The girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Tierney of Middletown, Conn., was reported by Harry A. Lovsenz of Kew Gardens, Long Island, as working in his house as a maid under her own name. She had been missing since February 3, when she left the Marymount college at Tarrytown, N. Y., ostensibly to come to New York to visit her grandmother, Mrs. Martin Rogers. A quiet search had been carried on since then by the girl's relatives, but the aid of police was enlisted yesterday. Word of her whereabouts came in a few hours. Her relatives in this city said they believed sensitiveness over her size—she is five feet eight inches tall—caused her to leave the school. She was in the freshman class there and had passed all examinations except chemistry.

Mr. and Mrs. Kinman were married in Ohio in 1856. Mr. Kinman is nearing 96 and Mrs. Kinman will be 92 in April. Thirteen children have been born to them, of which nine are living. They have 36 grand children and 37 great grand children. Mrs. Kinman does her own house work and still enjoys fancy sewing and reading. Her husband does chores about the house, walks to the postoffice daily for the mail,

EARL OF OXFORD IS LAID TO REST

LONDON, Feb. 21.—For the third time this year Westminster Abbey today became the scene of a memorial service to a noted Briton—first Thomas Hardy, author, then Earl Haig, soldier, and today the Earl of Oxford and Asquith, statesman. Lady Oxford (Margot Asquith), Princess Bona, the daughter, and other members of the family came from Sutton Courtenay, where the former premier was buried. The cabinet, headed by Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, attended in a body. The rays of a bright sunshine from a cloudless sky penetrated even to the recesses of the crowded abbey as the solemn service progressed. The Duke of York represented King George. The archbishop of Canterbury, who was present in addition to the dean and chapter of Westminster, gave the blessing at the conclusion of the service.
