl was believed to have taken the Peralta to Oakland after shopping in San Francisco.

Other persons still reported missing, besides Miss Robertson, were J. W. Collins, Hugh Findlay, Evelyn Craft and Daniel Pether.

Coast guard and police boats cruised the bay yesterday but did not locate any bodies, although the body of a woman was reported seen floating in the water Saturday.

Findlay and Collins probably were drowned, Key Route officials were reported to have stated, at the same time declining to speculate on the fates of the other missing persons.

STATE PRESS COMMENT

An Endless Chain

Representative Laguardia has replied to Senator Borah's prohibition questionnaire with one of his own asking if the Idaho senator will favor a bill asking for an enormous appropriation to enforce the prohibition law. He points out that competition in Mr. Borah's state has been so keen, that the price of liquor has been forced down from \$14 a gallon to \$8.

Idaho, Montana and Utah constitute one prohibition enforcement district to which is assigned 50 prohibition agents. That makes one agent to every 40,000 square miles which is about two-thirds the area of the state of Oregon.

Allowing one agent to every 1000 square miles would require 1600 agents for the state of Idaho alone. Instead of the present 50 for Idaho, Montana and Utah. That of course, would make the cost prohibitive, but there is no way by which the Volstead act can be enforced other than to provide an agent to watch about every 10 citizens and two agents to watch the prohibition agent—Corvallis Times.

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
