Increased Rent Compels Joffre to Move

Fernch Victor of Marne, Salary \$200 a Month, Relinquishes Apartment in Paris.

PARIS, Feb. 24.—(A. P.)—Marshall Joffre, victor of the battle of the Marne, has been vanquished by the high cost of living.

France's great soldier, with a salary of \$200 a month, must leave his handsome old Paris apartment because the proprietor has doubled the rent. Joffre can't pay the doubled rent and so he is going to move.

He is 76 years old and not as strong as in the dark days of the war when he was the commander of millions, in and out of uniform.

Joffre, nevertheless, will find a place to live. He still has his modest little home in the country but he will have no difficulty in getting another apartment in Paris. It was a Spaniard, whose son and grandson both fought under Joffre who was the first to offer "Papa" Joffre a home. This gentleman, hearing of the Marshal's plight, offered him an apartment either in Paris or in Nice, in buildings he owns.

Joffre still is on "active service" for Marshals, of whom there are six, are never retired. They have become, in these times of peace, sort of consulting engineers to the army and various problems are referred to Joffre and the others by the Superior War Council, and their advice is asked although it may not be followed.

POPE CONFERS HONOR ON JOHN MCCORMACK

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—John McCormack, noted tenor, has received notice from THE UNIVERSITY, London Catholic newspaper, that he has been elevated to the papal peerage with the title and dignity of count.

The title is one which the papal court confers upon men of unblemished character who have in any way promoted the interest of society, the church and the Holy See. Titles in the papal peerage range from prince to baron, that of count being the one most ordinarily conferred, and they are bestowed by the pope as temporal sovereign. The title of count is prefixed to the family name and is either purely personal or transferable by right of primogeniture in the male line.

DEATH OF SOCRATES COPIED BY EDUCATOR FEARING OPERATION

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Feb. 24.—Draining a glass of poison in emulation of Socrates, Leo Bruck, school teacher, died in the midst of his pupils. After he had taken the fatal draught, Bruck addressed his class in these words:

"Let me die as did Socrates, far from relatives, in the midst of my beloved pupils."

Fear of a surgical operation was the motive for his committing suicide.

Business Brevities

BLUEFIELDS—Revolutionary activities have reduced nearly a third the exports of bananas from the Bluefields district of Nicaragua. Areas free from military operations have had a steadily increasing business. About \$1,000,000 worth is exported yearly.

WASHINGTON—Fewer foreign golf balls will bound across American links this year, department of commerce reports showing that imports fell off about 200,000 in 1927. Most of the 3,557,192 balls imported came from the United Kingdom and represents trade worth more than \$1,000,000.

NEW YORK—Music pays in America—the tune of twenty million dollars annually, asserts George Engles, New York concert manager. The people of the United States spend that sum each year for concert and opera music, he estimates. Most of it goes, he adds, to the artists who sit at the top.

WASHINGTON—American typewriters are in use in virtually every country under the sun and the export trade continues at the rate of more than \$1,000,000 monthly, in addition thousands of dollars' worth of used and rebuilt machines are sent abroad. About one-third of the exported machines are portables.

LONDON—Great Britain consumes 5,700,000,000 eggs a year, and native fowls produce only 2,000,000,000 eggs. Forty-seven per cent of Britain's imported eggs come from countries outside the British Empire. The sum of money spent for these eggs exceeds the value of all the motor cars, motorcycles, cycles and rubber tires which Britain exports, and the imperial economic council wants something done about it.

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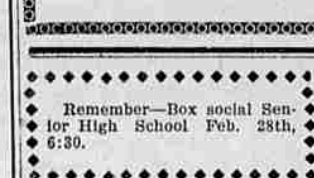
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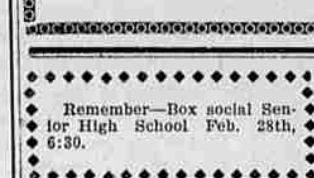
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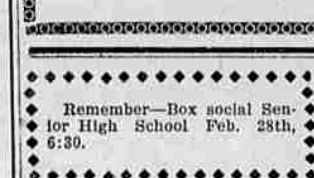
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
