BULLET IN BRAIN FOR YEAR PROVES FATAL TO WOMAN

(Associated Press Leased Wire) URBANA, Ohio, Feb. 20.—Mrs. Bessie Gillespie, 38, who clung tenaciously to life for nearly a year with a bullet in her brain, died here today. She was shot last March 28 at her home in Columbus when a pistol was accidentally discharged while being cleaned by her husband, Ellsworth Gillespie. For

several months physicians treated her at a Columbus hospital, expecting the injury to be fatal from one day to the next. Recently she was brought to the home of her father, A. L. Grover, here. MEDFORD-ASHLAND STUDENTS IN BRAWL

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 21.—School boards of this city and Ashland will take action to curb gang fights between school students following athletic contests, which have occurred for years. A young riot occurred Saturday night at Ashland following a basketball game, in which riotous eggs were hurled, the First Methodist church stopping most of the missiles. The trouble was a continuation of a skirmish Friday night in this city when a grammar school pupil sustained a broken nose, and another youth was badly beaten. Saturday night the war was taken to the Pacific highway and automobiles bombarded with eggs and hard-shelled walnuts. The bitterness was brought about by the "stalling" tactics of the Medford basketball ball team in the closing minutes of a district championship game.

LOCAL DEALERS TO RUN BUSINESS ON CASH BASIS

The announcement has been made by J. O. Newland and Son, local automobile and accessory dealers, that after today their shop and supplies departments will be conducted on a cash basis. Mr. J. O. Newland has this to say: "Judging by the flourishing trade of other businesses operated on the cash system, we believe that the public likes to buy for cash rather than for credit. Then, all transactions are settled at the time and a charge account is not accumulated at the end of the month which must be met or carried over. "We have chosen this time of year to make the change because it does not work a great hardship on the bulk of our trade and because at this period of slow business, our customers can more easily become acquainted with the new system. "There will be a considerable saving in costs for us in the way of clerical expense, stationery, interest and loss on bad debts. This saving we can pass on to our trade."

MAY DEPORT SALVATION ARMY LASSIE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 21.—Crossing the border from Canada in 1924 in a covered wagon, May Chipley came to this country with her father, four brothers and two sisters. Now, at the age of 18, she is a Salvation Army lieutenant, and today she was brought from Bend, Oregon, by immigration officers and held for hearing on a charge that she had not obtained proper entry papers. Her father died at Grants Pass in December, 1924, and the children drifted apart. The family's migration to this country came after divorce separated mother from father and children. The father had been a carpenter in Prince Albert, where May was born. May Chipley told officers that after she joined the Salvation Army, she learned to play the guitar and preach. She worked at Grants Pass, later in Portland and Bend.

TEN PERSONS DROWN

(Associated Press Leased Wire) OSLO, Norway, Feb. 21.—Ten persons were believed to have been drowned today in the sinking of the mail steamer Norge near Helsingland. The boat, enroute to Bergen from Oslo, ran ashore and sank immediately. Bodies of two persons were recovered. Five members of the crew and three passengers are missing.
